MINISTER GRAY DEAD.

Our Representative in Wexico a Victim of Pneumonia.

DIED ON REACHING HIS POST.

The Diplomat Was Taken from the Train in an Unconscious Condition on Reaching the City of Mexico, and Never Ral-Hed-Brief Sketch of His Career.

CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 15 .- United States Minister Gray arrived here yesterday morning via the Mexican National railway with a severe case of double pneumonia. The Pullman car conductor found him unconscious at 2 o'clock in the morning. He was carried from the train on a stretcher to the American hospital, where Dr. Bray informed Mrs. Gray that he would not live the day out. Mr. Gray had

Though everything was done that medical skill should suggest the American minis ter never regained consciousness, and at 7:10 last evening he passed quietly away. Consul General Crittenden, who was sent for as soon as Minister Gray arrived, was with him to the end.

Isaac Pusey Gray was born in Chester county, Pa., Oct. 18, 1828. His ancestors all belonged to the Society of Friends, his great grandfather having emigrated from England with William Penn and settled in Chester county. His parents moved from Pennsylvania to Urbana, O., in 1836. Thence to Montgomery county in 1839, thence to New Madison, Darke county, in 1842. There they died. Isaac P. Gray received a common school education, and being ambitious and of studious habits he early entered upon the study of law. His poverty, however, compelled him to accept a clerkship in a mercantile house at New Madison. Here his close application and strict integrity soon raised him to a partnership in the business, and in a few years he became sole proprietor in the establishment.

In 1855 he removed his family to Union City, Ind., where he resided for many years, and where, after successfully continuing the mercantile business for a few years he entered upon the practice of law. Mr. Gray was colonel of the Fourth Indiana cavalry in the civil war. He made a good record and remained until discharged on account of ill health. Returned home, he regained his wasted ener-gles and regulisted. In 1866 he was se-

ected as the candidate for congress against Rich, upon recommendation of the pardon

MURDERER GENTRY ARRESTED. Found Lying Unconscious on a Doorstep

from Exhaustion and Exposure. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18.-Madge Yorke, a soprano singer with the" Baggage Check' company, was shot and almost instantly killed by James P. Gentry, a comedian of Collier's "Back Number" company, at Zeise's hotel, last night. Madge Yorke's real name is Miss Drysdale. Gentry had

been her accepted lover, but she had jilted him for another. This led to the tragedy. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 20.—James B. Gen-try, the murderer of Madge Yorke, the actress, was found unconscious on a doorstep at Thirty-third and Columbia avenue shortly before 1 o'clock this morning. A patrol wagon was summoned, and he was taken to the German hospital, where he soon afterwards regained consciousness disclosed his identity, and acknowledged himself the murderer.

An examination by physicians revealed two incised wounds, penetrating the lungs. Gentry explained these by saying that he had attempted to commit suicide by stabbing himself with a penknife, but the knife broke or he would have persisted in his attempt. He had \$9 on his person, but said he had had nothing to eat for two days except snow, because he was afraid to go anywhere. He had been wandering about the park since Sunday night, and had fallen in the corner where was found from sheer exhaustion.

Gentry is also suffering from a com-pound fracture of the skull, and is se-verely bruised and wounded. These in-juries, he says, he got in jumping from the fire escape in the rear of Zelsse's hotel after the commission of the crime. The physicians at the hospital say that he is in a very dangerous condition.

In one of his pockets were found two tel-egrams, signed "Madge." One of these said: "Will meet you in New York; unable to come today on account of rehearsal." The other told him that she would be in Chester, Pa., on the 14th inst., and in Philadelphia on the 16th. Both were signed: "With love, Madge."

ANOTHER MINE FATALITY.

Five Men Dead and Six May Die as the Result of an Explosion.

ASHLAND, Pa., Feb. 19 .- An explosion of gas which will probably result in the death of at least eleven miners occurred yesterday in the West Bear Ridge mine, at Mahanoy Plane. Five men were taken out dead and six so seriously injured that their lives are despaired of.

The dead are: Peter Kline, aged 40 years, of Ashland, leaving a widow and six children; Joseph Pitts, aged 20, of Girardville, unmarried; Thomas Durkin, aged 35, of Girardville, leaving a widow; Bernard Reed, aged 40, Mahanoy Plane, widow and five children; Peter Greenback, aged 40, of St. Clair, widow and four children.

