A Heavy Hail Storm.

Clinton county was visited by quite a heavy hail storm on Thursday evening, of last week. The storm covered the territory from Farrandsville to a point this side of Jersey Shore. Many of the hail stones that fell were as large as hickory nuts. The greatest damage was in the townships of Woodward, Dunnstable, parts of Castanea, Pine Creek and Wayne. The growing tobacco in these townships was completely ruined, the stalks being completely stripped. In addition to the tobacco, the corn and fruit were so badly damaged, and the oats in several places were pretty well threshed.
