Senator Hill Presents a Bill to Repeal

the Sherman Act. WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 .- For the twelfth time in the history of the United States congress was at noon today convened in "extraordinary" session. The nominees of the Democratic caucus of Saturday night were promptly elected, as follows: Speaker, Hon. Charles F. Crisp; clerk, James Kerr, of Pennsylvania; sergeantat-arms, ex-Congressman Herman W. Snow, of Ohio; postmaster, Lycurgus Dalton, of Indiana; doorkeeper, A. B. Hart, of Tennessee; chaplain, Rev. S. W. Hadaway, of Maryland. Ex-Speaker Reed received the complimentary vote of the Republicans. The new speaker was sworn in by Representative Charles O'Neill, of Pennsylvania, the oldest member in point of service and "the father of the house."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The proceedings in the senate yesterday were of great public interest. The president's messsage was read and listened to with marked attention on both sides of the chamber, not a senator moving from his position during the reading. The message was referred to the committee on finance and its immediate printing ordered Mr. Hill (N. Y.) was the first senator to get in a bill for the repeal of the purchasing clause of the Sherman act. Mr. Stewart, of Nevada, followed with two other bills, and a speech, on the same subject.

A resolution was offered by Mr. Lodge (Mass.) directing the committee on finance to report a bill for the repeal of the purchase clause of the Sherman act and providing for a vote on the passage of such bill by the 22d of August, if not sooner This resolution was supple mented by another offered by Mr. Hale (Me.) fixing the hour of meeting of the senate from and after tomorrow, at 11 a, m. These resolutions precipitated a discussion in which several of the leading senators on both sides of the chamber participated. They went over without action.

The president's message was awaited by the members of the house with great anxiety, listened to with intense interest and afterwards privately discussed from rious standpoints. When the reading he message was concluded the election case from the Fifth district of Michigan was taken up, and after two hours' de-bate Richardson, the Democrat, was seated on his prima facie title.

A MILLIONAIRE'S ASSIGNMENT.

Robert H. Coleman, the "Iron King," Forced to the Wall.

LEBANON, Pa., Aug. 9.—Robert H. Coleman, the millionaire "Iron King," has made an assignment of his estate, including the ore mines at Cornwall, Lebanon county, to Archibald Rogers, of New York, and Henry T. Kennedy, of Reading, for the benefit of creditors.

The deed of assignment was entered late yesterday afternoon in the office of the recorder of deeds. Archibald Rogers, of New York, is one of Mr. Coleman's chief creditors, in whose hands Mr. Coleman's affairs were put for readjustment during his recent travels in Europe.

In the assigned estate of the Lebanon Trust and Safe Deposit bank, of which Mr. Coleman is president, the court yesterday approved the bond of Jacob M. Shenk, Christian Shenk, J. H. Redsecker, W. S. Huber, Joseph L. Lemberger and George D. Rise, all of this city, in the sum of \$75,000. It was owing to the complication in Mr. Coleman's affairs that the failure of this bank was occasioned.

He fell heir to a considerable fortune on the death of his father and immediately began a fast life. Gambling hastened the loss of his fortune. He is said to have squandered \$50,000 in a few years.

I., Aug. 9.—The bacterological examination of Lorenzo Moracio, a passenger on the steamer Karamania, who has been isolated on Swinburne Island, shows the presence of cholera baccilli. The patient is recovering, and is now able to be up and about. The other passengers of the Raramania, who are on Hoffman Island, are in good health.

St. Louis, Aug. 9.-John Finn, a motorman, while suffering from delirium caused by typhoid fever, attempted to dash out the brains of his two little boys with a flatiron and then borribly cut and mangled his two daughters with a knife. Think-ing he had killed the children he drew the knife across his own throat. Father and children will probably die.