The seriously injured art: W. Minnich and William Goff, of Ashland; Anthony Meyers and Edward Davis, of Girardville, and John Laney and William Davis, of Mahanoy Plane. Besides these several other miners were badly burned, but it is hoped that they will recover.

A gang of men was engaged in driving an air course when they broke through into a breast containing a large volume of gas. This was ignited by the lamps the men carried, and a terrific explosion followed, setting fire to the timbers in the air course, and causing a general stampede among the miners employed in that section.

Two years later he was elected to the state senate, where he remained four years. In July, 1870, he was tendered the consulate at St. Thomas, West Indies, but declined the honor. As a young man he was a member of the Whig party, but acted with the Republicans during the war.

Since 1871 he has been an active member of the Democratic party, serving as a member of the Indiana delegation to the Liberal Republican convention in 1872. He was nominated by acclamation on the Democratic ticket for lieutenant governor. was elected to that position in 1876, and was renominated for the same place in 1880 by the state convention.

In 1884 Mr. Gray was elected governor of Indiana on the Democratic ticket, and served his full term. After retiring from that office he followed the practice of his profession in this city in partnership with his son, Pierre Gray, until he was called to the Mexican mission by President Cleveland about two years ago.

Killed by His Aged Wife.

WEST PLAINS, Mo., Feb. 20 .- The story of a peculiar murder comes from Marian county, Ark. Samuel Cowles, an old man from Illinois, was found dead nearly a mile from home. It is alleged that his wife had chased him from the house with a harrow tooth, with which, it is claimed, she inflicted several wounds which caused his death. The bloody instrument and other signs of murder were found in the house. Other evidence was adduced incriminating his wife, who was arrested and lodged in the Yellville jail. Cowles was 77 years old, and his wife is 73.

Life Imprisonment for Robbery.

OROVILLE, Cal., Feb. 20.-Martin Meyers, the aged convict who held up and robbed the Forbestown stage coach on Saturday last, and who was captured on Monday, pleaded guilty yesterday and was sentenced to the penitentiary for life. As an excuse for his crime he said he had been unable to sell his mines, located in British Columbia, and that he had concluded that the quickest way of obtaining money, which he badly needed, was by robbery He is 65 years of age.

Foreigners Released on Parole.

TIENTSIN, Feb. 20.-Official news from Chefoo is to the effect that all the foreign officers who fought against the Japanese at Wei-Hai-Wei except John Wilde, the American who violated his oath not to help China, have arrived at Chefoo on parole. It is stated that some of the Chinese torpedo boats at Wei-Hai-Wei deserted to the enemy.

Bold Attempt to Rob a Bank.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 20 - A bold but fruitless attempt to rob the bank at Azusa was made about midnight Cashier Danicls was in the bank when two men effected an entrance. A lively exchange of shots followed, and Daniels fell with a bullet in his shoulder. One robber was captured.

Moscow, Feb. 20.-While a number of students were skating on the Moskvariver the ice gave way, and thirty of them were plunged into the water and drowned. None if the bodies have yet been recovered.

Killed by a Bursting Gun.

SANDY HOOK, N. J., Feb. 20.-Fremont P. Peck, first lieutenant of the ordnance corps, was killed at the proving ground yesterday afternoon by the bursting of a breech of a rapid firing gun. The test of a 4 7-10 inch Hotchkiss rapid firing gun was under way, and two rounds with fixed ammunition had been fired by Lieutenant Peck. As the lieutenant pulled the trig-ger for the third round the breech of the gun burst and the breech block flew backward, fragments striking Lieutenant Peck on the face and side. His injuries were such that he died within fifteen minutes. Sergeant John Thorpe was slightly injured in the leg.

PITTSBURG, Feb. 18 .- A wreck occurred last night at 10 o'clock at the Rankin crossing between the eastern express on the Baltimore and Ohio and a trolley ear on the Braddock and Rankin branch of the Second Avenue Electric line which resulted in the death of Miss Anna Cusack and the severe injury of William Jones, both passengers on the electric car. Miss Cusack's head was cut entirely off and her body horribly mutilated. William Jones had his arm crushed and head badly cut. All the others were bruised or slightly cut by flying pieces of the wrecked car.
