He and His Lieutenants May Serve a Term of Imprisonment.

THE PENALTY FOR THE OFFENSES.

Coxey and Browne Liable to Two Hundred Dollars Fine and a Hundred and Twenty Days in Jail-Motion Made for a New Trial.

WASHINGTON, May 9 .- The three leaders of the Commonweal, General Jacob Slecher Coxey, Marshal Carl Browne and Christopher Columbus Jones have been found guilty of violating the laws by a jury of their peers and will have to submit to a sentence hereafter to be imposed by the court for their recent demonstration on the Capitol grounds. All three of the accused were convicted on the first count of the indictment, which charged them with displaying a banner designed to bring into public notice the J. S. Coxey Good Roads association. Jones, of Phila delphia, was acquitted of the second count, which accused them of treading on the grass, but Coxey and Browne were convicted.

Attorney Lipscomb immediately entered a motion, for a new trial and another in arrest of judgment. Judge Miller gave him four days to file the formal paper. Then the judge made inquiries about bail, and Frank Hume, a well known wholesale grocer, who several times has run for the Democratic nomination to congress from the Virginia district across the Potomac river, signed a bond in \$500 for each of the three convicted Commonwealers.

Two weeks may elapse, during which the trio will be free on bail, before the motion for a new trial is argued and decided. The penalty provided by law is the same for each offense, viz: A fine not to exceed \$100 and imprisonment in jail for not more than sixty days or both, within the discretion of the court. Accordingly the maximum punishment which may be meted out to Coxey and Browne is \$200 and 120 days, while Christopher Columbus Jones is subject to \$100 and sixty days.

By a curious congressional error in a recent bill which reorganized the district courts there is no appellate court to which a police court case can be carried. The only method of appealing from Judge Miller's sentence will be by an application to a higher court for writs of habeas corpus and certiorari. Attorney Lipscom? has announced that he will take this step if Judge Miller overrules the motion for a new trial. However, such a petition will not operate as a stay of judgment to keep the defendants from serving their sentences while it is pending.

NEW YORK, May 9 .- Fifty-nine of the sixty Coxeyites who form General Sweetland's Connecticut division of the army arrived at the People's party headquarters last night. Police Superintendent Byrnes compelled them to abandon the march in a body from the Harlem river bridge to East Tenth street. General Sweetland himself was arrested by Captain Thompsen, of the Tremont station, where he was confined for the night. The general insisted on his rights as a citizen, and wanted to fly the American flag, but he was made a prisoner. The captain insisted on the flags being furled. He, however, consented to allow the army to walk in groups through the streets. In this manner the men reached East Tenth street. The utmost indignation was exhibited by the members of the People's party when the news of the arrest was made

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., May 9 .- The Fitzgerald Industrials, en roue from Boston, received an ovation here last night. Rutgers college students, citizens and women heard socialistic speeches from M. D. Fitzgerald, the captain of the army, and Joseph R. Keim, of Rahway. Smypathetic women feasted the fifty-eight Industrials in royal style.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 9.—The Industrial army camped at Sutter's Fort expected to move eastward on a train yesterday afternoon, but were disappointed, as "Colonel" Carpenter, alias Inman, and Captain Logan, custodians of the funds amounting to \$300, cannot be found. It is thought they have decamped.

Another Globe Girdling Cyclist. NEW YORK, May 7 .- H. H. Hill. of Geneva, N. Y., a well known trick bicycle rider, and Eugene Peltier, his manager, started yesterday on a trip around the world Hill is riding on a unicycle, which world Hill is riding on a unicycle, which he will propel at least as far as Chicago. They will visit Hawaii, Australia, Japan, China, India. Russia, and through Europe to Ireland. They expect to be gone two years. Hill will give exhibitions at dif-

ferent points on the trip. Suit Against "Lucky" Baldwin. Los Angeles, Cal., May 9 .- E. J

("Lucky") Baldwin was yesterday sued in the superior court by Miss Lillian A. Ashley, of Boston, for \$75,000 for seduction. Miss Ashley alleges in her complaint that from March 3, 1893, to Dec. 7, 1898, she had been living in Los Angeles with Baldwin, and that she became the mother of his child. The plaintiff has a long array of distinguished attorneys to conduct her

Imprisoned Tourists Rescued. GRATZ, May 8.-The detachment of sappers and miners who were sent to release the imprisoned tourists from the stalactite cave at Lugloch succeeded in forcing a narrow passage into the cavern. All the tourists were taken out alive. The survivors are very much exhausted, but the physicians attending them believe that they will recover. The men were rescued after being in the cavern 209 hours.

Mrs. Lease for Congress. TOPKKA, Kan., May 8.-There was talk here of putting Mrs. Lease in nomination for congress-at-large, but the Populist leaders do not want to turn down Congressman Harris. They are willing, however, to give her the nomination in the Seventh district should Jerry Simpson not make the race. Mrs. Lease is very much in earnest.

Held for an Old Time Murder. DUNSMUIR, Cal., May 9.—George Decker, a well to do rancher of Shasta Valley, has been placed under arrest for the murder of his wife and child, committed twentyseven years ago. It is expected also that Decker is responsible for the recent death of his second wife and grandchild.

Four Killed, Thirty Injured. LONDON, May 8 .- An explosion took place in the large cordite works at Waltham Abbey, thirteen miles from this city. Four people were killed, two buried in the debris and thirty injured by the explosion. This is the fourth fatal explosion within a year at this factory.

