**Cash Basis.**  
The coal dealers of Bellefonte have adopted the double standard: if you send cash with your order, a reduction of 20 cents will be made, otherwise list prices will be charged and collected, where it is possible. The effect of this is that all persons who are responsible, can keep down expenses by paying cash in advance.

We give our patrons a reduction of 33 1/2 per cent on the price of our paper, from \$1.50 to \$1.00 per year, when they pay in advance. About three-fourths of our list pay in advance, the others pay \$1.50 per year. That fifty cents extra must be charged to cover losses and expense of making collections. That is why it pays to be in advance. Take your choice.

**Death of James McSuley.**  
James McSuley, aged 57 years, died at his home on East Logan street, Tuesday morning at half past five. Mr. McSuley had been an invalid for five years, suffering from paralysis which finally resulted in his death. He was a painter by trade and a good one, one of the best in this part of the state. For several years he was a partner with Gibbons in the carriage business in this place and later employed in the Keystone carriage works at Williamsport. He leaves a wife, three sons and a daughter to mourn his loss. Namely: Joe, James, John and Mary.

**Store at Jacksonville Robbed.**  
When Nathaniel Rearick went to his general store at Jacksonville, Monday, he found that the door had been pried open during the night, and that burglars had taken from his store shoes and other articles that in the aggregate amounted to over \$250.
