EDITORIAL.

THE Clarion county republican convention endorsed Congressman Arnold for renomination and Senator Quay for the presidency.

F. H. CLEMSON, of Scotia, delegate to republican state convention, wears a McKinley pin, and says he is his own boss. This don't agree with Malin's recent interview.

It is simply a farce for the republican county chairman to invite the republican voters to express their preference for president, and then send delegates to the state convention in direct opposition to the popular sentiment of the party.

THE latest thing in the way of combinations is the Bicycle Trust, with a capital of \$8,000,000, which proposes to Toledo, Ohio. McKinley and trusts seems to thrive in Ohio.

FIRES are blazing in the forests in various parts of the country. The ravages of fire every year do ten times more injury than is repaired by the effort at restoration. This shows clearly that the first step toward reforesting waste lands must be in the nature of prevention. Adequate protection can only be expected if it be made the duty of certain officials to prevent the spread of fires, proper provision being made for the payment of expenses incurred and for punishment for failure to act.

MR. MALIN allowed himself to be interviewed in Harrisburg recently, and gave out the assurance that in the recent republican county convention: "the passage of the McKinley resolution was merely a compliment to the Ohian on account of his connection with the protection theory. He has many friends in the county; the same can be said of Senator Quay. The two delegates to the convention were not instructed for McKinley. REVOLT OF REPUBLICANS.

Serious Split in the Twenty-Eighth District

Conference. The bolt in the twenty-eighth district republican conference last Thursday has stirred up all the politicians in the five counties, Elk, Forrest, Clarion Clearfield and Centre. Although the two latter counties have nearly twice as many Republicans as the other three counties, they did not have enough delegates to control the conference. The three little counties combined, and Centre and Clearfield bolted.

The conferees from Elk, Clarion and Forest continued their conference after the withdrawal of the two other delegations and elected J. H. McEwen, of Elk, and H. R. Wilson, of Clarion, national delegates: S. S. Crissman, of Centre, and A. H. Woodward, of Clearfield, as alternates: Joseph Campbell, of Forest, was chosen Presidential elector.

Resolutions indorsing the candidacy of Senator Quay for President were unani-

mously passed. The six conferees of Clearfield and Centre held a meeting and drew up a formal protest. They claim they represent 10,882 republicans, while the other three counties represent only 6218 republicans. They scored the conferee system. The trouble at the bottom of the revolt was that Clearfield and Centre favor McKinley for President, while Elk, Forrest and Clarion are for Quay.

Chairman W. E. Gray, W. L. Malin and W. F. Reeder, Esq., were the delegates present from Centre county.

The fact that S. S. Crissman, of Philipsburg, is nominated as an alternate shows that he is not in touch with the Centre county delegates.

TALKING OUT.

Colonel Dunham, editor of the famous Howard Hornet, was one of the stalwart Arnold men who defied the Reeder people, but defiantly went down with colors flying. Last week he has his turn in the columns of that paper, and it is amusing to see him poke the business end of the Hornet into some of the fellows who don't quite agree with him in the congressional fight.

The Col. was for Arnold and has good reasons for taking the position. Among other things he says: "The time has gone by when four or five men in Bellefonte can dictate the republican nominations in this county. The people here-after will take the matter in their own hands. At this convention the dissemblers, prevaricators and schemers so plainly showed their hands that every honest republican can become disgusted at their acts. Even the venerable James P. Coburn who was president of the convention by his one sided rulings, disgusted his many friends and astonished the

QUAY DELEGATES.

There was quite a stir among leading republicans last week, and even previous to that. They were figuring on presidential politics and some fellows, who imagined that they "got there" with both feet, got left after all. We refer to the McKinley-Ouay fight.

Gov. Hastings and his crowd wanted Quay delegates from Centre county. Judge Love, the Gazette, chairman Gray and others wanted McKinley endorsed. There they differed. Next came a demand for a popular vote at the republican primaries. The Quay people opposed it, but the McKinley people won. When the vote was counted McKinley had about 75 per cent of the popular vote. This fact was announced far and wide.

When the county convention met Messrs. C. F. Deninger and F. H. Clemson were chosen as delegates to the state convention. No instructions were given them, but despite the sentiment of their party, they will vote for Quay. McKinley got the votes at the primaries, but Quay will have the delegates at the state convention. The McKinley gang feel very sore over this turn of affairs.

The Dale-Hastings combine won on the homestretch.

The McKinley crowd allowed their game to slip away from them after it once was captured.

