DISSENTING OPINIONS.

Our republican friends are bitterly denouncing the democratic party for that portion of its platform which relates to the criticism of the supreme court.

"As I cannot escape the conviction that the decision of the court in this great case is fraught with immeasurable danger to the future of the country, and that it approaches the proportions of a national calamity, I feel it a duty to enter my protest against it."

Dissenting opinion: Brown, J. "Considered in all its bearings, this decision is, in my judgment, the most disastrous blow ever struck at the constitutional power of congress."

Dissenting opinion: Jackson, J. "It is, I submit, greatly to be deplored that, after more than 100 years of our national existence, after the government has withstood the strain of foreign wars and the dread ordeal of civil strife, and its people have become united and powerful, this court should consider itself compelled to go back to a long repudiated and rejected theory of the constitution by which the government is deprived of an inherent attribute of its being, a necessary power of taxation."

Dissenting opinion: White, J. "The practical effect of the decision today is to give to certain kinds of property a position of favoritism and advantage inconsistent with the fundamental principles of our social organization, and to invest them with power and influence that may be perilous to that portion of the American people upon whom rests the larger part of the burdens of the government, and who ought not to be subjected to the dominion of aggregated wealth any more than the property of the country should be at the mercy of the lawless."

Dissenting opinion: Harlan, J. Income tax cases, 158, U. S. Reports, pages 658 et seq.

Their denunciation of the repeal of the act is concluded in stronger language than that of the Chicago platform.

For School Libraries. Under the law, passed by the legislature in 1895, school boards in township as well as in the cities and boroughs, are empowered to levy a tax of one mill to establish school libraries.

Miss Maud Brickly is attending school at the Bellefonte Academy.

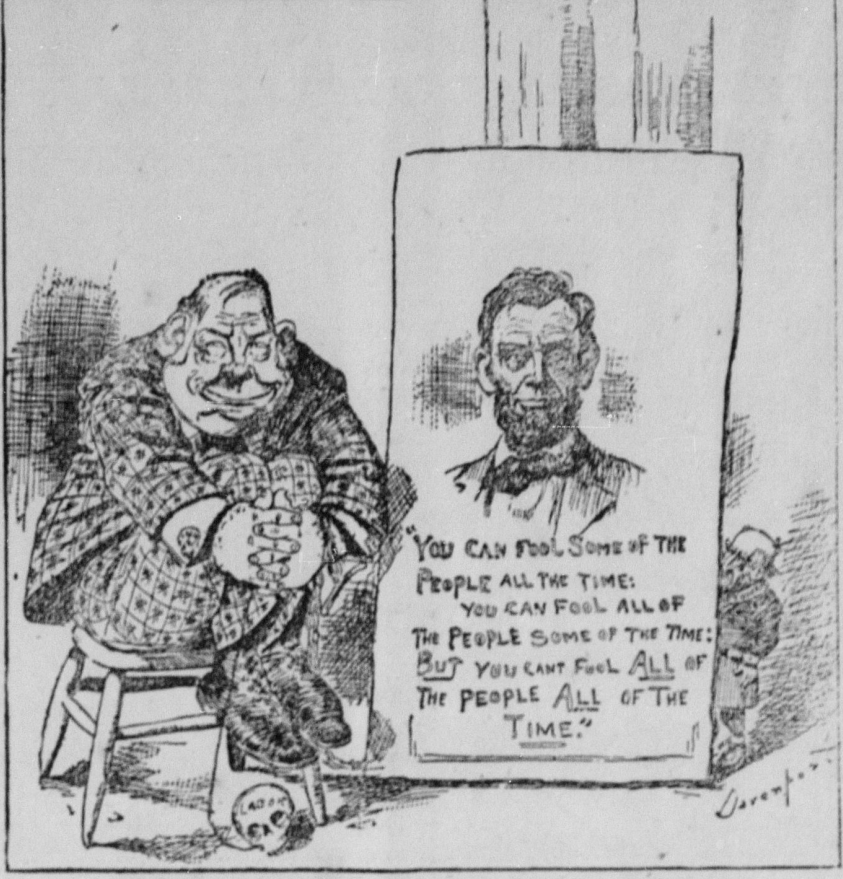
Mr. L. O. Packer is enjoying this fine weather with his best girl in Pennsylvally. Dick, how is the pear crop this season?
