Alleged Attempt to Assassinate M. Faure, of France.

ESCAPED WITHOUT A SCRATCH.

The Man Who Did the Shooting Declares That He Fired Only Blank Cartridges. The President Perfectly Calm Threaghout the Exciting Incident.

PRESIDENT FAURE SHOT AT

By a Crank Who Has an Alleged Griev-

ance-No Earm Done. PARIS, July 15.-An attempt was made to assassinate President Faure yesterday. He had gone to Longchamps to review the troops, and had no sooner entered the field and fired a revolver twice at him. The shots did not take effect. The man had not time to fire again before the crowd closed in upon him and seized him, and but for the inter-vention of the police he would probably have been lynched.

Throughout the sensational incidents of the day and the exciting scenes that accompanied and followed the attempt upon his life President Faure maintained an outwardly placid demeanor, and manifested not the slightest sign of agitation.

The full name of the man who attempted to assassinate the president is found to be Eugene Marie Francois. His record proves to be well known and he has before been under the surveillance of the police.

He was dismissed from his position as foreman of the municipal works in June for sending threatening verses to the president of the municipal council. On June 29 he threw in the chamber of deputies a pamphlet entitled "Freedom of Writing in the Nineteenth Century Under Felix L. In the pamphlet he spoke of the abuses of the administration, and declared that attempts had been made to poison him wherever he went.

Both nominations were by acclama-The platform reaffirms loyalty to Republican principles as enunciated by the St. Louis convention, denounces the action of the St. Louis convention in unseating the Addicks delegation, and declares the Higgins state committee to be mere pretense." James G. Shaw, D. Mifflin Wilson and Daniel J. Fooks were selected as presidential electors. It is expected that the convention, headed by the Higgins delegates, which will be held at Georgetown tomorrow, will indorse the omination of Mr. Hoffecker for governor.

Attempt to Kill Ex-President Ezeta.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15 .- An attempt was made to kill Carlos Ezeta, ex-president of San Salvador, yesterday. As Ezeta was sitting at lunch in the dining room of his hotel Pedro Jimnes, a Salvadorean, walked up to the table at which Ezeta and the face of the ex-president. Ezeta sprang at Jimnes, who drew a pistol and pulled the trigger. The weapon did not discharge readily, and before the assailant could ac Jimnes was formerly district attorney of Salvador and incurred the dislike of Ezeta in the prosecution of a criminal. He has announced his intention of killing Ezeta because he had been imprisoned and tor-

Foreigners in Cuba Must Register. HAVANA, July 15. - Captain General Weyler has issued a decree that all foreigners in the island are to register in a special book in the government's charge previous to their being justified in appealing to Article VIII of the decree relative to foreign citizenship of November, 1884. Those not registering within thirty days, Captain General Weyler says, will lose their privileges and rights as foreigners. All consuls have been notified of this act. The reason given for issuing this decree is that native Cubans are taking advantage of the rights accorded to foreign citizens to escape penalties which they lay themselves liable to.

Two Old Ladies Burned to Death. BALTIMORE, July 15. - Mrs. Lucretia Woolford, aged 64, and her sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Schlemaker, 66 years old, were horribly burned at their home, No. 1210 Riverside avenue, and both died yesterday. The old ladies were about to retire for the night. A small kerosene lamp which the elder woman carried fell from her hand and exploded. The blazing fluid ignited their clothing, and when neighbors suc-ceeded in extinguishing the flames both women were burned almost beyond recog-

Great Damage by Cloudburst. LIMA, O., July 15 .- A terrific rain storm and cloudburst did an immense amount of damage in this city and vicinity yesterday.
