CARLISLE'S POSITION.

The Secretary Not a Candidate for the Presidency.

ANXIOUS ABOUT THE PLATFORM.

While Not Authorizing His Friends to Present Mis Name to the Democratic Convention, He Urges Care in the Declaration of Party Principles.

WASHINGTON, April 6 .- Secretary Carlisle has written the following letter on the subject of his candidacy for the presidential nomination at the Chicago convention. It is addressed to Charles R. Long, chairman of the Democratic central com mittee of Kentucky.

"Your favor of March 30, in which you say, in substance, that many of my friends in Kentucky and elsewhere desire me to become a candidate before the approaching national Democratic convention for nomination for the office of president, and requesting me to give "some authoritative or definite expression" upon the subject, was duly received, and has been maturely considered.

"Many communications upon the same subject and of similar import have been received from friends in different parts of the country, and while very grateful for these numerous expressions of confidence and esteem upon the part of my Demo-cratic fellow citizens, I have not been able to reach the conclusion that the existing conditions require me to comply with their requests by authorizing them to announce me as a candidate for the presi

dential nomination. "While I feel a profound interest in the welfare of my party, I am much more concerned about its declaration of principles than in its selection of candidates, because, in my opinion, its failure or success at the election, as well as its capacity for useful service in the country in the future, depends upon the position it takes or omits to take upon the public questions now engaging the attention of the people, and especially the questions affecting the monetary system of the country and the character and amount of taxation to be imposed upon our citizens.

"Its position upon these and other subjects having been agreed upon, and clearly and distinctly announced, the convention ought to have no difficulty in selecting an acceptable candidate who will fairly represent its views, and in order that its deliberations may be embarrassed as little as possible by the contentions of rival aspirants and their friends I think my duty to the party will be best performed by de clining to participate in a contest for the nomination.

"The obligation assumed when I accepted my present official position require me to devote my entire time and attention to the public interests committed to my charge, and I shall continue to discharge the duties imposed on me to the best of my ability and in such manner as will, in my judgment, most certainly promote the true interests of the country; and if, in the opinion of my fellow Democrats in Kentucky, my services entitle me to their commendation and approval, I would regard their indorsement of my public course as an ample reward for the little I have been able to accomplish in behalf of honest administration and a sound financial policy."

Says Carlisle Would Accept. LOUISVILLE, April 6. - The Courie Journal publishes the following editorial on the letter of Secretary Carlisle: "The position which Mr. Carlisle takes is one entirely in accord with the dignity of the office of president and with the duties of the office of secretary of the treasury. He declines to participate in a contest for a nomination, holding that the matter of first moment is the declaration of the party's principles. He desires the indorsement of his services by the state, and, though he does not say so in so many words, if his state shall present his name to the national convention on a satisfac

tory platform he will undoubtedly accept." Jackson Assaulted in Court.

Newport, Ky., April 8 —Scott Jackson, the alleged murderer of Pearl Bryan, was before Judge Helm yesterday for trial. Upon the application of his attorneys the judge postponed the hearing until Tuesday, April 21. As Jackson left the court he passed in front of a woman sitting in the front row of seats. He looked down at her smiling, when the woman suddenly delivered a vicious kick at the prisoner, and as he passed beyond her she was heard to say: "I would have killed him if I could. If I had had a pistol I would have shot him." Mrs. McCann, of Falmouth, Ky., the woman who kicked Jackson, also gave him a vicious punch in the stomach with her fist. She remarked: "It's a shame to put off his trial; he ought to be hanged right away," and she added. "I'd like to help hang him myself."

The Red Cross Unmolested.

NEW YORK, April 8 .- The following cablegram was received by Spencer Trask yesterday from Miss Clara Barton, president of the Red Cross society, who is in charge of the relief work in Armenia; "Scourge of typhoid and other diseases from starvation and exposure unabated. Red Cross reports just received from our expeditions, which are meeting with splendid success. No obstructions nor Turkish supervision, as has been wrongly reported. Every facility offered. Welcomed everywhere. One party working between Marash, Zeitoun, Malatia and Harpoot. The other between Orfa, Diarbekir and Harpoot. Visiting towns and villages en route. Civing assistance where most needed.

Langdon Held for the Grand Jury. PHILADELPHIA, April 4 .- Coroner Ashbridge yesterday held an inquest into the mysterious death of Annie McGrath, and at the conclusion of the testimony the jury found a verdict recommending that Samuel P. Langdon, whose mistress the girl had been, be held to await the action of the grand jury. He was committed without bail. The physicians could give no reason for the girl's death, saying they had found no traces of poison in the stom-

ach, which indicated perfect health. Ex-Consul Waller Homeward Bound. LONDON, April 8 .- John L. Waller, formerly United States consul at Tamatave, who was released from prison at Nimes, France, on Feb. 21, is a second cabin passenger on board the American line steamer New York, which sailed from Southampton for New York on Saturday.

Russia to Own Port Arthur. LONDON, April 8 .- The Daily News' Odessa correspondent says: "It is generally understood that the formal cession of Port Arthur to Russia will be ratifled during Li Hung Chang's visit to Moscow."

* MAIL ROBBER NABBED.

