Our dear sister was cheerfully preparing for the dedication of the new church near her home, which is to take place on Sunday, Dec. 13, 1896. She was very much devoted to her parents and had such a promising future before her, that it seems hard to realize that she has been separated from earth and earthly ties, but it is a blessed thought to know that she is in Heaven where there is no sorrow, but where all joy and gladness.

She was teaching her third term of school, the first term being in Clearfield county, and at the time of taking ill, was teaching her home school. The funeral was attended by a large concourse of friends and relatives. The remains were laid to their last resting in the Baptist cemetery, of Eagleville, on Sunday afternoon. Her pastor Rev. J. W. Forest, of the M. E. church, officiated and paid glowing tributes to the deceased sister. In speaking of her worth, Mr. Foster truthfully stated that there are few who can fill her place. He spoke very commendable of her as a daughter, a sister and a christian, and not forgetting to speak of her merits as an instructor. After singing one of Linnie's favorite hymns, "We'll never say good-by," Mr. C. V. DeLong made a few brief remarks, making mention of the fact that whilst Linnie will not answer to the roll call at institute, it is a blessing to know that, if faithful, we shall say, well done good and faithful servants, enter thou into the joy of the Lord.

To the bereaved family the community extend their sympathy and by way of encouragement would say, where they "Praise Him above, ye heavenly hosts," you can say, we have one singing with that innumerable throng.

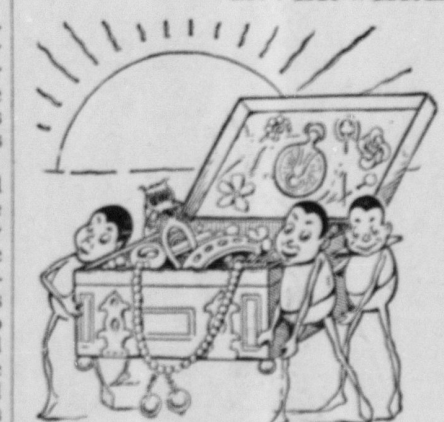
