#### Crop Prospects.

The streams through Centre county are getting quite low as it has been several weeks since we had a real good rain fall. It has not become dry enough to injure the crops but a good rain is badly needed now. Early in the spring there was too much and now not enough.

The grain fields are turning out much better than was at first expected as everything points to a large yield. The clover never looked as promising for many years. It has grown thick and heavy and the fields look like a beautiful carpet. Every stalk is in full bloom and unless the insects begin to work on the blossom, as they have done for a number of years, our farmers will have a large yield of clover seed which has been very high in price of late.

The corn, although somewhat late in the planting, is coming up nicely and has a good start. The prospects are good for a large fruit crop. Early cherries are in market and the apple orchards are promising. Taken all together this will be a good season for our farmers.

#### Borough Taxes

The following will be the rate of taxes assessed in Bellefonte boro for the ensuing year: Borough, 2 mills; street, 3 mills; interest, 6 mills; poor has been increased from 4 mills to 5; school was reduced from 8 to 7. Water tax will be assessed on the same basis as heretofore.

The public school term will be increased from 8 to 9 months; \$3000 of the school debt was paid. Free text books will also be furnished the pupils hereafter, as provided by the recent act of the legislature. The large school appropriation from the state is what enabled our school board to accomplish the reduction of the debt. The bad management of the overseer of the poor department is the cause of our poor taxes being increased. That is exactly what was predicted by this paper when Jim McClure was re-elected.
