A Senator Succeeds the Late Justice Blatchford.

CONFIRMED WITHOUT OPPOSITION.

The Senate, on Receiving the President's Latest Nomination, At Once Went Into Executive Session and Settled the Long Disputed Question.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.-Yesterday afternoon the president sent to the senate the nomination of Senator Edward D. White, of Louisiana, to be an associate justice of the United States supreme court, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Blatchford. The senate had hardly had time to recover from the surprise which the nomination of Senator White occagioned when his confirmation was anpounced. Wkile months had been spent in considering the nominations of Messra.

Hornblower and Peckham, and much time devoted to them by the senate committee on judiciary, the name of Mr. White was not referred to the committee at all, and in less than an hour after the nomination had been received the senate had placed its seal of approval upon the selection, had robbed itself of an esteemed member, and had given the supreme court the one man necessary to make a full

The nomination was received through Private Secretary Pruden shortly before 3 o'clock, while Senator Daniel was engaged in a speech on the Hawaiian question. Soon after its receipt Senator Caffery, Mr. White's colleague, was seen to make his way between the desks to a seat immediately joining the desk from which Mr. Daniel spoke, and as soon as the latter, who was uninformed of the fact that the nomination had been received, paused for a moment Mr. Caffery informed him of what had transpired. He immediately an nounced his willingness to suspend, and upon his doing so Mr. Caffery moved an executive session.

The senate had been sitting behind closed doors less than half an hour when it became known that the motion to confirm without reference had carried without opposition. There was no show of op-We keep none but the best quality of position to proceeding in this manner, and prior to the casting of the vote consisted tc.

All the speeches were congratulatory both to the president and Mr. White. Edward Douglass White was born in Lafourche, La., in 1845, and was educated at Mount St. Mary's, in the Jesuit college in New Orleans, and at Georgetown college, in the District of Columbia. He served in the Confederate army in the war, and was admitted to the bar in 1868. In 1874 he was elected a state senator, and in 1878 he was appointed associate justice of the supreme court of Louisiana. He took his seat in the United States senate in 1891, having been elected to succeed James B. Eustis. His chief effort in the senate was an elaborate speech against the Hatch anti-option bill, which was considered a very strong

constitutional argument. The general expression of opinion among public men is one of satisfaction over the selection. Telegrams of congratulation from all sections of the country are pouring in on the new justice, and among his senatorial colleagues there is great rejoicing.

Ed Stokes Wins His Suit.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3t.-The jury which has been bearing for several days the second trial of the action of Edward S. Stokes to recover \$75,000 and much interest and costs from John W. Mackay by virtue of an agreement to pay \$100,000 for certain stock, of which \$25,000 was paid on account, brought in a verdict before Justice Patter son for the full amount claimed. The judgment is for exactly \$91,500. The case went all the way to the court of appeals, being fought stubbornly.

To Proceed Against Both Senates.

TRENTON, Feb. 21.—The governor, Attorney General Stockton, R. V. Lindaburg and Fred Stevens were in conference for several hours yesterday, and it is reported that they have decided to institute quo warranto proceedings against Robert Adrian, president of the Democratic sen-ate, and Maurice A. Rogers, president of the Republican senate, requiring them to show by what authority they are acting in their official capacity.

The Gravesend Boss Sentenced to Six Years' Imprisonment.

BROOKLYN, Feb. 20 .- John Y. McKane, Coney Island's boss, was sentenced by Judge Bartlett to six years in the peniten-tiary. Ten years was the maximum punishment. When called upon to state whether or not he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon him McKane said:

"I don't know that I can say anything, except to repeat what I have already said on the witness stand. I have never in my life done anything to injure anybody. I never had anything to do, directly or indirectly, with the crime I am charged with. I will end by saying that I am not

passing sentence, Justice Bartlett aid that in his opinion the sentence should be severe enough to deter others from fol lowing in McKane's footsteps. As Justice Bartlett spoke the prisoner's face had gradually grown whiter, and as the words "six years" fell on his ears his countenance turned pallid.

At the conclusion of the court proceedings the prisoner's counsel drew up an application for a stay. This was presented to Judge Cullen, at his residence, and granted. Judge Cullen will hear the argument on Friday next. If they cannot secure a further stay the sheriff will remove the prisoner to Sing Sing as soon as he has arranged his business affairs.

McKane, if he lives, will serve four years and two months in Sing Sing, provided he is not pardoned by the executive. The commutation for good behavior will be one year and ten months.

A Brutal Eviction.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.-A family named Edwards were evicted from their flat because \$16 rent was overdue. The father was out of work and three of the children were ill with measles. The mother carried one child in her arms out of the house, and no sooner did the cold air of the street strike it than convulsion after convulsion seized it, until poor little Sylvia, 3 years old, died from the exposure. Friends are now caring for the family.

A Whole Family Drowned.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Feb. 19.-T. F. Parnell, a sheep man of Fobrey county, brings news of the drowning of a ranchman named Frank Randall, together with his wife and three children, in the Rlo Grande river at a point near Prisidio, Mexico. The wagon in which Randall and his family were crossing was upset, and before any of the occupants could get from under the box bed they were drowned. All of the bodies were recovered.

Evans Goes Up for Life.

FRESNO, Cal., Feb. 21.-Chris Evans was brought into court yesterday and sentenced to imprisonment for life at Folsom by Judge Harris. Evans was taken at once to prison by Sheriffs Scott and Kay and deputies. A motion for new trial made by his attorneys was denied. Evans denies the story that he abused Mrs. Brighton. He wanted to be sentenced to San Juentin, but the judge denied the re-
