WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.-The senate was in session yesterday only twenty minutes, in session yesterday only twenty minutes, and a considerable part of that time was occupied by the chaplain in an eloquent eulogy of the late Senator Stanford, of California. All the Democratic senators voted for Mr. Gorman's motion to adjourn, and were reinforced by all the senators from the silver producing states. The from the silver producing states. The greatest attention was paid to Mr. Warner, of New York, but he seemed scarcely so much at home as he would have been had the tariff been the subject matter of debate. Mr. Patterson, of Tennessee, was also clow in securing an audience, but when he did so it was an energetic and appreciative one. Mr. Pendleton, of West Virginia, maintained

an energetic and appreciative one. Mr. Pendleton, of West Virginia, maintained his position in favor of the Wilson bill in a good manner, and answered the many questions plied to him with case and courtesy. Mr. Bailey, of Texas, gracefully and quietly presented the reasons which impelled him to vote for a coinage bill, and the house at 5 o'clock adjourned, while his colleague, Mr. Hutchinton, was still holding the floor on the same side of the

perplexed question. WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 .- The debate in the house yesterday was not specially important. It merely gave an opportunity for four members, Messrs, Hutchison (Dem., Tex.), Blanchard (Dem., La., Grosvenor (Rep., O.) and Snedgrass (Dem., Tenn.) to give expression to their views. The most interesting speech-because it was really the first Republican protest against free coinage—was delivered by Mr. Grosvenor, of Ohio, and which was lacking neither in sarcasm nor satire. Mr. Snodgrass, a Democrat from Tennessee, made a bitter assault upon his colleague, Patterson, on account of the position taken

by that gentleman against free coinage. There were three noteworthy speeches delivered in the senate. One was by the new senator from Massachusetts, Mr. Lodge, making an earnest appeal to the senate for prompt action on a bill to re-peal the purchasing clauses of the Sher-man act. Another was by the junior sen-ator from Colorado, Mr. Wolcott, who ator from Colorado, Mr. Wolcott, who contended that, although the Sherman act was vicious and filogical, it had nothing to do with the financial crisis, and its repeal would do no good and might do harm. The third was by the senator from Massachusetts, Mr. Hoar, and was a temperate discussion of the whole financial question, with a decided leaning toward bimeballism. A fourth speech—first of all in time of delivery—was made by Mr. Gordon, of Georgie, in advosacy of a bill introduced by him to suspend for six months the 10 per dent tax on the notes of state banks. No action was taken on any of the banks. No action was taken on any of the pending resolutions.



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
