## REPUBLICAN SWEEP.

Maryland Goes Republican by Twenty Thousand.

#### NEW YORK AND NEW JERSEY

Also Add Their Votes to the Republican Column.

BUSHNELL'S BIG VOTE IN OHIO.

McKinley's State Gives the Republican Candidate a Plurality of Ninety Thousand Votes-Tammany Wins the Municipal Fight in New York City-Amos Cummings Wins His Fight for a Seat in Congress - A Republican Plurality in Pennsylvania of Over 150,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6.—Returns received up to midnight indicate that Benjamin J. Haywood, rep., has been elected state treasurer by over 150,000 plurality, a Republican gain over 1893, which was also an off year, of about 15,000. This state also elects seven judges of the new superior court. Of these the six Republicans nominated are elected, as follows: James A. Beaver, Edward N. Willard, John J. Wickham, Charles E. Rice, Howard J. Reeder and George B. Orlady. The seventh man on the ticket is in doubt. The Dem-

### BUSHNELL'S BIG VOTE.

The Republican Candidate for Governor of Ohio Gets 90,000 Majority.

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 6-At midnight it was thought that the tidal wave of the past two years had continued in Ohio, although no estimates would be given. The Democratic state committee in comparing the vote with that of last year, when the Republican plurality was 137,000, shows Democratic gains, but not enough for them to claim any close result on the state ticket or more than one-third of the members of the legislature.

The Republicans in comparing the vote with that for McKinley and Neal for governor two years ago, are claiming that they will approximate the plurality received by McKinley and have two-thirds of the legislature. At the headquarters

they say they will poll a much larger vote than in 1893, and that the Democrats polled a much larger vote than that year. The total vote was about 850,000, the largest ever cast in the state. The Republicans say their plurality will not fall below

The Republican state committee now claim that the plurality of Bushnell will exceed the vote of 1893, with which year's vote they are comparing returns. are some at their headquarters who say that complete returns will show a Republican plurality almost equal to that of last year (137,000), the high water mark. The Republican state committee saw fit to make a conservative statement to those wanting to bet on over 100,000. Chairman Kurtz gave out the following:

"Returns received at midnight indicate that the Republicans have carried the state by a plurality not less than that given two years ago and elected a decisive majority of the members to the next gen-

eral assembly. Chairman Kurtz will not claim over 90,000 at the most. Others go higher. Mr. Kurtz does not estimate that the Republicans will have two-thirds of the legislature, but he says the Republican majority in both branches will be so large that the usual interest is not taken in ascertaining the exact number of Republican and Democrats on joint ballot for United States

At the Democratic headquarters an an nouncement was made that the state had gone Republican by a decisive majority in the legislature, as well as by a large plurality on the state ticket. As both parties had the same financial platform, the silver question was not an issue in the campaign. The tariff was the only national issue between the parties. The Populists cast

Three of the Cabinet Officers Went Home

to Vote. WASHINGTON, Nov. 6 .- Owing to the unusual conditions prevailing in a number of the states and the uncertainty regarding the outcome intense interest existed at the Capitol in the results of the elections. Particularly was this the case with respect to the elections in New York, Kentucky, Maryland, New Jersey and Ohio, and the returns from those states were awaited with the greatest interest. Great crowds gathered in front of the newspaper offices last night and remained until the returns showed definite results at the storm centers. Others more fortunate visited the various social and political clubs, where special arrangements had been made for obtaining the latest infor-

President Cleveland did not make his appearance at the White Honse at all yesterday, but remained at his country home at Woodley. Private Secretary Thurber was on hand at the executive mansion, however, during the day and evening and received the bulletins that came over the special wire from the telegraph office. These were read by such of the cabinet officers as gathered during the evening, and dispatches of special significance were telephoned to the president at Woodley. Three of the eight cabinet officers, Messrs. Harmon, Lamont and Carlisle, had gone to their respective states to vote.

Up to yesterday the standing in the senate was as follows: Republicans, 42; Democrats, 39; Populists, 6; vacant, 1. Total, 88. As the result of yesterday's elections the Democrats will lose and the Republicans will gain a senator from Maryland and from Ohio, respectively. The other legislative elections do not appear to affect the standing in the senate, as Kentucky and Mississippi remain Democratic, the latter certainly and the former probably, while Iowa continues Republican. Utah choses two United States senators for the first time, but the complexion of the legislature is not yet certain. The Utah senators take their seats in the senate shortly after congress assembles. The changes in Ohio and Maryland will not affect the senate until March 4, 1897.

The Republican majority in the next Ohio legislature insures the retirement of Eellefonte, Pa., Oct. 27th, 1805. Senator Brice, dem., and the succession of a Republican. It appears to be settled that ex-Governor Foraker will be the choice of the legislature, as the state convention placed his name in the platform as the senatorial candidate.

The returns from New York and New Jersey show Republican gains. These legislatures do not elect United States senators this year, but as part of the legislatures hold over the present election is important in influencing those bodies, which will elect successors to Senator Hill of New York and Senator Smith of New Jersey, whose terms expire March 4, 1897.

### THE MASSACHUSETTS VICTORY.

Governor Greenhalge Re-elected and the Legislature Solidly Republican.

BOSTON, Nov. 6.-The question in Massachusetts from the first was one of majority, since the Democratic leaders admitted the re-election of Governor Greenhalge. How strong his indorsement would be was the point on which the two parties differed. Results show that the claims of the Republicans made prior to the election were well grounded, since Governor Greenhalge and the entire Republican ticket is indorsed by a plurality practically the same as that of 1894. The legislative department of the gov-

ernment is also solidly Republican, 33 of the 40 senators elected being of that political belief. This is a slight gain for the Democratic party, the senate last year having stood 36 Republicans and 4 Democrats. In the house of representatives the Republicans have practically the same majority as last year, which was an overwhelming one. The governor's council will contain but one Democrat as an ad visor in the executive chamber. In brief, the result is a clean sweep for the Republican party in the state, they having suffered in no way from the supposed defec-tion caused by the A. P. A. movement.

The Election in Utah.

SALT LAKE, Utab, Nov. 6 .- It will be 2 o'clock before any definite figures can be given on the result of the election in the city or state. The scattering returns so far received do not differ materially from those of last year, when the Republicans carried the state by 20,000. The Democrats claim the election of Roberts to congress, with even chances on governor, but give no figures to support the claim. The precincts heard from outside of Salt Lake and Ogden give Cannon, dem., for governor, 2,533; Walls, rep., 2,440. It is estimated that the Republicans have carried Salt Lake by 800 or 1,000 majority and elected Clendenning mayor. Ogden elects a Democratic mayor and five out of ten council-
