A Rise in Nails.

Then a keg of nails was purchased for 90 cents, now the same nails are sold for \$2.50 a keg. To-day another rise in the price of nails of all kinds goes into effect, which will average 15 cents on every keg. The increase has been due to the demand.

On Wednesday morning Mr. Isalah Coxe, died suddenly at Boalsburg. He was feeling unwell on the previous evening and laid down on the lounge, in the parlor. The next morning he was found in the same position but was dead. Mr. Coxe was about 66 years of age. He was the proprietor of the stage line between Oak Hill and Boalsburg. A wife and seven grown children survive him.

Mr. Coxe was an uncle to the famous Gen. Coxe of Ohio, who led the famous Coxe's army to Washington several years ago.

To Change the Trout Season.

A number of local anglers, of Allentown, will have a law introduced at the next session of the legislature to change the trout season, which now extends from April 15 to July 15. It is proposed to make the season from May 1st to August 1st. It is contended that trout have not a chance to get fat by April 15, and that the weather is not favorable to trout fishing so early. The change is approved by Superintendent Creveling, of the State Fishery.

Formerly Lived Here.

Rev. A. J. Myers died at Philadelphia on February 28. The deceased was a prominent Methodist minister and will be remembered by many Bellefonte people. He was here 8 or 9 years ago on a visit. He was the first Station Methodist minister in Bellefonte, as prior to his coming here it was a District Circuit. Aurand. The auditing committee reported \$113.89 in treasury, which was loaned to the missionary society without interest. Rev. A. H. Irvine, president of the Church Extension society, called the society to order. After transacting a considerable amount of business, and re-electing the old board of officers, the society adjourned and the business of the society was resumed. The report of the statistical committee revealed the fact that the church is increasing in numbers, 3,077 persons having been converted during the year. The number of accessions was 2,643; total membership, 16,489, a gain of 772; the amount of missionary money secured was \$7,417; total value of all property, \$371,118.

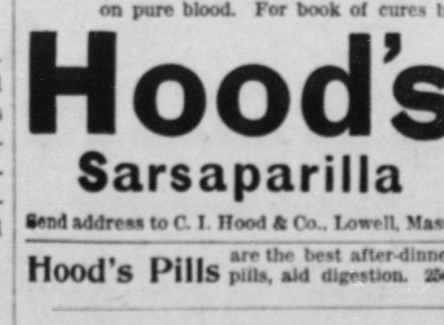
