Adopted October 1st, 1894. SECTION 1—That whatever is dangerous to suman life or health, whatever randers the air, or food, or water, or other drink unwholesome.

The following named diseases are deciared to be communicable and dangerous to the public health, viz: small pox, cholera, scariet fever measles, diphtheria, diphtheritic croup, or diptheric sore throat, typhoid fever, typhus fever, yellow fever, spotted fever, relapsing fever, epidemic dysentery, hydrofobia, glanders and leprosy, and shall be understood to be included in the following regulations unless certain of them only are specified.

SECTION 6.

Whenever any householder knows that any person within his family or household has a communicable disease dangerous to the public health, or whenever any physician find that any person whom he is called upon to visit has a communicable disease dangerous to the public health, he or she shall immediately report the same to the board of health, the secretary shall notify the teachers of every school, requiring them to dispense with the attendance of all pupils residing in the family in which such disease exists.

SECTION ? No person shall within the limits of this bororugh, unless by permit of the board of health, carry or remove from one building to another, any patient affected with any communicable disease dangerous to the public health, nor shall any person by any exposure of any individual so affected, or any article camble of carrying contagion or infection, or by any needless exposure of himself or herself, cause or contribute to the spread of disease from any such individual or dead body.

SECTION 8. Members of any household in which small pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever or measles shall exist, shall abstain from attending places of public amusement, worship or education, and as far as possible from visiting other private

The clothing, bed clothing and bedding of persons who have been sick with any communicable disease dangerous to the public health, and the rooms which they have occupied during such sickness, together with their furniture shall be disinfected under the direction of the board of health.


