

ITEMS OF STATE NEWS.

Matters of Interest from All Over the Commonwealth.

PRESENTED IN BRIEFEST FORM.

Crimes and Casualties of Every Character Sent by the News Gatherers of the Different Localities and Carefully Edited.

DOYLESTOWN, Pa., Sept. 25.—The jury in the Fallington... cases failed to agree and was discharged. Nine favored acquittal. The defendants were held for the next term of court.

READING, Pa., Sept. 23.—Two women were held up and robbed by two highwaymen on Blingman street, under the Philadelphia and Reading railroad. The men jumped on a passing coal train and escaped.

READING, Pa., Sept. 26.—Burglars entered the residence of Albert Eyrich in Spring township, near this city, and breaking open a writing desk obtained \$624. A bag containing \$20 in small coin was overlooked. No clew.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 26.—William Dewolf, the widely known general manager of the J. M. Guskus clothing establishment, one of the largest stores in Pittsburgh, has been missing since Thursday morning, Sept. 14. It is feared that he has been foully dealt with.

BELLEFONTE, Pa., Sept. 23.—In the case of Long and Liggett against the Lehigh Valley Coal company, for 1,200 acres of valuable coal land in Snow Shoe territory, the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendants. The case has been pending for twenty-one years.

LANCASTER, Pa., Sept. 25.—Mrs. Frederick Haller, an octogenarian, who was threatened with the poorhouse because of her uncleanly habits, jumped from the balcony of her home, a distance of twenty-five feet. She sustained internal injuries which will prove fatal.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Sept. 25.—John McGuire, ex-foreman of lace mills here, and his wife, who were fond guilty of criminal assault upon Katie Roach, 16 years old, have been sentenced. The former was fined \$500 and costs and sentenced to five years' imprisonment. His wife was sent to Luzerne county prison for six months.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 27.—Samuel G. Stothart, a car accountant for the Carnegie Steel company, shot his wife twice yesterday, almost instantly killing her. He then placed the muzzle of the revolver into his mouth and blew out his brains, dying instantly. Insanity, caused by religious differences and drink, were the causes. Stothart being a Protestant and his wife a Catholic.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Sept. 23.—Joshua Gollightly, assistant mine foreman in the employ of the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre company, blundered, and as a result five persons were killed and six injured. He himself is among the dead. Mr. Gollightly carried a naked lamp into the Lance colliery, No. 11. A terrible explosion immediately followed, with the result as stated.

BUTLER, Pa., Sept. 27.—Five masked men, with a telegraph pole, battered down the door to tool house No. 2, on the Butler plank road. They then bound Mr. and Mrs. Diehle, the keepers, who are 70 years of age, and ransacked the house. The robbers took \$200 in cash and other valuables. When found the aged couple were almost dead from fright and exhaustion, and may not recover.

WEST CHESTER, Pa., Sept. 27.—Harris, one of the leaders of the Gap gang, who is now in jail here for stealing, turned state's evidence, and the authorities have recovered sixteen horses and twelve carriages, a lot of harness, etc., all of which was stolen in the states of Maryland and Delaware and Chester and Lancaster counties. Harris states that he and his pal, Clemson, who also is in jail, did all the stealing.

WEST CHESTER, Pa., Sept. 25.—A little son of Harry Dunlap, of Upper Uwchlan, was watching some cows, and poked his head between the bars of a gate where they were standing. One of the cows ran her horn in the lad's mouth, and, tossing his head, it came out of his cheek, close to his eye. His screams attracted several persons who were near, and he was released from his terrible position, but with great difficulty.

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 25.—Gerald Griffin and Stephen Doyle were at the Academy of Music Saturday night and saw Hughie Dougherty and his Tuxedo company introduce their western border act. The boys, both aged 17, with four comrades, yesterday took a Flober gun and battled with imaginary Indians on the outskirts of the city. Doyle accidentally fired the gun, and Griffin was shot through the heart and instantly killed.

OHIO CITY, Pa., Sept. 25.—The police are endeavoring to discover who performed the act of putting into the sprinkling cart of Barnhart Bros. two dynamite cartridges eight inches long and an inch and a half in thickness, to which was attached about eight feet of wire, one end of which was charged, showing that it had been lighted and failed to do its work. The cart was standing where considerable damage would unavoidably have been caused had the stuff exploded.

SCRANTON, Pa., Sept. 25.—Nellie Hammett, aged 15 years, was assaulted by six men while returning from a picnic early yesterday morning and dragged into a shoemaker's shop, where she was outraged and injured so seriously that her condition is critical. Some one saw the assault and the criminals were caught in the act. They are: John O'Neill, Joe Lewis, James Sullivan, Patrick Henry, Hiram James and Frank Sevin. They were committed to jail and bail was refused for them.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 26.—The Carnegie Thirty-third street mill shut down yesterday in all departments. On Saturday the laborers were all paid and the mill was opened for them under different arrangements. The new rules are that twelve hours, instead of ten, shall constitute a day's work, and the rate of pay ten cents per hour instead of \$1.35 per day. There was a great crowd of men present yesterday, but for some unexplained reason the mill was not started.

HUMMELSTOWN, Pa., Sept. 21.—A 9-year-old girl named Cooper, daughter of an employe of the Hummelstown Brown Stone company, who lives about two miles from Hummelstown, went to school, carrying her lunch in a basket. When she failed to return home in the evening her parents became anxious, and instituted a search, which resulted in the finding of the body of the child, strangled to death. She had been outraged and murdered, a portion of her underclothing being used to strangle her. It is supposed the fiend who committed the crime was a Hungarian laborer.

