# MURDER AT THE POLLS.

Fatal Row at the Municipal Election in Troy.

ONE MAN KILLED, THREE WOUNDED. The Trouble Occurred Over an Alleged Attempt to Get in the Votes of Repeaters.

Malloy, Senator Murphy's Candidate, Probably Elected Mayor. TROY, N. Y., March 7 .- A mayor was elected in this city yesterday, but the record of the election is spotted with blood, and scenes beyond parallel and

such as the oldest resident in Troy has no recollection of were enacted. In a darkened room in his family residence lies the body of Robert Ross, who left his home in the morning to aid in the election of the candidate that the Republican party had indorsed. In a room in the same house lies his brother William, seriously and perhaps mortally wounded. In another part of the town lies a rough and "ward heeler," "Bat" Shea, wounded, and in still another part of the city is John

McGough, who received another bullet, and is seriously injured. Up to noon the only serious trouble was at the First district of the Thirteenth ward, and consisted only of pulling down a railing in the polling place and banging about a few ardent partisans who were anxious to prove that they were working for the interest of their side. But this little fracas was only a small forerunner of the terrible tragedy a short half hour later in the same place, and participated in by many of the same people who had come out of the first wrangle unscathed.

Among the watchers at this polling place was Robert Ross and his brother William, both of them in the interest of the Republican party. There was also there a well known character by the name of "Bat" Shea, and it was a difficulty bebeen made that repeaters were voting sev-

eral times on one name. Finally about 1:30 o'clock a gang of at least fifteen strangers stood waiting to vote, while men whose names were on the poll list, both Democrats and Republicans, were crowded away. Robert Ross objected to this, and had some words with "Bat" Shea. There are two stories of the affair, and both must be told, because as yet there is no evidence to show which one is true. The police say, from what they can gather, that John Hayner, a candidate for ward constable on the Whelan ticket, attempted to enter the polling booth of the Thirteenth ward shortly after 12 o'clock. He was stopped in the doorway by John McGough, a Malloy man, who told him

he had no right there. McGough says that Hayner drew a billy and attempted to hit him. As Hayner struck at him he clinched him, and at that moment felt a sharp pain in his back, and turning saw a smoking revolver in the hands of John Ross, a brother of the dead man. The Rosses then pitched on to him, and as he struggled to his feet John Boland began to fire from a revolver. The police say that there is every indication that Boland is the man who fired the deadly shots. The revolver taken from him had four empty chambers, corresponding in number to the shots fired. Boland, who was immediately arrested,

was a Whelan watcher. The story told by the surviving Ross is to the effect that "Bat" Shea was the man who killed Robert Ross, and acting upon that statement the police last night put him under arrest, although he is badly We keep none but the best quality of Beef, Pork, Mutton, &c. McGough, who was very badly hurt, insists that William Ross and Boland started the shooting. William Ross, on the other hand, said: "I did not fire a pistol. It was murder-deliberate murder-and it was premeditated."

The vote polled was as heavy as that cast in the presidential year. With a few districts missing the vote for mayor shows that Malloy, the regular Democrat, who is backed by Senator Murphy, has defeated Whelan, the independent, by 1,400 votes.

THE NEW PREMIER.

Victoria's Quaint Announcement of His Selection.

EARL OF KIMBERLY'S ELEVATION.

He Assumes the Foreign Portfolio in the New Cabinet, White Hon. Henry Fowler Morley Retains the Irish Secretaryship.

London, March 5 -The manner in which the queen announces the retirement of Mr. Gladstone to the people will prove interesting to Americans. It is contained in the court circular and is written by a court official. Every word of this circular is generally submitted to the queen in advance. The announcement is dated Windsor Castle, March 3, and begins thus:

"The queen, accompanied by Her Royal Highness Princess Beatrice, drove out yesterday afternoon." Then follows a list of arrivals at the eastle, headed by the names of the children of the Duchess of Albany, Prince and Princess Henry of Battenberg, the Hon. Thomas F. Bayard, American ambassador to the court of St. James, and the French ambassador, ending with the names of Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone. It then goes on to enumerate all those who attended her majesty's dinner, wherein the names of Mr. and Mrs. Gladstone come last. This is followed by the information that the queen and Princess Beatrice went out this morning, and then comes the fact that a cabinet council had been held.

Finally, following the announcement anent the council, comes the announcement that the Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone had an audience with the queen and tendered his resignation, which was graciously accepted by her majesty. It adds that the queen has summoned Earl Rose-bery, K. C., secretary of state for foreign affairs, and offered him the post of prime minister vacated by the Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone, M. P., and that Earl Rose-

bery has accepted her majesty's offer.

LONDON, March 6.—The Standard makes the following official announcement: The Earl of Kimberly will assume the foreign portfolio; the Right Hon. Henry Fowler the Indian portfolio, and Mr. T. E. Ellis, now a lord of the treasury, will become patronage secretary to the treasury, suc ceeding Mr. Majoribanks, the Liberal "whip." Mr. John Morley has consented to retain his portfolio as chief secretary for Ireland at the urgent request of Lord Rosebery and others of his colleagues

Upon the recommendation of Mr. Gladstone the queen has made these changes: Mr. Stuart Rendel, member of parliament for Montgomeryshire and chairman of the Parliamentary association of Welsh Liberals, and Sir Reginald Earle Wilby, G. C.B., permanent secretary of the treasury, have been raised to the peerage by her majesty. Sir Algernon West has been appointed a privy councillor, and Chairman Cowan, of the Midlothian Liberal association, has been made a baronet. Mr. George W. Spencer Lyttleton and Mr. George H. Murray (Mr. Gladstone's secretaries) have

been made companions of the bath.

The followers of Mr. Labouchere seem to have dwindled down to a very insignificant number. In fact, it is claimed that the distinguished Radical now has only two followers.


