POTTSVILLE, Pa., May 21 .- George Fishburn, foreman of a gang of miners engaged in fighting the fire in the Packer colliery, near Lock Creek, was killed by a

SHAMOKIN, Pa., May 23 .- Vincent Rokosse shot and instantly killed his wife during a family quarrel yesterday. Ro-kosse was arrested and locked up. The couple had been married three years.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., May 21.-A gas explosion occurred in the William Penn colliery, and three miners were horribly burned. David Fisher and John Stone have since died of their injuries, and Michael Reynolds is in a precarious con-

GREENSBURG, Pa., May 22 .- A number of men, while on their way to work at the Claridge mines, were attacked by about fifty of the foreign strikers' wives and terribly beaten. Three of them, Pit Boss Johnston, Baker and Smith, were badly used up.

HARRISBURG, May 21.—James E. Bell, who was convicted of murder in the first degree for killing Ellen Miller in Steelton, was sentenced by Judge Simonton to be hanged. It is understood that the case will be appealed to the supreme court, which would mean a year's respite.

STROUDSBURG, Pa., May 21.-Jack Felt is suffering from the effects of swallowing part of a cork, and the doctors are not certain of his recovery. Several days ago he attempted to extract the cork from a bottle with his teeth. The cork broke and a large piece was blown down his throat. The doctors have not yet dislodged it, and Felt is suffering great inconvenience and

KITTANNING, Pa., May 19. - The Pittsburg Plate Glass company has posted notices at Ford City announcing an increase in the wages of its employes after June 1. Last winter a reduction ranging from 33% to 7 per cent. was made. The prospective raise will be to the extent of half that reduction. Enough orders have been received to assure a continuous run of several months.

PHILADELPHIA, May 19.—Andrew Gom, aged 60 years, was found in a vacant lot last night with both his wrists cut and fourteen stab wounds in different parts of his body. On recovering consciousness Gom said that he had been robbed of \$1,800 by thieves, who played the knock out game on him, and afterwards inflicted the wounds. His condition is serious. No arrests have been made.

BRADFORD, Pa., May 21 .- "Art" Mc-Keown, son of the late millionaire oil producer, John McKeown, who has been doing the "Coal Oil Johnny" act in Bradford for the past two years, was arrested by Sheriff Walker on a warrant sworn out by Grace Marks, in a suit for \$20,000 damages for breach of promise of marriage. McKeown gave bail in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance at court. The plaintiff is

PHILADELPHIA, May 19 .- The Order of Topti made an assignment to the Land itle and Trust company and Francis Shunk Brown, the order's attorney, yesterday afternoon. The assignment, the officers say, has been precipitated by reason of threatened legal proceedings for the appointment of a receiver. The officers believe that the interest of all parties concerned will be best conserved under a general assignment for the benefit of creditors.

SUNBURY, Pa., May 22. - The Repubt in the court house here yesterday. Only one delegate from the Upper River end of the county was present. These nominations were made: Congress, Monroe H. WILKESBARRE, Pa., May 19.-A row occurred at the Keystone colliery, near Parsons, yesterday afternoon, which at one time assumed almost the proportions of a riot. The trouble grew out of a strike that took place a week ago, and the immediate cause was an attempt upon the part of some of the strikers to return to work. When they appeared at the mine a crowd of Hungarians, numbering twentyfive or thirty, set upon them with clubs and stones, making them flee for their lives. Two of the men who wanted to go to work were seriously hurt, and the others decided not to go back to work at

SCRANTON, Pa., May 21.—T. V. Powderly was seen at his home here last night by an Associated Press reporter, who was the first to carry to the ex-general master workman of the Knights of Labor the report of his expulsion from that order by the general executive committee. Mr. Powderly denied the truth of the report, and said that the laws of the Knights of Labor provide that no member can be dismissed without being first given a trial at which to prove his innocence of the charges against him. Mr. Powderly said that he had not advocated the absorption of the Knights of Labor by the Federation of

HARRISBURG, May 23.—It becomes more and more a certainty that the slated nominations for the Republican state ticket will be carried out, and that the ticket will be headed by Hastings and Lyon for governor and lieutenant governor. "Jack" Robinson is making his fight for the latter office, but Lyon has 198 out of the 264 votes, and the congressman's case is hopeless. Huff will be the nominee for auditor general, and Grow and Latta will carry off the nominations for congressmen-at-large. General Hastings' name will be presented to the convention by ex-Governor Beaver, and Charles Emory Smith will second the nomination. The most important plank in the platform will be that which deals with the silver question. It will recommend the use of both gold and silver at a ratio which will preserve the parity of those metals.

LATROBE, Pa., May 22.-Interest in the strike situation here has the call over the flood excitement. The state of affairs is extremely critical in this region, and trouble is imminent. The attempt to resume work yesterday by the Latrobe Coal company was met by ugly opposition, princi-pally from a big mob of Slavs and Italians. Only one man was allowed to go to work. The mob was in an ugly ood, and the strikers were armed with clubs, bars of iron, big steel rods and other weapons, proving very formidable in the hands of these vicious foreigners. At the Ligionier works, about a mile from 6 town, a dozen deputies were confronted by a mob of about twenty-five strikers, armed with clubs and revolvers. The deputies were attacked from the rear, and one of them was struck over the head with a club and another blow over the arms and his rifle wrested from him.

THE INVADING ARMIES.

Fitzgerald's Boston Contingent at the National Capital.

POLICE WILL NOT MOLEST THEM.

The Appearance of the Men Commended and They Are Assured by Police Officials That They Will be Free from Persecution-Some of the Other Armies.

WASHINGTON, May 23. - Michael Fitzgerald, with his band of forty-three industrial delegates, as he styles them, arrived in this city last evening, and the organization has taken quarters in the small chapel annex to the Mount Zion Method-ist church, a house of worship for negroes in the northwest section of the city. The chapel is just about large enough to accommodate the industrials, and is equipped with wooden benches, which the men used for beds last night. The delegates are by far the most intelligent in appearance of any of the armies of the unemployed that have reached this city.

Fitzgerald says his men do not expect to stay here more than three or four days. They have a petition to present to congress but have as yet made no plans con-

petition is strongly socialistic in its nature, and goes much farther than the Coxey plan. Fitzgerald says his men are in sympathy with Coxe, but that they are not in any way connected with him or his

Shortly after quarters were taken up by the delegates in the chapel the police lleutenant of the precinct entered and made a little speech to the men. He said that law abiding people would not be molested here by the police. He received assurance from Fitzgerald that there was to be no breaking of the peace, and that no professional crooks were among the delegates. He does not anticipate any trouble from the men.


