## COAL FAMINE FEARED.

The Effects of the Diminished Supply Already Being Felt.

ADVANCE IN PRICES REPORTED.

Thirty Train Crews at Rochester Laid Off on Account of the Great Strike-Efforts to Get West Virginia Miners to Quit Work.

COLUMBUS, O., April 23.—President John McBride, of the United Mine Workers, is busy comparing press dispatches and newspaper reports of the big strike with information at hand. His revised estimate shows that more men have struck in the competitive district and fewer in the outlying districts than anticipated, but the total number of men out is about 150,000.

In Illinois he states there are 26,000 out of 35,000 miners idle; in Indiana, 6,000 out of about 9,000, and in West Virginia about 2,000 out of 9,000. Conventions are to be held in Illinois and West Virginia tomorrow, when efforts will be made to bring all the men into line. President McBride expects definite information by letter from nearly every district today.

From other sources the following figures as to the number of men out in other states is given: Pennsylvania, 36,200: Ohio. 26,000; Tennessee, 3,000; Iowa, 5,000: Colorado, 4,000; Kentucky, 2,000; Indian territory, 2,000; Alabama, 8,000; Missouri,

There seems to be no doubt but the sus pension in Ohio and western Pennsylvania is about complete. The organizers are most active in West Virginia and Illinois, National Secretary McBryde having gone to the latter place to address meetings. No reports have been received of any disturbances and none are expected, as a friendly feeling seems to prevail. BRAZIL, Ind., April 25 .- Feeling on a

part of the bituminous miners toward the block men is running at high tide, and at places is manifested in overt acts of reproach and retaliation over the decision of the block men not to come out last Saturday. As the block men at the mines out on Otter creek who live here were returning home from work on the C. and I. C. al train the train was assaulted by the striking bituminous men at the Coal Bluff crossing of the Indianapolis and St. Louis road, who hurled stones, tin cans and clubs at them, denouncing them vigorously as "scabs" and "blacklegs." The bituminous men's wives joined them in the rabble

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., April 25. - The miners' strike is already making itself felt on the railroads entering here, and the different lines are taking steps to guard against a failure of the supply. Superintendent Corbett, of the Evansville and Terre Haute railroad, has notified every agent along the line to hold all the coal now in the yards. At this point about twenty-five cars consigned to Chicago dealers have been held for the use of the engines. By this means the company expects to have enough coal to outlast the

LA SALLE, Ills., April 25 .- A mob of 1,500 miners from neighboring towns marched on La Salle to prevent the men here from going to work, and a riot was precipitated in which a number of local miners were beaten and badly injured. Fritz Keling was cut and bruised, and his condition is serious. Michael Begley, foreman in the La Salle shaft, was severely pummeled. The majority of the other miners who were intending to go into the pit were frightened out, and those who attempted it were roughly handled.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 95. - Delegates from the United Mine Workers, representing New River and Kanawha dis-tricts and several others from Ohio and Pennsylvania, held a meeting here to consider what could be done to inaugurate a general strike in both valleys. It was a very enthusiastic and confident secret meeting, but nothing was done further than hearing reports of delegates and drafting resolutions to be given miners at each point. All miners at Pomeroy and

on the Ohio side were reported out.

BUFFALO, April 25.—The first result of the soft coal miners' strike is beginning to be felt. The price on the docks has been advanced to \$2.75 a ton. If the strike continues for any length of time the lake steamers will be seriously crippled, as the supply is limited. The railroads have a supply sufficient to keep them running for three or four weeks, and fear a virtual suspension of navigation unless the strike is speedily terminated by compromise or other settlement.

CONNELLSVILLE, Pa., April 24.—The delegate convention of coke workers at Scott-dale yesterday passed resolutions ordering the entire region out to join the national strike of coal miners. The prospect of spreading the strike in the coke region has thrown this section into excitement. The leaders here now confidently assert that within two days all the miners in the

region will be out. ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 25.—The business of carrying coal by the roads running from the Pennsylvania districts into Rochester is practically suspended, and thirty freight train crews have been thrown out of work. Probably twenty more crews will ultimately be thrown out of employment if the strike continues. Thus far about 100 men on the road have been af-

#### A Radical Tax Collector.

WESTWOOD, N. J., April 25.—John A. Eckerson, tax collector of Washington township, started out in a stage with warrants of arrest and handcuffs to enforce the payment of delinquent personal taxes. It was his intention, on the refusal to pay, to place the handcuffs on the delinquent and carry him to Hackensack in the stage and put him in the county jail. The sight of the handcuffs and the stage induced the delinquents to pay on demand. This move of Collector Eckerson is having a beneficial effect.

### Ten Killed in a Russian Fire.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—The large woolen mills situated at Ivanovo, about sixty miles from Vladimeer, have been burned. The damage is estimated at 1,750,000 roubles. Ten persons were killed or injured during the fire and 1,200 people were thrown out of work.

