THE BIMETALLISTS. Ex-Senator Reagan Wards Off a Partisan Controversy.

THURMAN OPPOSES FIAT MONEY.

The Chairman Insists on a "Stable Currency" in the Shape of Gold and Silver-Senator Stewart's Harsh Criticism

of Secretary Carlisle.

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—The attendance at the national convention of the American Bimetallic league is larger than at any previous assembly of a like character in the history of financial legislation. The First Methodist church, where the opening sessions were held, proved much too small to accommodate the delegates, and today the convention met in Central Music hall, where the future sessions will be held.

After the address of welcome by Mayor Harrison Chairman Warner, of the Bimetallic league, delivered his opening ad-dress, in the course of which he said, speaking of the Sherman silver purchase · law:

"The members of congress, the speaker of the house, who signed that bill, the president who approved it, never knew that it demonetized silver. There was but one man in the United States senate who knew that the act of 1873 demonetized silver, and yet he has never been hung or shot for treason. That act will be known in history as the crime of 1873. Let the memories of those who stand connected with it rot in oblivion."

At the afternoon session the committee on permanent organization reported as follows: Chairman, Allen W. Thurman, of Ohio; secretary, Joseph Hutchinson, of Colorado; assistant secretaries, Lee Crandell, of Washington, and Amos Simpson, of Illinois; sergeant-at-arms, Champion S. Chase, of Nebraska. The slate went

through with a whoop. Just before roll call for the committee on resolutions the convention came dangerously near splitting upon a rock, and for a while it looked as though an after-noon's turmoil was in sight. The contro-versy was precipitated by Delegate Thomas, of Colorado, who, in behalf of the delegation, moved that the committee on resolutions be selected one from each political party in each delegation. [Slight applause, hisses and confusion, and cries of "We want no party lines."] Securing permission to speak to the proposition, he said that the convention might be charged with belonging to or being under the domination of one of the three great political parties, and it was more than important that no such impression should go out from that hall. They wanted an American party of free coinage, one having no suspicion of being under the control of English gold or of the Rothschilds.

Donald Fletcher, of Nebraska, declared that they wanted a new party, under a new name, and with a new flag. Repeated hissing and cries of "no" were the response. Paul Vandercook, of Nebraska, ex-commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, denied that the delegates were there to form a new party. They had already a party-the People's party, the only party that had a plank in its declara-tion of principles for free coinage. This party was not going to throw over all the rest of its principles for silver, it was not going into a new party, and if that was the object and purpose of this convention, any attempt to carry it would result in a showing of very many empty seats.

peared upon the platform in the role of peacemaker. He shid that he had been called here, as had been the rest of his colleagues, without any reference to any pocal party, but simply as citizens of the United States for the purpose of arresting the course of the bondholders and gold men, and restoring the money of the people to its proper position. The moment they introduced politics it would produce strife and confusion; it would mar harmony of action and render nugatory whatever might be accomplished by the convention. He appealed to them to drop politics. Senator Reagan's talk had its effect and

Delegate Thomas withdrew his resolution. From the committee on credentials came

a report that 810 delegates were entitled to vote, and that they came from fortytwo states and territories. By this time the decks had been cleared for the permanent organization, and Allen W. Thurman was welcomed with rousing cheers when escorted to the platform. Chairman Thurman plunged into his address with out preface, and nearly every sentiment evoked applause and other evidence of enthusiasm. Mr. Thurman said in part:

"The fight between those who believe that the circulating medium of this country should be hard money-that is, real money, gold and silver and paper, redeemable in the same, and those who believe in the use of soft money-that is, paper promises to pay money redeemable in other promises to pay-is on.

'I am against an irredeemable currency in every way, but however if it is to be decreed that we must have flat money; if our circulating medium is to be based on fiat alone, then I am in favor of its being issped by the government and not by indi-viduals. But there is no need of flat money, for while it is true there is not a sufficient amount of gold, yet there is enough real money-gold and silver-upon which our currency can safely rest.

"The best money, the most honest money is that which will give to the people as near as possible stability of value. The claims of the single standard men that this can be maintained only with gold alone I believe has been so often disproved that it is even unnecessary to refer to it.

Mr. Thurman had no doubt that the president's message to be sent to congress upon August 7 will contain the catchbenny phrase "sound and stable cur-He wanted the president, for whom he had great respect, to define this phrase, and to give the people his reasons for saying that gold alone will make the stable standard.

In conclusion he submitted a proposition to agree to the repeal of the Sherman law in exchange for the free coinage of silver on a ratio of 16 to 1.

After addresses by T. V. Powderly, Ignatious Donnelly and others, the conven tion took a recess, at 6 p.m., until 8 o'clock. The night meeting was a mass meeting, the principal speaker being Senator Stewart, of Nevada. Referring to Secretary Carlisle's refusal to purchase silver, he said that for the first time in this American republic a crime for which Charles II ad his head cut off, the suspension of laws, had taken place in America.

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



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


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
