## THE SIAMESE DISPUTE.

A Complete Understanding Between France and England.

THE SUPPLEMENTARY GUARANTEES

They Were Demanded by France on Account of Slam's Delay in Accepting the Ultimatum, and Are Conceded by Siam. A Neutral Zone in Indo-China.

PARIS, Aug. 2. - The supplementary guarantees demanded by France from Siam, which include the temporary custody of the river and port of Chantibun, and that Siam shall not establish military stations in certain named places near the Cambodian frontier or within a certain distance of the Cambodian frontier, were contained in a note issued by M. Develle on Monday and made public today. The text of the note is as follows:

"The delay of Siam in accepting the ultimatum presented by the French minister resident at Bangkok has justified the government of the republic in imposing heavier conditions. Being desirous, however, to give further proof of the senti-ments of moderation by which she has been constantly actuated, France will content herself, as an indispensable guarantee for the practical execution of the clauses of the ultimatum, with occupying the river and port of Chantibun until the complete evacuation of the posts established by the Siamese on the left bank of the Mekong river. Further, for the purpose of guaranteeing a continuance of the good relations happily re-established between France and Siam, and for preventing a conflict in the region of Lake Toulesap, Siam will undertake to maintain no military forces in the Battambang and lemreuf, and in the lacality situated within a radius of twenty-five kilometers of the Mekong river, starting from the Cambodian frontier. Siam will only maintain the police force necessary to preserve order. Moreover, Siam will not maintain warships or armed boats on the waters of the great lake or the Mekong river."

A semi-official note says: "The various interviews between M. Develle and Lord Dufferin in the last few days referred exclusively to the upper Mekong question, which has been pending between France and Great Britain for years, and which was brought into prominence by the Franco-Siamese conflict. All decisions in the matter were postponed until Siam unreservedly accepted the French ultimatum. Acceptance being made, France has not hesitated to adhere to the principal of a neutral zone to be established by means of mutual sacrifices between the possessions of the two powers in the regions of the up per Mekong. The delimitation of the zone is reserved for a future date."

M. Develle announced that Prince Vadhana had signified his government's willingness to concede the supplementary guarantees demanded by France. M. Develle also stated that his interview on Monday with Lord Dufferin was based on the negotiations which took place in 1889 between France and Great Britain, which recognized the principle of a buffer state between the French and British posstate between the French and British posssions in the east.

London, Aug. 2.-In the house of lords Earl Roseberry, secretary of state for for eign affairs, read the text of the first ultimatum and of the supplementary ultimatum sent by France to Siam and accepted by the latter country. He added: "We have signed an agreement in Paris establishing a neutral zone in Indo-

Morton, of Maine, who has just been appointed fourth auditor of the treasury, is the man against whom the late Mr. Blaine protested so vigorously for postmaster at Augusta eight years ago. Mr. Blaine charged that Morton had defaced the tombstone of his (Blaine's) eldest child by chipping off the date, thereby leaving the time of birth and death in doubt. There was a bitter fight over Morton at the time. Finally President Cleveland compromised by making Morton commissioner of navigation and appointing another postmaster at Augusta.

Five Killed by an Exploding Boiler. CLEVELAND, Aug. 2 .- By the explosion of the boiler of a farm engine on the farm of Louis Pierson, near Newark, O., John Kittle and James Bowers, married, and Frank Bell, Peter Bell and Norman Sellen, single, were killed. Joseph Shipp John Kittle, Thomas Edmonds and Luther Sellen were builly hurt, it is feared fatally. A straw stack was set on fire and the bodies of the Jead men were horribly burned.

Disobeying the Sherman Law. WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 .- For the first LARGEST STOCK OF PANTINGS time since the passage of the Sherman silver law the treasury last month failed to buy the full quota of 4,500,000 ounces of silver. The total purchase for the month was 2,384,000 ounces, leaving a shortage of 2,116,000 ounces. The amount purchased yesterday was 216,000 ounces at the counter figure of \$0.7030 per ounce.

