THE ARGUMENTS BEGUN

Pollard-Breckinridge Trial Now Nearing the End.

MAY REACH THE JURY ON FRIDAY

Ex-Congressman Butterworth Will Make the Concluding Argument for the Defendant and Ex-Judge Wilson Will Have the Last Word for the Plaintiff.

WASHINGTON, April 5 .- Judge Bradley administered a scathing rebuke to the auditors at the Pollard-Breckinridge trial yesterday. He told them that their confuct was characterized by indecency, and that they reminded him of buzzards around The cross-examination of Mr Breckinridge was concluded. Judge Wilson endeavored to have the witness directly contradict the testimony of Mrs. Blackburn, but this he failed to do. He said that Mrs. Blackburn had undoubtedly given her honest recollection of events, but that she had evidently confused times and places. Heacknowledged that in his secret marriage to Mrs. Wing he had made out the certificate himself, and that he had made it appear as his second marriage instead of his third. After his marriage, to avoid publicity, he and his latest wife had registered under an assumed name. Miss Pollard, he declared, had frequently urged him to retain her as his mistress.

WASHINGTON, April 6 .- Several witnesses from Kentucky testified for Miss Pollard yesterday. The principal one was Mrs. Brown, wife of the former principal of Wesleyan Institute. She flatly contradicted the testimony of Rossell, saying that no young lady was permitted to meet a gentleman friend alone. She exhibited a portrait of Miss Pollard taken at that time, showing that she was a schoolgirl, and not a mature young woman. Mrs. Louise Lowell, the stenographer, testified regarding letters she had written for Mr Breckinridge to "My Dear Sister Louise." These letters Miss Pollard claims to have received while she was at the convent near Cincinnati, under the name of Louise Wilson. They were filled with endearing phrases, Mrs. Lowell said. Other witnesses testified that at the time Mrs. Miller (nee Shinglebower), Brandt and Kaufman had asserted that Miss Pollard was living an improper life in Lexington the plaintiff was living with her aunt in Pittsburg. Mary Yancey, a colored cook, testified that in April and May last, while Miss Pollard lived on H street, Colone! Breckinridge was a daily visitor. His actions toward Miss Pollard were those of a lover. He would take the plaintiff in his arms and kiss her. On one occasion he told the witness he wanted her to come and cook for them when they began housekeeping. In the many love meetings between plain tiff and defendant the sewing basket that belonged to the second Mrs. Breckinridge was frequently brought out.

Washington, April 9.—The taking of testimony in the Breckinridge-Pollard case was concluded yesterday. Both plaintiff and defendant were on the stand, and each positively denied the allegations of the other. It is now believed that the case will be concluded on Friday next.

Washington, April 10.—The arguments

in the Pollard-Breckinridge case were begun yesterday. Calderon Carlisle opened for the plaintiff, and his argument was a masterly presentation of his client's case and a scathing arraignment of the defendant. He was followed by Colonel Phil Thompson, formerly a member of congress from the Bine Grass state, for Mr. Breckinridge, Major Ben Butterworth, ex-member from Ohio, will close for the defense, and Judge Jere Wilson, ex-member from Indiana, will give the final plea for Miss Pollard.

WASHINGTON, April 11. - Colonel Phil Thompson, formerly a member of congress from Kentucky, and one of the best known men in Washington, entertained the jury in the Pollard-Breckinridge case yesterday with a pyrotechnic speech such as has rarely been heard in this section. It was sprinkled with anecdotes, some of them too broad for reproduction, and his views regarding the stability of the seventh commandment will doubtless provoke re-sponse from the pulpits of New England. Madeline Pollard did not hear the terms in which her fellow Kentuckian referred to her as an adventuress and shameless woman, because she left the court as soon as Mr. Calderon Carlisle had finished his plea in her behalf.

President Haughey's Downfall.

Indianapolis, April 10 .- To the great surprise of all except his immediate attorneys Theodore P. Haughey, ex-president of the Indianapolis National bank, which failed July 25, 1893, appeared before Judge Baker, of the United States district court, and pleaded guilty to having systematically wrecked and looted the bank and embezzled the funds to the amount of nearly \$1,000,000. The penalty is from five to ten years' imprisonment. Mr. Haughey is 67 years old.

The Cause of a Pouble Tragedy.

St. Louis. April 10.-It has been developed that the cause of Sunday's double shooting, in , which John F Heintz and Emma Strahl were the central figures, was a shortage in the accounts of the young man, who, made desperate by the discovery and his inability to repay \$200 stolen from his employer, determined to make way with himself and his promised wife. The girl is now considered out of danger. Heintz, it is thought, cannot recover.

Another School House Panic.

CHICAGO. April 10 .- A panie occurred in the Humboldt public school yesterday afternoon, and in the mad rush of the children to escape from the building one boy was killed and over a score were crushed of physicians, while many others were carried to their homes by the police. The dead boy is Daniel Gunstein, 10 years old. Three others were fatally injured.

Deserting Coxey's Army.

Uniontown, Pa., April 11.-The army of peace, marching overland in the interests of Coxey's road bills, left this city on the mountain trip at noon today, at least 200 strong. There have been many desertions in the past two days, and a number of discharges. General Coxey believes the crucial test has arrived, and he does not care to make the perilous trip to Cumberland with men who may endeavor to stir up discord.

ITEMS OF STATE NEWS.

