PREMIER ASSASSINATED.

Canovas del Castillo the Victim of an Anarchist.

KILLED IN HIS WIFE'S PRESENCE.

The Spanish Statesman Shot Down by a Fiend "In Accomplishment of a Just Vengeance," and as the Outcome of a Vast Conspiracy.

Madrid, Aug. 9 .- Senor Canovas del Castillo, prime minister of Spain. was assassinated yesterday at Santa Agueda by an anarchist. The murderer fired three shots, one of which struck the premier in the forehead and another in the chest. The wounded man fell dying at the feet of his wife, who was with him. He lingered in agony for two hours, and then passed away with the cry of "Long live Spain," which were the last words upon his

Santa Agueda is noted for its baths. The place is between San Sebastian, the summer residence of the Spanish



PREMIER CASTILLO. court, and Vittoria, the capital of the

province of Alava, about 30 miles south of Bilbao. The premier went there last Thursday to take a three weeks' course of the baths, after which he expected to return to San Sebastian to meet United States Minister Woodford when officially received by the queen regent.

After shooting the premier the murderer, who was immediately seized by people who were in the vicinity of the scene of the crime, was severely handled. He might have been killed had it not been for the protection afforded him by a number of civil guards, who ran to the scene of the assassination. The prisoner, who declared he had killed the premier "in the accomplishment of a just vengeance," at first gave the name of Rinaldi, and said that the deed was the outcome of an extensive anarchist conspiracy. Later, however, the assassin confessed that his real name was Michele Angine Golli, that he was 26 years of age, a native of Boggia, near Naples, and that he left Italy and came to Spain in 1896.

Senora Canovas, wife of the premier, who was but a short distance away from her husband when the crime was committed, rushed to his side upon hearing the shots. As the premier lay dying upon the ground she bitterly reproached the murderer for his crime. Golli, in reply to the agonizing words of the distracted wife, said: "I respect you because you are an honorable lady, but I have done my duty, and I am now easy in mind, for I have avenged

Last night Golli confessed that he killed Senor Canovas to avenge the Barcelona anarchists and the insurgent, Don Jose Rizal, who was executed at Manilla, Philippine Islands, on Dec. 30 last, as the instigator of the Philippine rebellion. Dr. Rizal denied that he was a rebel leader, but he admitted that he had drawn up the statutes of the Philippine league.

Golli was implicated in the terrible crime of the celebration of Corpus Christi, although he left Barcelona a few days before it occurred. He was denounced to the police for complicity, but he had already disappeared.

A dispatch from Rome says that Golli's name is not known to Italian police. No conviction is recorded at Naples or Lucera against a person of that name. Other dispatches from Rome, corroborated by a dispatch from Paris, say that the real name of Golli is Guiseppe Santo. If this is so it is a remarkable coincidence, for the name of the assassin of President Carnot was Cesaero Santo.

The Spanish cabinet, which convened promptly upon official news of the death of Premier Canovas del Castillo. published in the Official Gazette yesterday, which appeared with a black border, the appointment of Lieutenant General Don Marcolo de Azcarraga, the minister of war, as premier ad interim.

Senor Antonio Canovas del Castillo was born at Malaga, Feb. 8, 1828. He took the course in philosophy and law in the University of Madrid, and began his career as a journalist. In 1851 he made his debut, under the patronage of Senors Rios, Rosas and Pacheco, as chief editor of the Patria, in which he defended conservative ideas. About this time he published a volume of lyric poems and a series of historical papers. In 1852 he was named deputy for Malaga, and from that time to his death had never ceased to occupy a seat in the cortes. In 1861 he was called to the cabinet, and in 1875 became premier, since which time he had held the premiership frequently.

A Lake of Pearls. Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 11 .- For a month or more the people living near Bald Knob have been finding valuable pearls in a lake near that place. Hundreds of people have been opening mussel shells in search of the pearls, and some rare gems have been found, some being sold for as much as \$300. A syndicate of Memphis parties has leased the lake for a term of five years for \$10,000. They will build a fence around the lake and begin work with a steam dredger. The lake is said to be the States.

