CRUSHING OUT HANNA.

The possibilities have become probabilities and the probabilities nearing certainties that Marcus Alonzo Hanna, the great American boss—the owner and maker of a President, the head and front, the inventor and inspiration of a great political trust made up of plutocratic trusts that has undertaken the present and future of the American Government —is to pass under the disciplinary rod of public justice and vengeance. Nothing that has occurred for years will give greater satisfaction and content to the people. The greed and lust of dominion—the vulgarity of his despotism, basing everything on the Almighty Dollar—and the boastful parade of his power over the weak man he made President have become almost as detestable to thoughtful Republicans as to Democrats.

The defeat of Mark Hanna, backed as he is by the power of a mighty political organization, by the influence of the Federal administration, by illimitable corporate dictation and money, will be memorable in the history of our politics and a warning to aspiring bosses who may come after him. They may have their brief hour of triumph in the heat of political battle, when the doctrine prevails that the end justifies the means and the intensity of partisan passion overcomes all scruples and safeguards; but when the madness of the hour has passed and they come up in review, as Hanna has done, the fact of short shrift and speedy justice illustrates the reserve of good sense and patriotism of the American people, as well as their sense of justice and retribution.

Hanna's crime against democracy and good government lies in this. He had the wit, the resoluteness, the evil courage and recklessness of conscience and moral obligation to plot, plan and array a vast combination of banking, corporation and plutocratic power to bribe, bully and seduce the American people. By playing on ignorance, timidity and avarice he was successful. But when it comes to paying him the stipulated reward a revolt intervenes. It is the most healthful sign for years. We may safely trust the Democrats of the Ohio Legislature to apply their share of the lashing.

MR. DALEY'S STATEMENT.

Mr. John A. Daley, of Curtin township, sends the following for publication, and we cheerfully give his version of the shooting match space in these columns: ROMOLA, PA., Jan. 4, 1898; Editor CENTRE DEMOCRAT: In your article about a shooting match, which took place at the home of Robert Mann, a neighbor of mine, some time ago, I was represented as guilty of a most disreputable act—that of making young men drunk on cider. The declaration even went so far as to say that it was my own cider.
