

A BLOODY BATTLE PRECIPITATED.

Three Men Killed and Four Wounded in a Fight Between Citizens and Railroad Employes-Of the Wounded One May Die and Another Loses a Leg.

GILBERTON, Pa., Aug. 23.-The tearing up of the Schuylkill Traction company's tracks here by the borough officials resulted most disastrously. Seven men were shot, three of whom are dead.

For some time past trouble has been brewing between the borough of Gilberton and the Schuylkill Traction company, whose electric railway extends from Locust Dale to Mahanoy City, a distance of twelve miles. It is alleged that when this company was seeking the right of way through this borough the council adopted an ordinance extending to it certain privileges as to streets. This ordinance the company ignored, and placed its tracks elsewhere. There has been more or less dissatisfaction at this action of the company, as it is claimed that their track as now laid is an obstruction to a regular water course.


. On Saturday evening the heavy rainfall flooded the swampy portion of the town through which the track is laid, and the water was forced into the cellars of the houses near by. This is said to have so incensed the property owners and ten-ants that they demanded immediate action, and the tearing up of the track began Monday night about 7 o'clock. The Traction company were notified, and about 10 o'clock Chief Officer Amour, of the above company, arrived at the scene on a special car.

The Gilberton people-men, women and children-flocked about the car, and matters looked serious. The men engaged in tearing up the tracks did not stop their work, but continued until the rails had been lifted for a distance of about eighty Dehmas, the last surviving niece of Bene-dict Arnold, died in this city and was bur-ied last evening. She was 87 years of age, and was a granddaughter of General John Philip Dehmas, of revolutionary fame. yards. Officer Amour called upon Councilmen Stone and Reynolds, who were present, to assist him in restoring order and relaying the tracks of the company. The request was ignored, and was followed by bitter words from the mob that surrounded these men. The officer and an employe of the Traction company each held a Winchester rifle, but upon the refusal of assistance made no attempt to use them.

All this time the people were hooting and making unpleasant remarks bearing on the militia, a member of which was on the special car. This angered him to such an extent that he came to the front of the car, gun in hand. Whether he intended to use it or not is not known, but a second later the report of a gun was heard, and it is alleged by the Gilberton people that the shot was fired by John Briggs, a motor-man on one of the company's cars.

The shot had no sooner been fired than a tall man, whose name could not be learned, rushed through the crowd, and, pulling out a revolver, deliberately aimed it at Briggs' head and fired. Briggsdodged and the bullet grazed the side of his face, making a slight wound. Another shot was fired by some person in the crowd, and Briggs dropped on the platform. The lights were turned off in the car, and Briggs, who was shot in the leg, took ad-vantage of the darkness and fied. This saved his life, for had he been found he would have been lynched.

The shooting continued and Officer Amour was seen to drop. He was carried into the car and laid on the floor, with the Atterney and Counsell r in Fatent, blood streaming from his side and from another wound in his right thigh. He





which James Parfit, aged 25, was shot in the right iliac region, the bullet making its exit at the right hip. He died two hours after being shot. William Holland, 19, was shot six inches below right nipple. the bullet passing through his body in the neighborhood of the left kidney, causing his death fifteen minutes later. William Connors was shot through the arm, James Hullihan in the head and Evan Davis through the right knee, the ball passing directly through the joint and rendering amputation necessary. James Hullihan also had his skull fractured by a stone, and may die.

Women fainted and were carried to their homes, while others rushed to neighboring towns for physicians and priests.

The Traction company, of which Mr. J. F. Baily, of Philadelphia, is president, has abandoned that portion of their line, and it is likely to remain idle until the court has handled the lawsuit which will most surely follow. Officers are now guarding the home of John Breggs at Girardville, and he will not be allowed to escape, neither will it be safe for him to leave the house, so incensed are the people against him.

The road had been satisfactory to a majority of the Gilberton borough councils, and had been running since last December. PARIS, Aug. 23.-Corrected returns from some of the electoral districts make a slight change in the results of the general elections for the chamber of deputies, which were held on Sunday. The figures now at hand show the return of 315 Re-publicans, 30 Socialist Radicals and Socialists, 13 Conservateurs Rallies and 56 Conservatives. Second ballots are necessary in 170 districts.

ALTOONA, Pa., Aug. 23 .- William Goss, of Roaring Springs, this county, got drunk at the Lutheran reunion held at Martinsburg yesterday, and was placed in the borough lockup. Last night he set fire to the cell in which he was confined and was fatally burned before being rescued. The lockup was entirely destroyed.

ALTOONA, Pa., Aug. 22 .- A very sad acsident happened at Bellwood, seven miles east of here, last evening. While care-lessly handling a rusty pistol in his back yard Alfred Pelt accidentally shot his little sister-in-law, Maud Smith. The bullet lodged in the heart, killing her instantly. She was only 4 years old.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., Aug. 23 .- Constable George H. Nicholas, colored, of the Sixth ward, was committed to jail without bail by Magistrate Smith, charged with may-hem, preferred by William F. Comfort. In a fight Nicholas, it is alleged, bit Comfort on the arm. Nicholas was released from jail through habeas corpus proceedings.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Aug. 23. - Louis Loucks, aged 35 years, was killed at the Turkey Run colliery. He was employed as a repair man, and while repairing the pulleys on the slop, stepped to one side to allow a trip to pass. The last car jumped the track and caught Loucks between the timbers and wagon, crushing his head into a shapeless mass.

OIL CITY, Pa., Aug. 22.-A. C. Smith, of McClintockville, went into camp with his family on the banks of the Allegheny river, near Oleopolis, Saturday. Sunday evening Paul Smith, one of the boys, discharged a load of buckshot from a gun into a clump of bushes near the river. The younger brother, Albert, was missed from the camp. A search resulted in finding him dead in the bushes into which the shot had been fired. He had been instantly killed.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., Aug. 23. - An unknown negro attempted to outrage a 12-year-old girl by the name of Sabold in a cornfield near her home at Black Horse, in Plymouth township. He was about accomplishing his purpose when C. F. Mack, of this town, heard the girl's screams and went her rescue. The fiend escaped, after he had been pursued nearly a mile by fully fifty of the residents of that township, and had he been caught lynching might have followed.

Mr. GRETNA, Pa., Aug. 23.- Yesterday at Camp General Berdan was devoted to individual target practice by the shooting teams of the National Guard. The marks-men engaged in practice at 200, 300 and and gave satisfaction to the officers. Governor Robert E. Pattison and Adju-tant General Greenland visited the camp in the afternoon. The governor showed his skill with the rifle, and qualified as a marksman. His score was 21 out of 25 at 100 yards, and 16 out of 25 at 500 yards. His first shot at 500 yards was placed in the bull's eve.