Carlisle, Pa., Aug. 9.-Russell Swords who shot his sweetheart, Miss Leidigh, at Mount Holly Springs a week ago, and escaped to the mountains, has been arrested and lodged in jail here. The slight wound he inflicted upon himself after shooting the girl grew worse, and he returned here for medical aid. Arrest followed. Miss Leidigh is recovering, and, it is said, will not appear against him.

Easton, Pa., Aug. 10.-Henry Shover, who a month ago nearly hacked the life out of his housekeeper at Wind Gap, and who was bailed out of jail, has made two desperate attempts to end his life. On Saturday he jumped from a second story window and was badly hure, and yesterday he jumped into a deep well. His relatives heard the noise and rescued him. His bail was surrendered, and he was taken to jail. He will be tried for the attempted murder next month.

Greensburg, Pa., Aug. 11 .- A hurricane passed over the eastern part of this county about 5 o'clock yesterday morning, doing great damage in its course, which was very narrow. The roof was blown off R. M. Dotty's barn. in Derry township, while Supervisor Marshal's barn, in the same township, was badly wrecked. Trees were blown down, small buildings destroyed and growing crops ruined in the path of the storm. It was the worst storm ever experienced in the eastern part of the county.

> Dubois, Pa., Aug. 9 .- Dwight Wilson, formerly of Aurora, N. Y., died from the effects of a gunshot wound late Saturday night, and there is a suspicion that he was murdered. Two weeks ago Wilson made his home with a man and women at Rathmel, near here. Saturday night the three were at Reynoldsville, and returned home early. At a late hour a physician was called to attend Wilson, and found him lying in front of the house with a bullet hole in his head and a gun by his side. The couple declared that he had shot himself. An inquest is being held.

Hollidaysburg, Pa., Aug. 11.-The Hollidaysburg postoffice was broken into by three masked robbers at 2 o'clock in the morning. Postmaster Barr, who sleeps in the room where the government safe stands, was awakened by the noise, but before he could give the alarm he was struck on the head with a bludgeon and beaten into insensibility. The thieves then proceeded to dynamite the safe Before they had accomplished the work Postmaster Barr regained his senses and called loudly for help. The burglars were frightened away before they had obtained any booty.

Huntingdon, Pa., Aug. 10 .- A terrific storm, which developed north of here, swept through the Juniata valley yesterday morning, doing immense destruction to outstanding crops and property. The full force of the storm centered at Mount Union, twelve miles east of here, where the East Broad Top Railroad company's engine house was demolished and the borough's brick school building was partly blown down. Orchards were leveled and the growing oats and corn ruined in many localities. West of here the telegraph and telephone lines were blown down, suspending all communication.

Hazleton, Pa., Aug. 11.-A peculiar case of safe dynamiting was discovered at Jeanesville last night, 24 hours after the deed was committed. James Correll, an Italian track walker, found an iron box containing Pennsylvania railroad bonds and other stock amounting to \$3,000 in favor of the Jeanesville Lodge of Odd Fellows. He took them to police headquarters here. Reporters called on the secretary of the lodge and the hall was visited, when it was found that the safe had been blown open. Easton Pa., Aug. 11.-Two men were richest pearl producer in the United frightfully injured at the stone quarry back of Mount Jefferson yesterday afternoon. Martin Lillis and George Weir, of South Easton, had laid a twelve foot hole with dynamite, but something occurred to prevent the blast going off, and the men went back and began digging out the load with a ten foot iron bar. When the bar struck the dynamite there was a terrible explosion, and the men were sent flying through the air. Lillie' right hand and Weir's left hand were blown completely off and the fingers of their other hands hung by shreds of torn flesh. Lillis also lost his left eye and was cut about the face.

CRISIS APPROACHING

In the Miners' Movement Against DeArmitt's Workers.

THE STRIKERS MOST ORDERLY.

They Still Claim That the Outlook Is Most Encouraging For Their Cause. Rain Interferes With the Proposed Marches on the Working Miners.

Pittsburg, Aug. 11 .- A crisis is fast approaching in the miners' movement against the New York and Cleveland Gas Coal company. The next few days should determine whether or not the strikers' object will be realized. The strikers still maintain excellent order, and claim that the outlook is most encouraging for them.