Another Explosion Victim. HUNTINGTON, Ind., April 25.—The large boiler in Houser & Foust's tile mills, eight miles east of here, exploded, killing Arthur Anson, an employe, and seriously infuring both proprietors. Houser cannot

DEATH OF "BILLY" M'GARRAHAN

The Veteran Claimant Succumbs to Complication of Diseases. WASHINGTON, April 25 .- William Mc-Garrahan, one of the most conspicuous figures about the Capitol for the last thirty years, died at Providence hospital. The old man, better known by everybody in Washington as "Billy" McGarrahan, was about 70 years of age, and has been prosecuting his claim to the Mexican grant in California, to the Rancho Panoche property, for the past thirty years, and before that time for many years

in the departments and the courts. It was one of the measures vetoed by President Harrison after the bill had passed both houses for the first time, although prior to that time it had frequently passed either one house or the other.

William McGarrahan's face has been familiar about Washington, and not a member or senator has been in congress during the past quarter of a century who did not know him personally.

He has been failing rapidly during the last year, and went to the hospital two weeks ago. He was visited there by many senators who have grown attached to the old man, who, always kind and courteous, has beseeched congress to do him justice, but he beseeched in vain. In addition to a complication of diseases, dropsy set in, and death scon followed.

#### Fatal Explosion of Dynamite.

PITTSBURG, April 25.-An explosion of a quantity of dynamite stored in a blacksmith shop on Natchez street, Mt. Washington, wrecked the building, probably fatally injured two persons and hurt four others. The explosive was the property of some contractors who were blasting near by for an excavation in order to erect a house. The shock was felt for squares around, and the house occupied by the blacksmith in the rear was also somewhat damaged. The owner of the shop, M. Gallagher, and his son Michael, Jr., are both badly hurt. The water boy, Andrew Hugo, 17 years old, was instantly killed.

#### Pension Attorneys Disbarred.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Secretary Smith ordered the disbarment of six pension attorneys from practice before the interior department. They are: John G. Chapman, New Haven, Conn.; F. H. Barker, Kansas City, Kan.; C. A. D. Hill, Pensacola, Fla.; Christian Quien, Danbury, Conn.; James Cooley, Rickwood and York, O., and W. M. Bushfield, Cambridge, O. All of them were charged with violating the pension laws, principally for taking illegal fees and excuting false vouchers. Criminal proceedings have been instituted in Ohio against Attorney Cooley for personating a special pension examiner.

#### Terrific Gale Off the Irish Coast.

DUBLIN, April 25 .- A terrific gale prevailed yesterday over the southern coast of Ireland. The storm was particularly severe in the Skibbereen district. There was a large fleet of fishing boats off the coast when the gale set in. Some made for ports of refuge, while others remained, thinking they could outride the gale. It is feared that many of the latter have been wrecked. Reports from various parts of the south coast show that great damage was done on land.

#### Against Judge Jenkins.

Washington, April 25 .- "If Judge Jenkins remains on the bench it will be after the closest call he has ever had." It was one of the most prominent members of the judicary committee who spoke. Mr. Boatner expects to have the report all ready for the full committee at its Friday meeting. The report will be long, but it will not be tame. The committeeman The committeeman quoted above says that the report will show up Judge Jenkins in a very black light.

#### Two Killed by Gasoline.

St. Louis, April 25.-Meager telephone reports from Carondolet state that a five gallon can of gasoline exploded in the house of Casimer Miggs, a farmer living on the old military road south of there, completely destroying the building. Mrs. Miggs and Eleanor, a 2-year-old daughter, were killed and Mrs. Miggs' father and mother and another child named Rosie were fatally injured. The old lady was blown into an adjacent field.

## Brutal Treatment of Brazilian Refugees. BUENOS AYRES, April 25.-The Nacion prints a number of open letters addressed to President Saenz Pena describing the

brutal treatment of the Brazilian refugees by the officers of the Portuguese warships Mindello and Alfonso de Albuquerque. The letters state that three of the Brazilian officers have been badly cut by sabres, and that all the refugees have been treated in an outrageous manner by the officers and crews of the warships.

#### Banker Sellgman's Sudden Death.

HOTEL DEL CORONADO, Cal., April 24 .-Jesse Seligman, of J. & S. Seligman, bankers of New York and London, died at the Hotel del Coronado yesterday of pneumonia and Bright's disease. He came to Coronado four days ago direct from New York with his wife and daughter. His condition had become so serious on his arrival that all the members of his family were telegraphed for, but he died before

Wept on Hearing His Death Warrant. PITTSBURG, April 25. -- James Newton Hill convicted of the murder of Mrs. Rosa. Roetzlar, heard his death warrant read by Sheriff Richards yesterday and was led back to his cell weeping. When Sheriff Richards read the date for Hill's execution, June 14, the latter broke down, his head sank, and his hands, convulsively clasped over his eyes, could not stay the flood of tears. PARIS April 24.—There is no truth in the story that the decree signed by President Carnot forbidding members of the French diplomatic and consular service, under pain of dismissal, to marry without the permission of the foreign minister, was provoked by the marriages of M. Jules Patenotre and Count Daunay to American ladies.

Driving Out the Chinamen. HESPERIA, Colo., April 24.—The white miners in the La Plata district have determined that no Chinamen shall be permitted to remain in this camp. Two who camped in a gulch near La Plata have been driven out by a committee of citizens armed with six shooters.

Bergeman's Approaching Execution. Morristown, N. J., April 25.—Carpenters yesterday put up the scaffold from which August Bergeman will be hanged tomorrow. Hangman Van Hise will conduct the execution. The murderer is very devout, and reads his Bible almost constant.


