THE STRIKING MINERS.

Indian Territory.

MORE MARYLAND MINERS NOW OUT

West Virginia Militiamen Who Are Commanded by a Coal Baron Announce Their Readiness to March Against the Strikers If Necessary

PHILLIPSBURG, Pa.. May 9.—Three hun dred miners from the neighborhood of Keystone Hill made their appearance at the mines of Richard Hughes, near Osceola, for the purpose of trying to induce a number of miners at work there to join the strike, but thus far have not fully succeeded in their purpose. The mine supplies the Tyrone paper mill with coal, and at first the working miners, who were armed, declared that they were American citizens and proposed to do as they pleased. The delegation then went

into temporary camp on the township road. Finally the men at work decided that they would not go into the mine while the delegation remained there, and the visitors sent to Osceola for recruits to come and relieve them, and the men are still keeping up the siege. The operators announce that they will have policemen on hand to protect all who want to go to work, and trouble is probable.

LONACONING, Md., May 9 .- The employes of the Borden Mining company, Barton and George's Creek Valley Coal company, Big Vein Coal company, Black, Sheridan and Wilson company and Ocean Mine of Consolidation Coal company have quit work. Notices have been posted at all the mines in this vicinity ordering complete suspension. The employes of the Potomac Coal company at Barton have also quit work. A general mass meeting of all miners and employes of the region met today at 10 o'clock near this

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., May 9,-Orders has been issued to Companies C. D. F and K of the West Virginia National Guard to be ready to move at two hours notice, take his bed. The swellings and sores went up and several other companies have been asked to hold themselves in readiness for action in anticipation of trouble with West Virginia miners. Brigadier General Spillman is superintendent of the Monongate Coke and Coal company, the largest in the state. The companies have each notified General Spillman of their readiness to move at his command

LEHIGH, I. T., May 9 .- Williams Bros., proprietors of the Strip Pit, broke their promise to the striking miners and again commenced loading coal. The men were working under a guard of a dozen United States marshals when a thousand striking miners, headed by about 500 women and a brass band, and 150 men heavily armed, marched doown upon them. The workmen and marshals, seeing that it was impossible to cope with this force, offered no resistance and the men quit work.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 9 .- At Blue Creek mines over 100 negroes were put to work without molestation, and the eviction of striking miners is in progress. This has irritated the strikers considerably, and continued threats of violence are being made. Threatening notices, bearing daggers, pistols, coffins and cross bones, are being posted promiscuously. The situation is serious.

It meets the objections of the president to a pier in the river by referring the question to a commission o engineers, one to be an engineer officer of the army and four to be civil bridge builders, to be appointed by the president, whose duty it shall be to determine the question of practicability of building a bridge of a single span.

Slater's Floating Palace.

BATH, Me., May 9.-William A. Slater's new yacht, the Eleanor, which was launched from the Bath Iron works yesterday is the largest steam yacht ever built in this country, and is magnificently fitted up. Her cabin furnishings show an astounding expenditure of money. Every luxurious appointment that one might expect to find in a mansion is here. An open fireplace gives the cabin a homelike appearance. Her length over all is 231 feet; extreme beam, 32 feet; depth of hold, 17 feet 5 inches. The Eleanor is bark rigged.

Another Race War Feared.

MEMPHIS, May 9 .- Reports from Hill House, Cohoama county, Miss., are to the effect that serious race trouble is imminent. A white planter named Lombard interfered and prevented a mob of negroes from lynching one of their own color. Since then his gin house and other buildings have been burned, and at present both sides are armed and the blacks are swearing vengeance. * The blacks number about fifteen to one white, and considerable apprehension is felt for the outcome of the trouble.

Killed in an Anti-Jewish Riot.

