SKETCH OF THE FIRST COM-PANY.

The Organization of the Logan and Undine Fire Departments-Some of the Charter Men bers-The Present Organizations and Members.

In connection with Bellefonte's forthcoming centennial anniversary will be the magnificent display of firemen by the Firemens Association of Central Pennsylvania. In previous issues of the DEMOCRAT we gave interesting scraps of local history of Bellefonte, This week we devote especial attention to the brave firemen of the past and the present. The following account is from Linn's history of Centre county:

EARLY FIRE PRECAUTIONS.