EIGHT LYNCHERS KILLED.

But the Mob Finally Secured Their Victim, Hanged and Cremated Him.

ROANOKE, Va., Sept. 21.—Robert Smith, a negro, yesterday assaulted and nearly killed Mrs. Henry Bishop, wife of a well-to-do farmer of Botetourt county. After robbing her he beat her terribly and escaped, but was subsequently arrested.

Soon afterward, however, a crowd gathered around the jail and kept increasing as night approached. At 5 o'clock the Roanoke light infantry marched to the jail by orders of Mayor Trout. Guards were posted and the streets in the immediate vicinity cleared. About dark the crowd was increased by a hundred men from the vicinity of the Woman's home, headed by Mrs. Bishop's son, a fireman on the Norfolk and Western railroad.

At 8 o'clock portions of the mob battered at a side door of the jail, where the militia and Mayor Trout had retired. Then shooting was commenced by the mob, and the mayor was shot in the foot. The militia were then ordered to return the fire, and a volley from about twenty-five rifles was poured into the mob. Eight men were killed and twenty-five wounded, some of them fatally.

During the riot the prisoner had been removed from the jail, but as crowds of men were scouring the country in all directions in a search for him a posse started to take him to the jail again. They were met by the mob, however, and the prisoner taken from them. He was hanged to a tree, his body riddled with bullets, and afterward taken to the river side, where it was publicly burned. Mayor Trout has left the city, and Acting Mayor Buckner is in command.

Treasurer Washburn's Disgrace.

BOSTON, Sept. 27.—President Charles F. Choate caused something of a sensation at a meeting of the Old Colony stockholders yesterday by the announcement that a discrepancy has been discovered in the accounts of the treasurer, Mr. John W. Washburn. According to the treasurer's report there was \$96,000 in cash in the treasury. It was found, however, that securities, stocks and bonds purchased with the company's money represented a part of this cash. The purchase was unauthorized. The treasurer was preemptorily dismissed and Austin W. Adams was elected to succeed him. There was a rumor on the street that the amount of the defalcation was \$125,000, but Counsel Benton says there is no authority for any such statement.

Bombs in Barcelona.

BARCELONA, Sept. 25.—An anarchist tried to kill Captain General Martinez de Campos on Saturday with dynamite. The captain general and his staff were reviewing a parade of troops when two bomb-bowers threw from the crowd. They struck near the captain general and exploded with tremendous force. A soldier of the civil guard was killed instantly and five others wounded so severely by pieces of shell that they probably will die. De Campos was thrown to the ground by the shock, but was only slightly wounded. Generals Bustos and Molins, of the captain general's staff, received serious injuries. The bomb thrower, an anarchist named Pallas, was arrested.

Argentine Federalists Victorious.

BUKNOS AYRES, Sept. 27.—General Pellegrini, at the head of the government troops, recaptured the city of Tucuman. The insurgent forces occupying the city made only feeble resistance. After half an hour's fighting they fled. Pellegrini, his staff and 1,500 infantry at once marched to the building where the junta was sitting. All the members were taken prisoners and locked up under a strong military guard. A fight took place on the coast yesterday between the government and the torpedo boats which have joined the rebels. The rebels were defeated and all their crews taken prisoners. Several officers on both sides were killed.

Bismarck's Condition Critical.

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—Herr Allers, an artist, who is a close friend of the Bismarck family, arrived here from Kissingen last evening. He gives an unexpectedly discouraging report of the prince's condition. The most formidable of Bismarck's maladies, he says, has been acute pneumonia. The disease was not discovered by the physicians, but Bismarck's condition has become critical. The princess is strongly opposed to removing him to Friedrichsruh. He, however, is anxious to go home.

The Alvo's Lifeboat Found.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Messrs. Pim, Formwood & Co., the New York agents of the Atlas line of steamers, have received a cablegram from Kingston, Jam., stating that the steamer Jason picked up a lifeboat marked Alvo, and landed it at Montego bay. While the finding of the lifeboat is not a sure indication that the Alvo has been lost, it helps to confirm the fears that have for some time prevailed as to the fate of the vessel.

A Canadian Embezzler in Buffalo.

BUFFALO, Sept. 26.—John Leys, of Toronto, queen's counsel and ex-member of the Ontario legislature, who fled from that city last week to escape the consequences of his embezzlement of trust funds in his home town, is now in hiding near this city. Leys is 60 years of age, and for many years occupied a high position at the Canadian bar, being looked upon as an eminent citizen. His embezzlements amount to \$300,000.

Three Lives for a Baseball.

HAZARD, Neb., Sept. 26.—Fred Dudley dropped his baseball in an old well on his father's place. A companion lowered him by a rope to get the ball, when he lost his footing and slipped to the bottom. His father went down by means of a rope to rescue the boys. As the three neared the top the rope broke and they fell and were killed.

New Brown's Murderers Indicted.

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 27.—The grand jury has brought in an indictment against Emma Woods for the murder of Lew Brown. Brown was shot by Emma Woods, who was his mistress, on June 3. She confessed the murder on the night of the shooting, but since has denied it, claiming that he had committed suicide.

Brunswick's Scurvy Decreasing.

BRUNSWICK, Ga., Sept. 27.—Two new cases of yellow fever developed yesterday. Six patients were discharged. There are now under treatment fourteen cases, the smallest number at any one time since the epidemic was declared. The outlook is favorable for the continued decrease of malignant cases.

A Big Market for Our Corn.

BERLIN, Sept. 27.—The German minister of war has ordered the military authorities to use Indian corn mixed with oats in making up the rations for the army horses. This will lead to heavy importations of American corn.
