A PRESIDENT SHOT AT.

Alleged Attempt to Assassinate M. Faure, of France.

ESCAPED WITHOUT A SCRATCH.

The Man Who Did the Shooting Declares That He Fired Only Blank Cartridges. The President Perfectly Calm Throughout the Exciting Incident.

PRESIDENT FAURE SHOT AT By a Crank Who Has an Alleged Grievance—No Harm Done.

PARIS, July 15.—An attempt was made to assassinate President Faure yesterday. He had gone to Longchamps to review the troops, and had no sooner entered the field than a man in the crowd stepped forward and fired a revolver twice at him.

The name of the would be assassin is given as Francois. It appears that some time ago, in order to draw attention to a supposed grievance which he harbored, he fired a revolver in the hall of the chamber of deputies.

When it became known in the crowd that the president had not been hurt the greatest enthusiasm was shown. Cheer after cheer was sent up, and the people could hardly be restrained by the guards from crowding into the place where the president and his suite were standing.

Throughout the sensational incident of the day and the exciting scenes that accompanied and followed the attempt upon his life President Faure maintained an outwardly placid demeanor, and manifested not the slightest sign of agitation.

The full name of the man who attempted to assassinate the president is found to be Eugene Marie Francois. His record proves to be well known and he has before been under the surveillance of the police.

He was dismissed from his position as foreman of the municipal works in June for sending threatening verses to the president of the municipal council. On June 29 he threw in the chamber of deputies a pamphlet entitled "Freedom of Writing in the Nineteenth Century Under Felix L."

After the excitement of the sensational firing upon the president had somewhat subsided the incident began to be regarded as only the irresponsible and harmless act of a madman. But nevertheless several of the ambassadors of foreign powers and diplomats called upon President Faure to offer their felicitations, and sovereigns telegraphed their congratulations upon his escape.

Another man named Boulant was also arrested at the same time as Francois. When the latter had fired at the president and the crowd rushed at him with a threatening aspect, Boulant came to his defense.

DOVER, Del., July 15.—John H. Hoffecker, of Smyrna, was named for governor, and Jonathan S. Willis, of Milford, for congress, by the Addicks faction of the Republican party, in convention, yesterday.

Attempt to Kill Ex-President Ezeta.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—An attempt was made to kill Carlos Ezeta, ex-president of San Salvador, yesterday. As Ezeta was sitting at lunch in the dining room of his hotel, Pedro Jimmes, a Salvadoran, walked up to the table at which Ezeta and a party of friends were seated and spat in the face of the ex-president.
