M. Casimir-Perier, of the French Republic, Tired of Office.

M. BRISSON MAY SUCCEED HIM

The Retiring Statesman Refused to Listen to the Appeal of His Ministers to Induce Him to Reconsider His Action.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—It was announced last night that M. Casimir-Perier, president of the French republic, had resigned office.

During the evening M. Casimir-Perier conferred with the president of the senate, M. Challemeil-Lacour, and announced his intention to resign.
