It becomes our sad duty to record the death of Rev. James F. McKinley, who quietly passed away at his residence in Alder, Michigan, on Wednesday, May 18th, 1898, aged 70 years. He had been failing in health for a number of years and two years ago retired from the ministry. In the fall of 1896 he came to Pennsylvania, hoping that the change of climate would be beneficial, but he found no relief and so returned in mid-summer. After arriving home he gained in strength and until two weeks ago was able to be about. The end came on Wednesday, May 18. The funeral services were held in the Methodist church in Alder, after which the remains were taken to Kalkaska for interment under the auspices of Baker Post, G. A. R. James F. McKinley was born in Milesburg, Centre county, Pa., in 1827, and was called to the ministry about forty years ago. He served throughout the civil war as first lieutenant of Company K, 95th Penna. Vols. He went to Michigan in 1876 and took up his residence in Clair county. In 1893 he moved to Alder as pastor of the M. E. church and held that position until the fall of 1896, when ill health compelled him to resign. Mr. McKinley spent several years in Utah in connection with church work. He was a member of Baker Post, G. A. R., of Kalkaska, and of Life Lake Lodge, No. 359, I. G. O. F. He leaves to mourn his death a loving wife, a son, J. J.
