





THE JUDGE EXCEEDED HIS POWERS

The Section Which Prohibits Men from Crippling the Property in Their Costody" Still Stands as the Law.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 .- In a long decision read by Justice Harlan, and prepared by him, the United States circuit court of appeals reversed in part the famous decision of Judge Jenkins in the case of P. M. Arthur and others against the Northern Pacific railroad, in which Judge Jen-kins decided that men had no right to combine for a strike under certain conditions. Although the case is reversed in part, and the cause remanded with directions to strike out certain portions of Judge Jenkin's opinion, the effect of the

decision is to prevent all strikes unless they be absolutely peaceable. The court said that Judge Jenkins had exceeded his powers when he enjoined the employes of the receivers of the Northern Pacific railroad company from quitting the service of said receivers, with or without notice, so as to cripple the property or prevent the operation of said road. It held, however, that the section should stand in which the men were prohibited "from combining and conspiring to quit, with or without notice, the service of said receivers, with the object and intent of crippling the property in their custody, or embarrassing the operation of said rail-

road. The decision was considered by the lawyers who packed the court room as one of the most important opinions delivered in the United States in a decade. It defines the status before the law of labor organizations in their conduct of strikes, and affirms the powers of courts of equity to interfere by injunction when there is reason to believe that the law will be violated. It holds that men may withdraw in a body from the service of an employer, using, however, neither force, threats, persecution nor intimidation toward em-ployes who do not join them, nor must they use any "device to molest, hinder, alarm or interfere with others who desire o take their places.

Justice Harlan, of the supreme court, delivered the opinion. Sitting with him were Judges Woods, Bunn, Grosscup and Jenkins. The last named sat with his eyes fixed upon Harlan as the latter read the opinion reviewing the circuit judge's action. Judge Jenkins appeared undisturbed by the opinion.

The audience which listened to the reading of the opinion was a most distin-guished one. Ex-President Harrison and his partner, Mr. Elam, sat side by side, well up toward the bench. After disposing of cases in which the findings of the court were merely announced by Judges Woods and Jenkins, Justice Harlan began the reading of the case of P. M. Arthur et al., interveners, against Thomas M. Oakes, Henry C. Payne and Henry C. Rouse, re-ceivers of the Northern Pacific Railroad company, as this celebrated case is known on the docket.

ARIZONA TRAIN ROBBERS

Two Men and a Boy Hold Up a Train. One Robber Captured.

PHCENIX, Ariz., Oct. 2 .- An east bound Southern Pacific train was held up one and a half miles east of Maricopa by three persons. One of the robbers rode on the blind baggage car out of Maricopa, while the other two flagged the train. The robbers secured less than five hundred dollars.

Two of the bandits were masked, and the third, who was a mere boy, was not. "Conspiring to Quit with the Intent of The robber who previously climbed upon the train captured the head brakeman and compelled him to turn on the air brakes and stop the train The other bandit covered the engineer, who, with the brakeman, was compelled to go back to the express car to induce the messenger to open the box. The boy was theu shoved into the car. While he was searching for express treasures the two bandits guarded each side of the train.

When the boy came from the car the trainmen, who were under the bandits' guns, were compelled to march with the bandits a short distance into the bushes. There the rebels released their prisoners. and mounting their horses, rode away The penalty for robbing trains in Arizons is death.

A posse, led by Sheriff Murphy, of Maricopa, found the trail of the robbers at the point where they had crossed the Gila river, seven miles east of Phœnix. Soon afterward they came upon a camp which the robbers had hastily abandoned. There they found three Winchester rifles and three horses. Not long after this they overhauled one of the bandits, whom they called upon to throw up his hands. He turned upon the officers and fired, but a charge of buckshot from the sheriff's gun brought him to the ground. The prisoner, whose name is Frank Armour, was brought here, and it is believed he will recover. On Armour's person was found one of the watches taken from a street car man who was held up here a week ago.

PROBABLY FATAL ACCIDENT

BALTIMORE, Oct. 3. - During the baseball procession last night a serious accident | Three occurred, and that it did not result fatally to several persons is only little short of miraculous. When the parade had reached the corner of Lexington and Howard streets, the six horses attached to a heavy bus in which were a large number of people became frightened at the fireworks, and made a plunge into the crowd.

The streets at this point were a perfect jam of humanity, wedged in so tightly as to render it impossible for them to escape. Most of them being women and children made the matter worse. The horses, becoming more and more frightened at the screams of the people, reared, plunged and trampled them down in a frightful manner. When officers and others had secured the horses and succeeded in getting them off the sidewalk, eleven persons, mostly women and children, were found to be more or less injured.

Florence Ingle, aged 18, was taken out from under the horses' feet unconscious. and has since remained in that condition. It is feared her skull is fractured. Henry Kruchen, aged 15, had both his arms so badly crushed that amputation will be necessary. These two will probably die.


