A PRESIDENT RESIGNS.

M. Casimir-Perier, of the French Repulsio, Tired of Office.

M. BRISSON MAY SUCCEED HIM.

The Retiring Statesman Refused to Listen to the Appeal of His Ministers to Induce Him to Reconsider His Action. Cause of His Retirement.

Paris, Jan 16 .- It was announced last night that M. Casimir-Perfer, president of the French republic, had resigned office. During the evening M. Casimir-Perier conferred with the president of the senate, M. Challemel-Lacour, and announced his intention to resign. M. Challemel-Lacour employed his utmost eloquence in a vain endeavor to persuade the president to reconsider his decision. All the members of the cabinet, from Prime Minister Dupuy downward, followed M. Challemel-Lacour and exhausted every argument to induce M. Casimir-Perier not to resign. Their efforts were without success. Then the president's mother, 80 years old, was sent to appeal to her son, but she too was un-

A second official note was issued at midnight officially announcing the resigna-

tion of President Casimir-Perier and forecasting the ideas he intends to develop in his farewell address to the chamber of deputies. The note says that, in the eyes of the president, Monday's sitting of the chamber, and the vote which overthrew the cabinet, were only secondary incidents of the struggle which is proceeding against the parliamentary regime and public lib-erties. M. Casimir-Perier had hoped that the president of the republic, who is deprived of means of action, would have been exempted from party attacks, and that the political confidence of the Republicans would have accorded him power and authority. He had also hoped that those who, despite himself, had placed him in a position where he was unable to defend himself would have undertaken the defense of the first magistrate.

Continuing, the note says that the president has requested the ministers to temporarily withdraw their resignations in order to facilitate the necessary changes.

On Nov. 4 last M. Gerault-Richard was sentenced to serve a term of one year's imfor publishing an article in Le Chomard strongly reflecting upon President Casimir-Perier. On Dec. 2, when a by-election was held to fill a vacancy in the first constituency of the Third district, M. Gerault-Richard was put forward as a candidate. and after a reballot was elected. Shortly afterwards, on Jan. 10, there

was a discussion of a heated nature in the chamber of deputies on the question of re-leasing M. Gerault-Richard from prison, in view of his having been elected a memher of the chamber of deputies, and Premier Dupuy declared that his ministry would resign if his release was voted by the chamber. The premier's threat to resign had the desired effect, and the proposal was rejected. But the debate on the motion is said to have affected President Casimir-Perier very strongly, and he fretted under the criticisms.

There was another matter which served to irritate President Casimir-Perier conmiderably, and that was the election on Dec. 18 of M. Henri Brisson to the presidency of the chamber of deputies, in succession to the late M. Burdeau. M. Brisson, it will be remembered, polled the highest number of votes, after M. Casimir-Perier, in the election of a chief magistrate of France, and he was known to be strongly opposed to retaining M. Gerault-Richard in prison and in favor of amnesty for all political crimes. Consequently, his re-election, on Jan. 8, to the presidency of the chamber of deputies, was looked upon in many quarters as being a decided rebuff to President Casimir-Perier.

The chief candidate for the presidency is M. Brisson. Congress may desire to re elect M. Casimir-Perier, but as he is sick of the presidency he will in all probability refuse to allow the use of his name.

Our Negotiations with Spain. MADRID, Jan. 14.-The council of minfsters has agreed upon a modus vivendi under which the United States will obtain the second column of the Cuban tariff in exchange for the concession to Spain and Cuba of the "most favored nation" treatment. The only point remaining unsettled is the duration of the modus vivendi, which will be decided by the ministers and Mr. Hannis Taylor, the American minister. The negotiations will continue for a

BROOKLYN'S CAR STRIKE.