COXEY'S CONVICTION. | SENATE TARIFF BILL.

Sweeping Changes in the Measure As It Passed the House.

GENERAL INCREASE IN THE BILL.

There Are Over Four Hundred Amendments, and in the Schedules the Increases Are Very Marked-The Increase in Sugar-A Few of the Changes.

WASHINGTON, May 8 .- During the executive session yesterday Senator Jones presented the amendments to the tariff bill which have been considered and agreed to by the Democratic senators known as the compromise committee. There are over 400 of them, and it makes a new bill, or a measure greatly differing from the Wilson bill and from the senate bill in any form in which it has been presented. The amendments heretofore presented by Senator Vest and reported from the finance committee are endorsed by the compromise committee. There is a general increase in the bill, and in some schedules the increases are very marked. Senator Harris announced that notwithstanding the consideration of the Chinese treaty had not been finished that he would oppose any more executive sessions, or the passing of any bills during the morning hour until after the tariff bill are disposed of, He also said that he would now press for sessions beginning at 10 o'clock in the morning in order that more speed might be made.

Among the many changes provided for in the amended measure are the follow-

The new sugar schedule provides: On and after Jan. 1, 1895, there shall be levied. collected and paid on all sugars not above No. 16 Dutch standard in color, and on all tank bottoms, syrups of cane juice or of beet juice, melada, concentrated melada, concrete and concentrated molasses a duty of 40 per centum ad valorem, and upon all sugars above No. 16 Dutch standard in color there shall be levied, collected and paid a duty of 3% of 1 cent per pound, in addition to the said duty of 40 per centum ad valorem; and all sugars, tank bottoms, syrups of cane juice or of beet juice, melada, concentrated melada, concrete or concentrated molasses which are imported from or are the product of any country which at the time the same are exported therefrom pays, directly or indirectly, a bounty on the export thereof shall pay a duty of 1-10 of 1 cent per pound in addition to the foregoing rates; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to abrogate or in any manner mpair or affect the provisions of the treaty of commercial reciprocity concluded between the United States and Hawaii on the 30th day of January, 1875, or the provisions of any act of congress heretofore passed for the execution of the same.

On and after Jan. 1, 1895, there shall be levied, collected and paid on molasses testing 40 degs. or less by the polariscope, and containing more than 20 per cent. of moisture, and on molasses testing above 40 degs. and not above 56 degs. paloriscope, a duty of 2 cents per gallon; if testing above 56 degs. polariscope a duty of 4

cents per gallon. A portion of the glass schedule is changed so as to read as follows: Green and colored, molded or pressed, and flint and lime glass bottles holding more than one pint, and demijohns and carboys, covered or uncovered, and other molded or pressed green and colored and flint or lime bottle glassware, not specially pro-vided for in this act, % of 1 cent per

Green and colored molded and pressed and flint and lime glass bottles, and vials holding not more than 1/4 of a pint, 1/4 of 1 per cent. per pound; if holding less % of a pint, 35 cents per gross, whether filled or unfilled, whether contents be dutiable or free.

Unpolished cylinder, crown and common window glass not exceeding 10 by 15 inches square, 1 cent per pound; above that, and not exceeding 16 by 24 inches square, 1% cents per pound; above that and not exceeding 24 by 36 inches square. 13% cents per pound; above that and not exceeding 24 by 35 inches square, 15% cents per pound; all above that, 1% cents per

Provided, that unpolished cyclinder, crown and common window glass, imported in boxes, shall contain 50 square feet, as nearly as sizes will permit, and the duty shall be computed thereon ac-

cording to the actual weight of the glass. Plate glass, 24 by 6 inches, 23 cents per square; all plate glass above these dimensions, 38 cents per square foot. Looking glass plates are added to glasses dutiable at 10 per cent. ad valorem in addition to other rates chargeable thereon.

The pig iron paragraph is amended to read as follows: Iron in pigs, iron Kentledge, spiegleison, ferromanganese, ferrosilicon, wrought and cast scrap iron and scrap steel, \$4 per ton, but nothing shall be deemed scrap iron or scrap steel except waste or refuse iron or steel fit only to be manufactured.

The boiler plate paragraph is amended to read: Boiler and other plate iron or steel except saw plates hereinafter provided for, not thinner than No. 10 wire gauge, sheared or unsheared, and skelp iron or steel, sheared or rolled in grooves, valued at 1 cent per pound or less, 1/2 a cent per pound; valued above 1 cent and not above 1% cents, 6-10 of a cent per pound; not above 4 cents per pound, 30 per cent. ad valorem; valued at over 4 cents per pound, 25 per cent. ad valorem; provided that all iron or steel thinner than No. 10 wire guage shall pay duty as iron or steel

The tobacco sc hedule is changed to read: Wrapper tobacco, unstemmed, imported in any bale, box, package, or in bulk, \$1.50 per pound; if stemmed \$2.25 per pound. Filler tobacco, unstemmed, imported in any bale, box, package, or in bulk, 35 per pound; if stemmed 50 cents per pound. Provided, that the term wrapper tobacco, whenever used in this act, shall be taken to mean that quality of leaf tobacco known commercially as wrapper tobacco. The clgar paragraph is amended to read:

Cigars, cigarettes, cheroots of all kinds, \$4 per pound and 25 per cent. ad valorem and paper cigars and cigarettes, including wrappers, shall be subject to the same duties as are herein imposed upon cigars.


