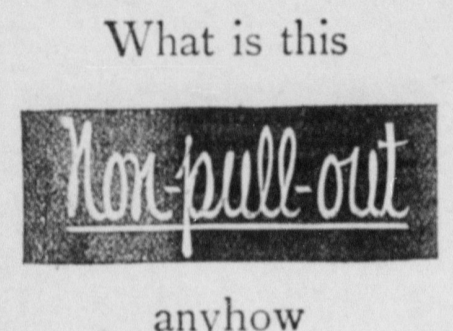

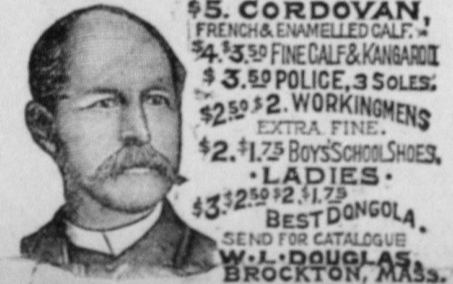

JENKINS OVERRULED.

The Right of Workmen to Strike Undoubted.

THE JUDGE EXCEEDED HIS POWERS

The Section Which Prohibits Men from "Conspiring to Quit with the Intent of Crippling the Property in Their Custody" Still Stands as the Law.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—In a long decision read by Justice Harlan, and prepared by him, the United States circuit court of appeals reversed in part the famous decision of Judge Jenkins in the case of P. M. Arthur and others against the Northern Pacific railroad, in which Judge Jenkins decided that men had no right to combine for a strike under certain conditions.

The court said that Judge Jenkins had exceeded his powers when he enjoined the employees of the receivers of the Northern Pacific railroad company from quitting the service of said receivers, with or without notice, so as to cripple the property or prevent the operation of said road.

The decision was considered by the lawyers who packed the court room as one of the most important opinions delivered in the United States in a decade. It defines the status before the law of labor organizations in their conduct of strikes, and affirms the powers of courts of equity to interfere by injunction when there is reason to believe that the law will be violated.

Justice Harlan, of the supreme court, delivered the opinion. Sitting with him were Judges Woods, Bunn, Grosscup and Jenkins. The last named sat with his eyes fixed upon Harlan as the latter read the opinion reviewing the circuit judge's action.

The audience which listened to the reading of the opinion was a most distinguished one. Ex-President Harrison and his partner, Mr. Elam, sat side by side, well up toward the bench. After disposing of cases in which the findings of the court were merely announced by Judges Woods and Jenkins, Justice Harlan began the reading of the case of P. M. Arthur et al., interveners, against Thomas M. Oakes, Henry C. Payne and Henry C. Rouse, receivers of the Northern Pacific Railroad company, as this celebrated case is known on the docket.

Train Robbers Captured. ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Oct. 3.—Lee Jones and "Scar Face" Charlie Frizzell were arrested here, charged with conspiracy to rob the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific train, and "compensation" was traced by one of their own band. A week ago it was planned to rob a west bound Rock Island train and to blow it up if necessary.

Church Fair Lotteries Illegal. ELIZABETH, N. J., Oct. 3.—Judge Van Syckle, in the Union county court, charged the grand jury that the practice at church fairs of holding drawings for prizes is a violation of the law against lotteries, and as such an offense as race track polling and other gambling.

Captain Howgate Captured. NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Captain Henry W. Howgate, formerly chief of the weather bureau in Washington, who was delinquent officer as well, was arrested in this city yesterday on the charges of forgery and the embezzlement of \$300,000, committed in 1878 and 1879.

A Baby Heroine. DUBUQUE, Ia., Sept. 29.—A 7-year-old girl saved a passenger train on the Chicago and Great Western road near Dubuque. She was seen by the engineer waving her little red apron as a signal.

A Stick Driven Through Her Skull. PAWNEE, Neb., Oct. 3.—A cyclone struck the home of John Nelson, seven miles south of here. The family of seven persons were blown into an adjoining field, and a little girl, 9-years-old, had a stick driven through her skull, and cannot live.