While yesterday's work is not viewed in a disappointing light by the campers at Turtle Creek, Sanday Creek and Plum Creek, yet yesterday's happenings were not of the most encouraging sort. They had to contend with their first spell of bad weather. A heavy rain drenched the camps and prevented the marchers from carrying out their regular program. At Plum Creek the rain and continued absence of a band kept the men in their quarters, with the result that little, if any, missionary work was undertaken.

The storm also had the effect of pre venting the march to the Spring Hill mines, between Wilmerding and Wall Station, which are owned by Alexander Dempster. The only march of the day was made by the 150 men at Camp Determination, who left camp shortly after 5 o'clock, and marching close to the Oak Hill tipples spent two hours in the vicinity of the miners' homes. There was not even ordinary excitement attached to the invasion along Thompson's Run. A summary of the day's development finds conditions much the same as they were on Monday, save that the company claims to have made a further break in the strikers' ranks at Turtle Creek and Sandy Creek. The Plum Creek mine was running considerable coal yesterday, and the number of men reported

The fallure to hold a meeting at ing feature of the day, and the men are loudly clamoring for the presence of the officials. The batch of Italians that struck camp on Monday are expected to do much good among their fellow countrymen at work in the Plum Creek mine, but active labors were withheld until today, when it will be positively known whether or not the men pro pose remaining away from the pits.

Yesterday afternoon District President Pat Dolan accused the operators of the Pittsburg district with having broken faith with the striking miners in this district. He also outlined the policy to be pursued by the United Mine Workers in their fight in the central Pennsylvania district, where it is proposed to close down all the mines. He cannot predict when the strike will be settled, but claims his organization can stand the strike until the last of September. The operators, he said, had promised to pay the price when the ly at DeArmitt's mines had been cut off. This has been done, but the operators had failed to keep their part

of the contract. The miners who have been working regularly at the Oak Hill mines were paid yesterday afternoon. Those who joined the strikers did not get their cash, the company holding it, as under the contract the men forfeited their wages by striking. There was no excitement. Between 300 and 400 employes were on hand, but few of them received any money. Mr. DeArmitt made a speech to the men, teling them he sympathized with them and that the money was withheld not because the company wanted it, but because it had to carry out the terms of the contract. He denounced the midnight marching and the encampment, and said it was a blot upon the history of the country that the laws are not enforced and such movements stopped.

Peacemakers to the Front.

Philadelphia, Aug. 11.-The Universal Peace Union yesterday offered its services as arbitrator in the coal strike. A letter signed by President Love and a committee of the union was sent to representatives of the operators and miners, which says in part: "Capital and labor cannot afford to be estranged. Violence under any circumstances is injurious. Individual rights must be respected. Reason and affection are competent to adjust any difficulties. Calmness, patience, petition, appeal, protest and prayer will triumph. As to compensation, we admit we are not able to name a price, but we have faith that this can be satisfactorily adjusted, and is an individual concern, according to merit and ability."

Debs to Address Mountain Miners. Altoona, Pa., Aug. 11 .- The fact that Eugene Debs is to address the coal miners at Irwin this evening cause uneasiness among the mountain operators, and although there is no apparent dissatisfaction in this district, except at the Mitchell mine, at Gallitzin, which is working below the regular mining rate, the near approach of the agitators may change the situation. Some of the mountain miners stopped work Monday to attend a meeting advertised to be held on Tunnel Hill for the purpose of giving assistance to the striking Gallitzin miners, but no meeting was held. They were all at work again yesterday.

Mining Town Under Martial Law. Coffeen. Ills., Aug. 11 .- This town is under martial law. A force of 235 deputy sheriffs is guarding the town and particularly the property of the Coffeen Coal and Copper company. One hundred and twenty-five men are at work in the shaft under protection of an armed force. The miners are encamped 300 strong in the woods just west of town. They have been forbidden to enter the village under penalty of arrest.

Richmond Wants the G. A. R. Richmond, Va., Aug. 11.-The board of aldermen last night concurred in the resolution of the common counci inviting the Grand Army of the Republic to hold their annual encampment in this city in 1899.
