Death of Miss Belle Heverly. After a lingering illness of several months, Miss Belle Heverly died at the home of her parents Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Heverly, on East Bishop street at 4 o'clock Tuesday morning. Sometime during last April she contracted a cold that produced catarrh of the stomach and this developed into a severe form of consumption. For days and weeks the efforts of the physician provided all that medical skill could do to ward off the disease, but despite all this and the tenderest care, loved ones who constantly were by her bedside, she gradually grew weaker and weaker until the spark of life went out and the soul was summoned to its abiding place in the eternal home.

Miss Belle May Heverly was born at Axe Mann, December 7th, 1867, and died August 3rd, 1897, making her age 29 years, 7 months and 27 days. She leaves to mourn her loss her father and mother and three sisters and four brothers, namely: Mrs. Thomas Howley, Alice and Maggie, and Eimer, Alfred, Augustus and Edward. Interment will take place this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock. The services will be held in the Presbyterian church, of which she had been a member for the past ten years.

The Scaffolding Fell. Captain S. H. Williams has a large force of men at work at Hecla Park painting the new club house for the Nitytan Rod and Gun Club. Tuesday afternoon the scaffold on which Willis Williams and Ed. Eckenroth were at work fell, precipitating the two men to the ground some thirty feet below. Williams escaped uninjured but Eckenroth, while not seriously hurt was pretty badly bruised and cut up. He was brought to his home in this place in a carriage.

Successful Assembly. Last Friday evening a very pleasant social event took place in the Armory. It was the first of the series of assemblies given by the young people of Bellefonte. The large armory was handsomely decorated and looked exceedingly pretty on this occasion. Music was furnished by Lettan & Chappel's orchestra, of Williamsport. A large number of guests were present from adjoining towns. Two more assemblies will be given, on August 13th and 27th.

The Eclipse. Owing to the cloudy sky Thursday morning, the solar eclipse was not seen very satisfactorily here. Occasionally the shifting clouds would unveil the sun's face and allow the watchers, around with smoked glass, to catch a glimpse of the spectacle which is one of the most interesting in nature. The sun when visible looked like a big cookie with a bite taken out of it. This will be the last solar eclipse visible on this continent in the nineteenth century.

BUSINESS MEN'S PICNIC

On Thursday, August 12th, the business men of Centre and Clinton counties will hold a picnic at Hecla Park that promises to be a large gathering. All the leading business houses of Lock Haven, Bellefonte and adjoining towns will close that day to give their employees an opportunity for a day's outing. It will be an important gathering for the reason that a strong sentiment prevails for the effecting of a permanent organization to bring about the establishment of an inter-county Industrial Exhibition, at this point in the future.

The idea would be to continue the exhibition from one to three days. The mill property would be repaired by that time to afford ample room for display of all kinds of wares and goods, which would be liberally patronized by wholesale houses from the larger cities. We believe an industrial exhibit of this kind would prove a success under proper management.