A Few Little Outbreaks Promptly Sup-

pressed by the Police. BROOKLYN, Jan. 16.-The second day of the big trolley strike was not characterized by much excitement. There were many little clashes between the police and the strikers, but nothing of a serious nature in the way of a riot occurred. Up to noon everything was comparatively quiet. After that hour, however, the strikers let themselves out a trifle, and the police had some difficulty in keeping the great crowds

under restraint. The chief trouble of the day occurred at the Atlantic Avenue company's barns at Twenty-fourth street and Fifth avenue. This was about 2 o'clock, when an effort was made to run a car to Ninth street. Five or six thousand strikers and sympa thizers had gathered at this point, and although the car was surrounded by a police guard it was found impossible to proceed

until the mounted squad was ordered out. Great excitement was also occasioned at this point shortly afterwards on the arrival of a wagon containing thirty-five men who came to take the strikers' places. Stones and sticks were hurled at the newcomers, but no damage of any importance was done. At Prospect Park plaza a mob, numbering 3,000, held up a mail car and attacked the guard, but the arrival of a

squad of police put an end to the hostilities. President Norton, of the Atlantic Avenue trolley system, declared last night that he would have his road in operation today regardless of the efforts of the strikers. This, however, the strike leaders discredit, claiming that the railroad officials have not been able to secure men from outside cities, and that if help has been secured it is from inexperienced men inca-pable of properly handling the cars.

Terrible Sufferings of Firemen. BRADFORD, Pa., Jan. 14 .- Early yesterday morning fire broke out in the Sheehan House, 99 Mechanic street. The conflagration is said to have been caused by an

overheated stove. Some of the hydrants were frozen, and before they could be used the fire had spread so rapidly that a general alarm was sent in, the whole department responding promptly. The fire raged flercely for four hours, and before it was subdued had gutted seven buildings, including the big Columbia block and the Nusbaum block. The total loss is estimated at \$150,000, on which there is about \$43,000 insurance. The thermometer registered below zero, and a hundred firemen were frostbitten. The condition of two of them is critical.

Two Killed at a Baltimore Fire.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 16 .- During a fire at 13 West Biddle street early in the morning Thomas Whitridge attempted to carry his young wife down a ladder which the firemen had run up. He lost his balance and both fell to the ground and were killed. Mr. Whitridge was a son of John A. Whitridge, with whom he was connected in the banking and brokerage business. He and Mrs. Whitridge were leaders in Baltimore society. They were married only last April. Mr. Whitridge was consul to Chile and vice consul of Denmark in this

Homestead Men Deflant.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 16.-The wholesale di charge of workmen by the Carnegie con pany at Homestead for attending th meeting on Sunday has aroused a feelin of resentment that bids fair to bear fru this evening, when another mass meetin will be held in the Opera House. The externant is interest and the action of the company is denounced on all sides. Th 100 discharged men are encouraged in th belief that a powerful organization will b effected soon and another strike inaugu rated.

Bank Thief and Suicide.

DOVER, N. H., Jan. 15.-Isaac F. Abbott cashier of the Dover National bank, con mitted sticide by shooting at his home this city late yesterday afternoon. The suicide was the result of a discovery by Bank Examiner Dorr of a shortage in hi accounts of between \$75,000 and \$90,000 The finances of the city, which he handled as city treasurer, may be involved, and the books of the bank have been destroyed or hidden where they cannot be found. Abbott was also city treasurer.

Denver Officials Indicted.

DENVER, Jan. 16 .- The United States grand jury returned true bills against Hamilton Armstrong, chief of police; Kate Dwyer, matron of the city jail, and Denks Mullens, president of the fire and police board, on a charge of embezzling and opening letters addressed to Sadie W Lickens, while she was employed as police matron. The letter, it is said, was opened with the expectation that it would compromise Mrs. Lickens.

Nine Persons Drowned.

GALVESTON, Tex., Jan. 16 .- A special from Velasco says it is now definitely known that Captain Fred A. Brock and his wife and two children, of Galveston, with five members of the crew on the dredge boat Mount Waldo, which Captain Brock was bringing from Tampico to Veasco, were drowned in the lifeboat which they took to escape from the dredge boat in a storm a few hours out from Tampico on Tuesday night.