ALLEGED FORGERS CAUGHT. Said to Have Secured \$20,000 from a Bank

in California. PHILADELPHIA, April 22. - Charles Beeker and James Cregan, the two alleged check forgers of international notoriety and who are said to have operated in every city of importance in this country, who were arrested here a few days ago on suspicion, will probably be sent to San Francisco to answer the charge of raising a draft of \$12 on the Crocker-Woolworth bank, of Woodland, Cal., to \$22,000, and obtaining thereby \$20,000 from the Nevada bank, of San Francisco. Counsel for the two banks in this city yester-day placed in Sheriff Clement's hands a foreign attachment under the fraudulent debtors act to recover the \$20,000. A confidence man now in prison at St. Paul, Minn., is said to have implicated the men. The criminal proceedings may follow the

serving of the writ. The men were arrested while on their way to South America, where it is believed they intended to work banks. The California banks were swindled in the latter part of 1895, and the fraud was only discovered recently. An alleged merchan-dise broker, A. H. Dean by name, obtained the original draft from the Woodland bank on Dec. 13, and when presented in San Francisco on the 17th it called for \$22,000. Of this amount \$2,000 was left standing, and the forgers fled. The raising of the draft was a fine piece of work, and could only be distinguished under a magnifying glass.

A Fiendish Grandmother's Life Sentence. OTTAWA, Ont., April 20 .- Mrs. Bell, for cruelty to her grandchildren, was on Saturday sentenced to life imprisonment. The charges against Mrs. Bell was that she had punished the two children, a boy of 14 and a girl of 15, with the most fiendish tortures which malignant ingenuity could devise. Stripping them to thinnest clothing she would soak in water, and then compel them to sit before open windows when the temperature was several degrees below zero until their attire was frozen stiff. On one occasion the boy was kept at work in the cold improperly clad until his toes were frozen and dropped off. They were fed with food mixed with noxlous fluids like kerosene, turpentine and

Burden Diamond Robbers Caught,

LONDON, April 18 -The arrests made on Bond street of William Dunlop, described as a valet, and William Turner, said to be a footman, are important ones. The prisoners said they left the employment of a gentleman in New York recently. In Dunlop's pocket the police found diamonds valued at \$15,000, believed to have been stolen, and a search of the room occupied by the prisoners resulted in the discovery of bracelets, tiaras, rings, scarfpins set with diamonds, emeralds and other jewelry estimated to be worth at least \$75,000. There is no doubt that the men are the persons guilty of robbing Mr. Burden, of New York, in December last.

Electrocuted on His Own Roof. PHILADELPHIA, April 22. - Linford L. Biles, a well known elderly down town citizen, who was foreman of the jury which convicted H. H. Holmes of murder in the first degree, was electrocuted at an early hour in the morning on the roof of his home, No. 1031 Tasker street, while in the act of handling a telephone wire which threatened to set his house on fire, and his George C. Biles, who went to his father's rescue, was so badly shocked by the current that passed through his dead father's body that he is now in a critical condition at St. Agnes' hospital.

The Ohio Cyclone,

FREMONT, O., April 22.-Full particulars of Monday's cyclone have just been secured after a careful tour of the entire district traversed by the storm. The fine farm residence and outbuildings on the farm of George Waggener were razed to the ground. Here it was, while shearing sheep in the barn, that John Lowe met his death. George Waggener and his 16year-old son were pinned between the timbers, and only liberated after hard work. Their injuries are not fatal. Mrs. John L. Johnson will probably die, while the others injured may recover.

More Trouble for Paster Brown. OAKLAND, Cal., April 29.-Rev. C. O. Brown, D. D., pastor of the First Congregational church, San Francisco, is again fighting for his ministerial existence. The Bay conference of Congregational ministers, angered at Brown's refusal to accept the slight censure imposed by the council which tried him upon charges of immorality and unministerial conduct, has preferred new charges against him, and reopened the old complaint. The new allegations state that the pastor is untruthful and unfit for the ministry.

Congressman Cobb Temporarily Unseated. WASHINGTON, April 22.-The house yesterday unseated James E. Cobb, Demo crat, representing the Fifth Alabama district and voted, 121 to 45, to seat Albert T. Goodwin, Populist, but the point of no quorum being made, the house adjourned with the final vote still pending. Five Republicans voted with the Democrats to recommit the case with instructions to the committee to permit the contestant to offer testimony in rebuttal.

England's Baby Farming Horror.

LONDON, April 20.-Mrs. Annie Dyer and her son-in-law, Arthur E. Palmer, the baby farmers, who were arrested at Reading last week on the charge of infanticide, were again arraigned in the Reading police court and remanded, pending the result of the further search in the river for bodies, which the police are making. A hundred missing infants are now connected with Mrs. Dyer.
