John Davis Long was born in Buckfield, Me., Oct. 27, 1838. He graduated at





Harvard in 1857, taught till 1859, studied law, was admitted to the bar in 1861, practiced in Buckfield, and settled in Boston in 1862. In 1869 he removed to Hingham, but retained his office in Boston. He was a member of the Massachusetts house of representatives in 1875-78, and served the last three years as its speaker. In 1879 he was lieutenant governor, and governor in 1880-82. He was elected as a Republican to the Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth and Fiftieth congresses. Governor Long pub-lished a translation of Virgil's Aneid in 1879.

James Wilson was born in Ayrshire, Scotland, Aug. 16, 1835. He came to this country in 1851, re-

Long Says It Is "Fractically Settled."

HINGHAM, Mass., Feb. 3.-Hon. John D. Long was interviewed yesterday on the matter of his final acceptance of a cabinet portfolio. He said: "I do not consider that Major McKinley has made me a formal proposition yet. I so wrote him the other day. You see I could not ac-cept what has not been tendered. No doubt it is practically settled, but I have not yet been notified."

### Spanish Volunteers Badly Beaten.

KEY WEST, Fla., Feb. 3.-One of Colonel Hernandez's band met 300 Havana volunteers on Sunday, ten miles from Havana, and defeated them badly. The Cubans feigned a retreat and drew the volunteers into an am buscade in the sides of the road, from which they delivered a terrible fire. The volunteers fled and the Cubans pursued them almost to gates of Havana. A part of the blockhouse garrison there at-tempted to stem the torrent of Cubans. but was driven into their fort. The loss of the volunteers was over fifty men wounded, killed and missing, while half of the force returned to Havana unarmed. The Spanish officials have ordered all offloers of the corps to be tried by court martial for cowardice.

Knorr and Lloyd S. Wintersteen, two of the most prominent citizens of Bloomsburg, charged with attempting to blow up with dynamite on Sept. 10, 1896, the house and sleeping family of Hon. Levi P. Waller, was expected to come up, but did not. In all probability it will be continued for another term. Knorr, who is out on bail, has not yet put in an appearance, and is said to be in Canada.

BELLEFONTE, Pa, Feb. 1 .- A bad accident happened to a party of coasters in this city Saturday. While coasting down Allegheny hill at a rapid rate one of the sleds crushed with awful force into a tree. Fred Thompson, who was guiding the sled, was hurled against the tree and sustained severe injuries to his head, besides having his left hand broken and mangled and being injured internally. Five others were injured seriously, while ten others, who were on the same sled, escaped with slight wounds.

HARRISBURG, Feb. 2.- There was a lively fight in the house last night over the movement to investigate the state treasury and auditor general's office. After upward of a hundred bills had been presented the Mitchell resolution was read by the clerk, and without opposition the previous vote of the house, concurring in the proposition, was reconsidered, and Mr. Smith, of Philadelphia, offered as a substitute a resolution providing that an investigation of the banking methods of the treasury and auditor general's departments, which was adopted. The resolution provides that the investigators shall be president judges of Allegheny, Philadelphia and Dauphin counties.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Feb. 1.-Detectives Kline and Honeywell claim to have discovered some startling evidence in connection with the escape of Charles Shaffer. According to their story, the original plan was to secure the liberty of two murderers. One of the latter was Peter Wassell, alias "Terrible Pete." Wassell is accused of killing a number of men in his lifetime. He was convicted in the Luzerne county court of the murder of Anthony Cooper Savage. Wassell has some means, and it is claimed that his money is being used to secure his liberty either by fair or foul means. On the morning when Shaffer broke jail he was to have liberated Wassell by picking the lock on his cell door. At the last minute, however, the plot failed. Wassell's friends then made up a scheme to blow up the front part of the jail, with dynamite, and in the excit ment rush in and set Wassell and t other murderer at liberty, but was fru less. Two arrests have been made.
