The grounds around the house are laid out in circular walks, with flower beds A between them, and are shaded by fir, locust and maple trees. The house and grounds surrounding cost the club about \$5,000, and the total amount thus far expended on the preserve is about \$6,500.

#### THE NOVEMBER METEORS.

#### A Brilliant Display Promised for This Month.

The feature of great interest on the astronomical calendar for November is the possibility of a brilliant display of Leonids on the 13th and 14th of this month. Once in thirty-three years at about this time in November a wonderful shower of meteors has been observed. Leo does not rise until about midnight this month, so that the later the watch is kept up, the greater the probability of

seeing the meteors. Another well known meteoric shower due in November is the Andromedes. They are seen on or about the 27th of the month, and come, as their name indicates, from the constellation of Andromeda. Every 13 years they appear in unusual numbers, the last two times having been in 1872 and 1895, so that the period will be completed in 1898. It is by no means improbable, however, that there will be Andromedes enough to cause comment this year.
