The Arch Conspirator in the Murder of Mrs. Emma Kaiser.

TESTIMONY OF LIZZIE DE KALB.

She Declares Under Oath That Clemmer Admitted to Her That It Was He Who Fired the Shot That Killed | treaty of peace with Turkey. Mrs. Kalser.

Norristown, Pa., Dec. 22.-James A. Clemmer, who has taken Charles O. Kaiser's place as the central figure in the murder of Mrs. Kaiser on the night of Oct. 28, 1896, was yesterday given a final hearing before Justice of the Peace Lenhardt and committed to prison to answer at the March term of court for the killing of the woman. Lizzia De Kalb, Clemmer's one time mistress, was the principal witness against Clemmer, and despite the efforts of the latter's counsel to waive a hearing the justice allowed the 'woman in black" to tell the story of her association with Clemmer before, on and after the night of the mur-

Her evidence was damaging and startling. She told of a plan Kaiser and Clemmer had agreed upon to dispose of Mrs. Kaiser. She was to be chloroformed while in bed, after which the bed was to be set on fire. This failed through Kaiser losing his nerve. Miss De Kalb told of several carriage rides she took with Mrs. Kaiser, all of | Borne which were planned by Clemmer. Then Mrs. De Kalb told of her drive on the night on which Kalser's wife met her death.

Before proceeding she told of an occasion on which Clemmer had purposely injured himself in order to collect benefits accruing from an accident insurance policy held by him, and that on the night of the murder she was told that Mrs. Kaiser was to be shot and slightly wounded, so that some money could be realized in the same manner. The witness said that she and Clemmer rode in a carriage some distance behind the carriage containing Mr. and Mrs. Kaiser. The latter carriage stopped on the road, and when witness and Clemmer were a short distance away Clemmer alighted and went forward.

A few moments later witness heard two shots, and Clemmer soon returned. and they drove back to Norristown. On the way back Clemmer gave her a watch and chain, and later on got out of the carriage and wiped blood from his hand. Miss De Kalb asked him what he had done, and he told her to wait until they got home. Then they took another drive that night, and when they returned to Norristown they were told of the murder. Witness and Clemmer then went to Philadelphia. Here, she said, Clemmer washed blood from his coat and burned his cuffs. Witness began crying and Clemmer, sitting beside her, said that he and Kaiser had arranged to shoot Mrs. Kaiser for the insurance money, and that Charlie in the arm.

A Good Sally Lunn.

A good Sally Lunn, made according without yeast, is this: Mix 3 cups of flour, 3 tablespoonfuls sugar, 3 tablespoonfuls melted butter, a cup of milk, 3 teaspoonfuls baking powder and 3 'raised' bread is desired, nothing is better than this often tested recipe. Add 2 tablespoonfuls melted butter to a large pint of warmed milk, then 2 well beaten eggs and half a yeast cake dissolved in 3 tablespeenfuls cold water. Pour gradually over a quart of flour and beat to a smooth batter. Add a teaspoonful salt and a teaspoonful of sugar. Set to rise for 2 hours in a warm place and bake. To those who like the hop taste a whole yeast cake may be used with these proportions and will, of course, accelerate considerably the rising process.-New York Post.
