CLOUD BURST.—The people of our community had quite a scare on Saturday, July 17, at 6 p. m. It was in the form of a cloud-burst. The rain came down in one solid mass of water and caused the over-flow of the stream, known as Big Run, which empties into Marsh Creek, about one fourth of a mile east of Wm. Robb's store. There was a great deal of damage done to the crops, the wheat in the shock suffering more than anything else. A stable belonging to John McCloskey was washed from its foundation and lodged against a tree which kept it from drifting with the swift current which was about eight feet deep. Many bridges, fences and other movable property were washed away. We do not welcome such showers but must take them as they come.

The bridge known as the George Bows bridge had been declared unsafe for driving, but no notices were up and very few people knew of the imminent danger that awaited them if they crossed it. When on the middle of the structure it suddenly gave way, the stringers breaking in succession, leaving the wagon and its occupants down so suddenly that Mrs. Rayhorn and the smallest child, a girl about 2 years of age fell out under the feet of the horses, while Mr. Rayhorn caught the other child in one hand holding the team with the other. As the planks had slid toward the middle of the bridge from both ends, it was a difficult matter to get out. Mrs. Rayhorn and child were seriously injured and they narrowly escaped from falling into the creek which was wild from the recent flood. None of them have any desire to experience such a thing again. The Supervisor of Liberty township should have repaired the bridge or kept people from driving over it.