Resumed After Four Months' Idleness. TRENTON, Oct. 3.—The New Jersey Steel and Iron company yesterday resumed work in their rolling mill department after a shutdown of four months.

ARIZONA TRAIN ROBBERY

Two Men and a Boy Hold Up a Train. One Robber Captured.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 2.—An east bound Southern Pacific train was held up one and a half miles east of Maricopa by three persons. One of the robbers rode on the blind baggage car out of Maricopa, while the other two flagged the train.

When the boy came from the car the trainmen, who were under the bandits' guns, were compelled to march with the bandits a short distance into the bushes. There the rebels released their prisoners, and mounting their horses, rode away.

A posse, led by Sheriff Murphy, of Maricopa, found the trail of the robbers at the point where they had crossed the Gila river, seven miles east of Phoenix. Soon afterward they came upon a camp which the robbers had hastily abandoned.

PROBABLY FATAL ACCIDENT

People Trampled Under Horses' Feet During Baltimore's Baseball Parade. BALTIMORE, Oct. 3.—During the baseball procession last night a serious accident occurred, and that it did not result fatally to several persons is only little short of miraculous.

The streets at this point were a perfect jam of humanity, wedged in so tightly as to render it impossible for them to escape. Most of them being women and children made the matter worse. The horses, becoming more and more frightened at the screams of the people, reared, plunged and trampled them down in a frightful manner.

Florence Ingle, aged 18, was taken out from under the horses' feet unconscious, and has since remained in that condition. It is feared her skull is fractured.

Sea Captain Charged with Cruelty. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3.—Jack Day, a student of Columbia college, New York, and J. H. Nicol, a student of the University of Pennsylvania, have arrived in San Francisco on the American ship Benjamin F. Packard.

A British Steamship Sunk. WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 2.—The big British iron steamship Allegheny was in collision with the French tank steamer Caucaseoff ship John Light at 4:45 in the morning.

Fugitive Bank President Captured. WICHITA, Kan., Oct. 3.—T. R. Hazzard, president of the Bank of Sedgewick City, who, it is alleged, with others, defrauded J. W. Ramsey, of Springfield, Ill., out of \$23,000 by forged deeds of real estate here, was arrested on Sunday in Plymouth, N. H., and officers have started to bring him back.

Professor Shortridge Has a Relapse. CHESTER, Pa., Oct. 3.—Dr. Richardson, physician in charge of the male department of the Norristown Insane asylum, reports that Professor S. C. Shortridge, acquitted last week of murdering his wife because of insanity, has taken a change for the worse.

Important British Cabinet Council. LONDON, Oct. 3.—A special cabinet council has been called for Tuesday next, and the members of the ministry who are absent from the city have been hurriedly summoned to return.

Again the Lone Highwayman. YREKA, Cal., Oct. 3.—The stage running between this place and Fort Jones was held up by a masked highwayman. The robber took Wells, Fargo & Co.'s express box, which contained valuable treasure.

Exeta Is Not Belligerent. CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 1.—General Antonio Exeta arrived here and called on President Diaz yesterday. He denies any intention of making war on Salvador or Honduras.

Mercer Nearing the End. MONTREAL, Oct. 3.—Friends of Hon. Mr. Mercer, ex-premier of Quebec, have been summoned to his bedside from Quebec and other points, as the family believe the end is near at hand.

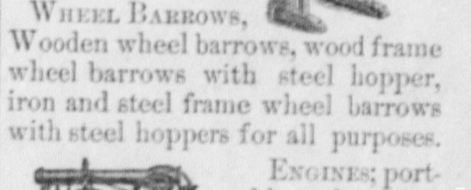

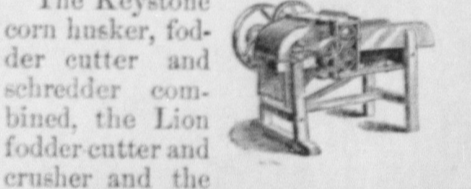

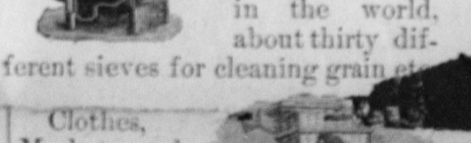
