INSULT TO MR. BRYAN.

Foolish Chicago Students Throw Eggs at His Escort.

A LONG DAY OF SPEECHMAKING.

Beginning at Seven O'Clock in the Morning, He Ended the Day's Work in Chicago at Nearly Midnight-Vice President Stevenson Takes Part in the Campaign.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28 .- While the Democratic parade in honor of the arrival of Mr. Bryan in Chicago was passing the corner of Michigan avenue and Monroe street yesterday afternoon several eggs were thrown at it by young students in the Metropolitan Business college. None of the eggs came near Mr. Bryan or his wife, and neither of them knew of the episode

until after the parade was over.

The Cook County Marching club, which was escorting Mr. Bryan, received the bombardment, and several Prince Albert coats and glossy black tiles were spattered with yellow. One or two eggs struck the sidewalk and the crowd was decorated accordingly.

Later in the afternoon a delegation from the Cook County Democratic club descended on the college with every hostility, and demanded that the students who had done the throwing be turned over to it. They held possession of the college for a time, and finally left without learning who the miscreants were. The police had no better success, and Mr. Powers, the owner of the building, who is also the president of the college, said that he did not know who had thrown the eggs, although he admitted that they came from the students in his institution.

"I would be very glad to hear that the police have arrested those who insulted Mr. Bryan this afternoon," said Chairman Mark Hanna, of the national Republican committee. "The act was a most disgraceful one, and deserves the condemnation of

every right minded person."

Mr. Bryan arrived in Chicago at 3:30 p. n. over the Alton road. The crush to see m was so great that the police had a difficult task to prevent people from being injured. The parade was waiting for him, and as soon as he appeared the march was taken up for the Battery D, on Michigan avenue

Entering the city from Brighton Park, where Mrs. Bryan appeared on the plat-form and distributed flowers, there were crowds at every street crossing until the Union depot was reached.

While the crowds were dispersing after the Bryan demonstration at the depot the sidewalk in front of No. 121 Canal street gave way, and nearly a hundred people were precipitated into the basement, a distance of twelve feet. Many received slight injuries. The most seriously injured were Patrick Houston, Michael Finan, Albert Powers and William Nolan, all middle aged men. None of them were fatally injured, but all will be confined to their beds for some time to come.

Mr. Bryan made fifteen speeches in the course of the day and night. Beginning at Lincoln shortly after 7 o'clock, he spoke at every town en route where the train stopped, and at every stopping place his reception was but a repetition of the scenes reported at other places. At Bloomington, the home of Vice President Stevenson, the demonstration was especially enthusiastic. There he was introduced to the audience by Vice President Stevenson, who said in part:

'When the times demand the man, the man appears. The times demanded a great leader, and the great leader has appeared. His campaign is the marvel of From the Atlantic seaboard, 2,000 miles westward, his living words have cheered the despondent, given new hopes and aspirations to all people, and touched the hearts of millions of his countrymen. In advocating his election we have kept the faith; we preserve the ancient Democratic landmarks, the landmarks of all the parties up to the assem-Wing of the St. Louis convention. We stand for honest money, the money of the

During Mr. Bryan's speech at Joliet some one shouted "What's the matter with Hanna?" to which Mr. Bryan laughingly replied that he did not believe he would be elected.

In the course of his speech at Battery D, in this city, Mr. Bryan said:

"I am not vain enough to believe that any part of the extraordinary enthusiasm which I have witnessed between the Missourl and the Atlantic coast is intended as a personal tribute. In this great contest it is the principles for which the candidate stands, and not the candidate himself, that has called forth this demonstra-

"There is only one thing for which I claim any credit. I believe that you and others who have expressed themselves as you have expressed yourselves have confidence that I will carry out the pledges which I have made in this campaign. It is simply your confidence that I will do what I have promised to do and carry out the ideas for which in this campaign I stand, and for this only, that I can claim

'I do believe that in this campaign a great question affects every man, woman and child in all this land, and when I see the people stirred as they have seldom been stirred before I believe that they appreciate the responsibilities of citizenship and they intend that their ballots shall be cast for that financial policy which they believe to be best for themselves, their neighbors and their country.

The Bible teaches us that when the children of Israel were in bondage and Maked for a little lightening of their bur-dens the Pharaoh of their time said: 'They are idle; make them work harder, and then they will not complain.' Pharaohs have been the same in all days. No matter to what race he belongs, no matter in what age he lives, Pharaoh lives on the labor of others, and Pharaoh always wants to stamp out complaints by making the

load heavier. "Your papers have called me a demagogue. If there is one thing I am not, it is a demagogue. A demagogue is defined as a man who advocates a thing which he does not believe in order to conciliate those who differ from him. A demagogue is a man who is willing to advocate anything, whether he believes it or not, which would be advantageous to him and gain him popularity. I have never advocated during my public life a single thing that I did not myself believe. I have

that I did not myself believe. I have proven my willingness to go down in defeat, when I went down, with my convictions, rather than rise by demagoguism."

Mr. Bryan made six other speeches in this city, concluding his day's work shortly before midnight, when he and Vice President Stevenson addressed a mountain metallic at Tatasmella. monster meeting at Tattersalls.