Official Returns, It Is Said, Show More Votes Cast Than There Are Voters. LEBANON, Pa., Aug. 1.—The official returns of the Lebanon county Republican primaries show the following Republican nominations: County treasurer, John L. Schultz, of Mill Creek; register of wills, Joseph Donley, of Independent district; recorder and clerk of quarter sessions, Ephraim M. Boltz, of Lebanon; clerk of orphans' court, John R. Fertig, of North Lebanon; county commissioners, Oliver H. Henry, of South Annville, and John I. Kreider, of Lebanon; director of the poor, Alfred G. Ream, of Jackson; county audi tors, Albert B. Carmany, of Lebanon, and Henry E. Shelman, of Jonestown borough; delegates to the state convention, D. S. Bank, of East Hanover; Dr. Thomas V. Miller, of Heidelberg, and Andrew J. Merith, of Lebanon. On the question whether the Crawford county system should be continued, or whether there should be a return to the old delegate system of nominations, the vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the Crawford county system. There is considerable dissatisfaction and some talk among the friends of defeated candidates of contest-ing the result. It is charged that in one case more votes were cast than there are voters in the district of all parties.

Northampton County Democrats. EASTON, Pa., Aug. 1,-The Northampton county Democrats held their nominating convention here. D. J. Godshalk, of Bethpresided. The following were elected delegates to the state Democratic convention of 1894: H. W. Scott, W. A. Wilbur, James Smith, William Chapman, H. J. Steele, Francis Calvin, J. T. Woodring, B. J. Berlin, L. P. Ryan and Irwin J. Horn. The following were renominated for offices which they now hold: H. S. Cavanaugh, prothonotary; John J. Bruce, recorder; George W. Hoch, register of wills. The only contest of the day was over the nomination for county treasurer, which resulted in the selection of Charles L. Hemingway, of Easton. The other nominces were: For county commissioners, Charles Kichline of Lower Sancon, and Terrance McCabe of South Easton; for poor director, Samuel Dessler of Nazareth. Resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Congressman Mutchler were unanimously adopted.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 1.—The striking glass workers at Irwin have accepted the 5 per cent. reduction in their wages and returned to work. In Pittsburg seven of the Jones & Laughlin mills closed down. A large number of men are idle, with no immediate prospect of work. The machinists who have been making repairs at Oliver's worker and the strike was a support to the strike worker. ver's mills went on a strike against an increase of from nine to a ten hour day. The Scottdale Relling Mill company, employ-ing 200 men, have signed the Amalgamated scale. Work will resume in a few days.

Suicide of Colonel Frishmuth. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2.—Colonel William Frishmuth, 10 rears of age, who lived at Tioga and Frankford avenue, committed suicide by shooting himself in the left temple. Death was instantaneous, Colonel Frishmuth commanded the Fourth cavalry during the war of the rebellion and participated in most of the battles in which the Army of the Potomac engaged. He was the inventor of the patented process of making aluminium. It originally sold for \$5 a pound. By his method the price has been reduced to eighteen cents.

Philadelphia, Aug. 1.—The receipts of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad company for June were \$1,490,780.34: expenses, \$1,044,001.93; earnings, \$446,778.41. The decrease in receipts compared with the same months last year were \$76,652.19; increase in expenses, \$1,120.87; decrease in earnings, \$77,800.00. For six months ended May 31 the receipts were \$8,893,007.03, an increase of \$380,537.75; decrease of expenses for same period, \$375,314.62; increase of earnings for same period, \$775,852.37.

The Wilkesbarre Horse Won PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2.—A trotting match which has attracted considerable attention among local porsemen was decided at Belmont Park yesterday afternoon. The race was between Charles Broad & Co.'s (Wilkesbarre, Pa.) brown gelding John S. and John Hart's bay gelding Sleepy Ned. The former was an easy winner in three straight heats. Best time, 2.224. Broke the World's Record.

New York, Aug. 2.—The annual games of the Timothy D. Sullivan association were rendered of general interest by the fact that a world's record was broken. James Mitchell, of the New York Athletic club, threw the thirty-six pound weight three feet further than the previous record. The actual distance for the throw was 38 ft. 1/2 in.

Terrible Work of Black Brutes. GALVESTON, Tex., Aug. 2.-Near Mont mery three negroes attacked the house of M. Marsh, killed him, ravished his wife, murdered his infant and cut out the tongue of his 7-year-old child. His wife is believed to be dying. One of the brutes was caught and lynched. The sheriff and posse are searching for the others.

Fourteen Killed by Exploding Benzole. St. Petersburg, Aug. 2.—A dispatch from Kiev, capitol of the government of that name, says that an explosion of benzole occurred in the magazine in the Dumski-Platz. The force of the explosion was terrific. Fourteen employes were killed and a large number injured.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.-It has been decided by the managers of the Leland Stanford estate to dispose of over 1,000 Blooded horses, among them Palto Alto, and retain only a nucleus with which to conduct the work of breeding horses, inaugurated by Senator Stanford.