Matters of Interest from All Over the Commonwealth.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 7. - James Sullivan, aged 28, was so badly crushed by a fall of rock in the Pine Ridge shaft that he died in half an hour.

GREENSBURG, Pa., April 11.—Sheriff Mc-Cann offers a reward of \$300 for the capture of the prisoners who escaped from jail here last week, the leader of whom is Pete Matters.

CARLISLE, Pa., April 7.—Congressman Beltzhoover's condition is about the same as on several days past. His lungs are in bad condition, and he cannot be seen by visitors or friends.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., April 10.-The badly decomposed body of an unknown man, bearing strong evidence of foul play, was found in the Schuylkill river below the city. The coroner will investigate.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 7.-The body of the last of the thirteen victims of the Gaylord disaster was recovered yesterday. It was that of Foreman Thomas Pictn, and was in a better state of preservation than any of the others.

BETHLEHEM, Pa., April 10.-A large piece of slate fell from a bucket at the top of the Ryan quarry shaft, and struck L. P. Ryan, the owner, on the head, crushing his skull and literally scalping him. He is not expected to recover.

BETHLEHEM, Pa., April 10 .- The Bethlehem Iron company is relighting its furnaces. No. 6 resumed operations this morning, and three of the six furnaces are now in blast. The prospects for a full resumption in the near future are said to be LANCASTER, Pa., April 11.-A peddlar

named L. Shulsky, while walking in the western part of the city, was set upon by two well dressed footpads, who robbed him of all his money and valuables. They clubbed him severely, and he is in a very precarious condition.

BETHLEHEM, Pa., April 11.—Peter F. Snyder, a well known contractor, was instantly killed at Bath by a trestle falling upon his head weighing a ton while he and his men were rebuilding at Cressman's coal yards. Deceased was president of the Bath town council.

SHARON, Pa., April 10 .- Henry Winnell, who is alleged to have been brutally tor-tured and burned by masked robbers last Sunday morning, died yesterday from the effects of his injuries. At the coroner's inquest one witness swore that Winnell, on his death bed, certified that Nellie Morrill, his housekeeper, was responsible for the deed.

NORRISTOWN, Pa., April 7.-Professor Shortlidge, who murdered his wife in Media, is gradually growing into dementia at the insane asylum here. He grows stronger physicially, but degenerates mentally. He has had frequent violent periods, when he labored under the hallucination that he was to be murdered; but for two weeks past he has been quiet.

POTTSTOWN, Pa., April 7 .- The employes of Potts Brothers large rolling mill decided to accept a reduction, the firm stat-ing that they had the refusal of an order which would insure at least six weeks work. The works will start up full handed next Monday. The Valley mill of the Glasgow Iron company will resume next Monday with a guarantee of two months

Easton, Pa., April 11 .- John Snyder, 70 years old, of Clearfield, this county, was urned to death by a lamp falling on him and setting his clothing on fire. Snyder was asleep on a lounge, and above him was a lighted lamp, which he k nocked over in some manner. His cries for help were responded to by his wife, who was so badly burned in trying to extinguish the flames that she cannot recover.

CARLISLE, Pa., April 11. - Raymond Me Farland, the little son of Scott McFarland, of Bernitz, a town a few miles from here, died here of rabies. He was severely bitten on one cheek by a mad dog on March 12, suffered severely from the wound, and was seized with hydrophobia last Saturday. His eyes became swoolen and bloodshot, and he was thrown into violent spasms which continued until his death.

McKeesport, Pa., April 7 .- D. B. Climer, an agent for the Prudential Life Insurance company, is missing under mysterious circumstances. Last Tuesday afternoon Climer left the city for Coal Valley to make some collections on policies. He expected to return Tuesday evening, but no tidings have been received since. All efforts to find any trace of him proved fruitless. Climer is 65 years old, not addicted to drink, and his accounts are all

right. CHESTER, Pa., April 10 .- A train load of Italians was brought here on the Pennsylvania railroad and put to work on the Chester section, where the former workmen struck some time ago for increased pay. Soon afterward a mob gathered and drove the Italians off, two of them being severely hurt. Later in the day a gang was put to work in the Thurlow yard. A crowd of excited strikers soon gathered, and, urged on by the spectators, threat-ened to attack the Italians if they did not leave. Chief of Police Boone said he did not have enough police in the South Chester squad to cope with the crowd, and the | REYNOLDS' BLOCK, Italians were ordered to quit work and were conveyed quickly away on a construction train.

PHILADELPHIA, April 10,-City detectives arrested a young man who has been for several weeks passing under the name of J. D. Stuart and soliciting contributions for the work of the Society for Organized Charity in this city. He repre-sented himself to be a nephew of Mayor Stuart, and succeeded in defrauding about 500 of the most prominent citizens here out of various small sams. After his arrest the police recognized him as a well and trampled. Fourteen children lie in know, swindler whose picture is in the the St. Elizabeth hospital under the care rogue's gallery, and who has been conrogue's gallery, and who has been convicted of forgery and served sentences in this city and New Orleans. In searching him a memorandum book was found showing that he bad operated a similar swindle in New York.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., April 11.—The April bulletin of the mining department of the Pennsylvania State college contains some interesting summaries from the advance sheets of the state mine superintendents. A comparison of the accidents resulting from mining and railroading shows that the former is not so much more dangerous than the latter as it is usually considered. Out of every 509 employes in the bituminous region last year one was killed; out of every 209 one was injured. In railroad employ one out of 300 was killed and one out of every 50 injured. 
