

SEASHORE EXCURSION.

\$8.65 for the Round Trip via Pennsylvania Railroad.

The Pennsylvania railroad company, whose object always is to give its patrons the cheapest rates compatible with good service, has arranged for a series of excursions to the seashore, similar to those which were so popular last season. Atlantic City is the most popular resort in America, and Cape May, Sea Isle City and Ocean City do not fall far short of Atlantic City's high standard. The excursions will leave Pittsburg July 18, and August 1, 15 and 29, and the rates will be as follows: Pittsburg \$10, Altoona \$8, Tyrone \$7.65, Clearfield \$8.90, Bellefonte \$8.65, Huntingdon \$7.10, Millifin \$5.65, proportionate rates from other points.

The tickets will permit of a stay of nearly two weeks, and a choice of either of the seashore points named above will be allowed. A special train of parlor cars and day coaches will leave Pittsburg on each of the above-mentioned dates at about 8.50 a. m.

Hearing Friday Morning.

On Tuesday five women and young ladies of Axeman were brought before Justice Keichline, on the charge of committing an aggravated assault upon Mrs. Sophia Dougherty of Axeman, on Monday the 17th. Since that time Mrs. Dougherty has been confined to her bed and according to the physicians has many severe bruises on her, and was considered in a critical condition for a time. Mrs. Dougherty was unable to be at the justice's office. The five ladies are Mollie Mallory, Lizzie Mallory, Kate, Agnes and Anna Kane. They asked for a hearing and the justice fixed upon next Friday for the same. Ex-Sheriff Ishler and Treasurer John Q. Miles were furnished as bail for their appearance.

The women said that Mr. Dougherty and wife had slandered them repeatedly, and that Mrs. Dougherty came towards them with a club to strike them; they took it from her and gave her a few snacks with a stick, and that in running away she stumbled over the side of the bridge and sustained the injuries complained of. They deny having committed a serious assault upon Mrs. Dougherty, and say she was at fault in provoking the disturbance.

Not the Man.

For some time the authorities have been on the watch for a man by the name of George Windish, who is wanted for the murder of his wife at Pittston, Pa. A reward of \$100 was offered for his detection. One day last week a man came to Hublersburg and seemed to answer the description of Windish. Constable Jacob Walke held him upon suspicion and he was brought to the county jail for safe keeping. The authorities at Pittston telegraphed to hold the prisoner and send several of his photographs. Shaeffer, the photographer, took several good views of the prisoner and to which he did not object in the slightest degree.

The prisoner gives his name as Francis Argust, of Scranton, and says his wife is still living though he is not living with her. He laughs at the idea and says he is not worried, that the authorities will not want him. On Monday evening a dispatch came from Pittston to release the prisoner as he was not the man.

Post Office Changes.

In making the annual rearrangement of salaries of presidential postoffices, based on the report of the business done last year, there were a number of changes affecting Pennsylvania offices. Lewisburg was raised from third to second class. These salary increases were made: St. Mary's from \$1,300 to \$1,400; Selins Grove from \$1,200 to \$1,300; Sunbury from \$2,000 to \$2,100; Tyrone from \$2,100 to \$2,200. These salary decreases were made: Altoona from \$2,900 to \$2,800; Hollidaysburg from \$1,700 to \$1,600; Millifintown from \$1,300 to \$1,200; Millersburg from \$1,400 to \$1,300; Newville from \$1,400 to \$1,300.

Chautauqua at Mt. Gretna.

The Fourth Annual Assembly of the Pennsylvania Chautauqua will be held at Mt. Gretna, from July 1 to August 2, 1895, and the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will sell excursion tickets to Mt. The total attendance this year was 407 and the prospects for a larger attendance next year are very bright.