BERLIN, May 8.—During an anti-Jewish riot at Grajewo, Russian Poland, a num-ber of workmen attacked the Jewish dealers and shopkeepers and looted their houses and shops. Troops were sum-moned to quell the disturbance, and after a fierce fight, the soldiers using their drawn swords, the rioters were dispersed. Four of the workmen were killed and a hundred wounded.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., May 9 .- Professor John Pemberton, passed engineer of the United States navy, on the retired list, who has been assistant professor of mechanical engineering here for the past five years, has resigned, and will make his future home in New York city. His successor will be appointed at the June meeting of the board of trustees.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., May 5. - Rocco Balletra, the organ grinder who has been on trial for the past three days upon the charge of abducting little Eddie Brotherton, of Ashley, this county, was acquitted last night. The jury was out seven hours. The boy disappeared from his home early in February, since which time no positive trace of him has been discovered.

HARRISBURG, May 8 .- State Treasurerelect Samuel Jackson yesterday took oath of office before Deputy Secretary of the Commonwealth Tilden, and was formally inducted into office. He announced that he would make no changes except in the position of cashier, to which he has appointed B. J. Heywood, of Mercer, who will be here tomorrow to take charge.

LANCASTER, Pa., May 7.-Abe Buzzard and his accomplices were given hearings before Alderman Dean on various charges of felonious entry, robbery, felonious assault, larceny, etc., all the crimes having been committed in the northeastern sec-tion of the county bordering on the Welsh mountain, during the past six months. In ault of bail all were committed to jail for trial at the August term of court.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., May 5 .-- The Pennsyivania Intercollegiate Athletic association will hold its annual contest on the grounds of the Philadelphia State college on May 19. The association is composed of Swarthmore, Lafayette, Pennsylvania (Gettysburg), Lehigh, Dickinson, Western university and State college. FRANKLIN, Pa., May 7 .- Lasi Tuesday Elias Borland, alderman of the First ward, city tax collector and treasurer for the Odd Fellows, suddenly disappeared from his home in the city, and up to this time all trace of him has been lost. His accounts with the Odd Fellows and with the city treasury are reported all right. He had but recently recovered from a severe attack of grip, and his friends believe that he has wandered away while temporarily insanc.

HAZLETON, Pa., May 7 .-- A fight occurred in Stockton last night, at the house of John Bubeck, where festivities attending his marriage were being held. When officers reached Bubeck's house they found Andrew Lanick in the kitchen suffering from seven knife wounds in the head. A thorough search failed to reveal any other victims. Lanick is in a critical condition. The bridegroom and guests were arrested, but they all swear they

know nothing of the affair. LEBANON, Pa., May 9 .- County Detective Hunter learned that a woman named Struppenhauer, residing two miles from Annville, had been tied up at her home by robbers, and while in a helpless condition robbed of a considerable amount of money. The woman was alone in the house when surprised and attacked by two masked men, who looked like tramps. They carried off two gold watches. Mrs. Struppenhauer was liberated by the neighbors, who first discovered the outrage.

HAZLETON, Pa., May 5. - Theobald Wackley, the miner who was entombed Thursday in Highland mine, was rescued alive yesterday. Wackley was partly overwhelmed by a mass of falling coal, and, although he extricated his body, he was pinned down in a kneeling position until rescued. Ever since Thursday night he heard the voices of the rescuing party through a wall of rock six feet thick. This had to be tunnelled through, as the other passage was filled with debris and would have caved in again. Wackley, in spite of his helpless condition, cheered the res-

cuers in their work. WILKESBARRE, Pa., May 7.—Angelo Matz, the Italian outlaw, who escaped from the sheriff at Hazleton, three weeks ago, while on the way to the penitentiary, was arrested yesterday at Luzerne borough, by a sheriff's posse. He was cap-tured while playing cards in the garret of the house of one of his countrymen, and did not get a chance to use his pistol. When he escaped at Hazleton he and a companion held an armed posse at bay all afternoon, and finally escaped to the mountain. He will now be taken to the Eastern penitentiary to serve a five year sentence for shooting and wounding a citizen of Hazleton. His two brothers, who were convicted at the same time he was, are in the penitentiary.