Etole Valuable Packages While Employed as a Postoffice Clerk.

NEW YORK, April 8 .- Becoming emboldened by the successful theft of a bushel of foreign stamps from the packages which in the course of his duties he handled as a clerk in the second division of the foreign mail department in the general postoffice of this city, Timothy C. Mahoney developed into a crafty rogue of more valuable things. The contents of the packages which came into his hands he soon discovered paid him better, and could be appropriated with as much ease as the stamps on the outside which had carried them from all parts of the world. By his method Mahoney plundered a thousand or more incoming and outgoing packages before Chief Postoffice Inspector John E. Ashe and his assistants succeeded in discovering his modus operandi.

Yesterday the dishonest postal employe was practically detected in the act of rob bing the mails and when confronted with the damaging evidence found in his possession admitted the wrongdoing, which he said had been going on since last fall. In the furnished room which Mahoney rented on Henry street was found an as sortment of silk handkerchiefs, small articles of jewelry and a miscellaneous collection, including prayer books, rosary beads and scapulars, which represented a hundred or more robberies. Eleven pawn tickets for gold and silver watches, earrings, chains and pins explained the manner in which the robber disposed of the proceeds of his crimes. His only excuse for stealing the presents which had been sent from distant friends both here and abroad was that he was only getting \$600 a year

salary, and had to do something to live. The prisoner, when arraigned before United States Commissioner Shields, waived examination and was committed to Ludlow street jail in default of \$2,000

Schoolhouse Destroyed by Dynamite. BELLEFONTE, Pa., April 8 .- The little township of Curtin, about twelve miles from here, is in a turmoil of excitement over the burning and blowing up by dynamite of the district schoolhouse. feeling was aroused about two years ago over the selection of a site for the schoolhouse, and the courts had to decide the matter. One faction was still dissatisfied, and early yesterday morning about twenty men and boys set the building on fire. The other faction was soon on the scene and tried to quench the flames. The incendiaries were, however, hiding in the woods, and while some of their enemies were in the burning building they threw dynamite on the roof. The building was completely demolished, and those inside narrowly escaped with their lives. The two factions then engaged in a pitched battle in the darkness, and some of the participants were badly cut.

Pleaded Guilty to Manslaughter. BUFFALO, N. Y., April 8 .- Captain Jesse Graves pleaded guilty yesterday of manslaughter in the first degree, rather than stand trial for the murder of Captain Phillips and his son at Tonawanda last October. He was moved to do this in view of the verdict found against Captain George Hyde, who last week was convicted of murder in the second degree for the same offense. Quirk and Collins, also indicted for murder, pleaded guilty of manslaughter in the second degree. Today the nine men indicted for rioting at Tonawanda will be arraigned. In all probability all will plead guilty except Phil Perew, who has instructed his attorneys

Miss Pollard Unable to Collect.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 6.-Colonel W. C. P. Breckinridge has been quietly prac ticing law here ever since the suit for damages of Madeline Pollard two years ago caused him to be succeeded in congress by Colonel W. C. Owens. Although Miss Pollard got a judgment for \$15,000 she has never been able to get execution or to recover anything. Now that Colonel Breckinridge is canvassing the district again to run for congress this year, the old move ment of the ladies in the district is being reorganized and Colonel Breckinridge will have the women against him, as he had two years ago.

Is Cleveland the Logical Candidate? NEW YORK, April 8 .- The World prints a double leaded editorial today in which it asks whether the logic of the political situation that has led the Republican masses to support McKinley will not compel the nomination of Cleveland by the Democrats. The paper says: "The World does not assert that this is so. It raises the question. It invites public discussion of it. So far as The World is concerned in this matter it is entirely impartial, judicial and impersonal."

Thirty Thousand Made Homeless by Flame MADRID, April 6 .- A terrible fire has occurred at Manilla, in the Philippine islands, by which 4,000 houses were destroyed and 30,000 people left homeless. Manilla is the capital of the Philippine islands, and has a population of 100,600, or with the suburbs 160,000. It is one of the great emporiums of the east. It has frequently been visited by severe and destructive earthquakes.

Senator Morgan's Illness.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Senator Morgan, of Alabama, is lying ill at his residence in this city, suffering from a liver complication. He has not been well for the last fortnight, and has lately been compelled to keep to his bed. Rumors were current last evening that he was alarmingly ill, but in response to inquiries at his house reply was made that he was much better.

Allen Not a Presidential Candidate, OMAHA, April 8.—Senator W. V. Allen vesterday addressed a letter to Governor Holcomb declining to be a candidate on the Populist ticket for presidential honors. He exclaimed that others in the party deserved the recognition and his business would not permit of such an arrangement. In Nebraska it has been generally understood that Allen was a presidential can-

Desperate Outlaws Captured.

COFFEYVILLE, Kan., April 8 .- Two deputy United States marshals have captured a gang of five outlaws southwest of this after a hot fight, in which Oliver Books' horse was shot from under him and he was wounded before he would give up. The four uninjured prisoners were taken to Fort Smith, Ark.

Explosion Causes Twelve Deaths. BRUSSELS, April 6 .- The boiler of the steam tug Virginie exploded yesterday between the villages of Moerseke and Baerrode, on the Scheldt.
