Altoona Tribune: The Pennsylvania railroad officials here have under contemplation the construction of a new type | C. of passenger engine. The new locomotive will be built with the cab over the front end of the boiler, immediately behind the smokestack. The fireman will work at the firema firebox ten or fifteen feet behind the en-

This departure from standard pensy ypes is made necessary by the demand for larger grate area in passenger locomotives. By moving the cab forward the firebox can be widened about three feet by utilizing the space now taken up inside the cab. A cab at the front end will also allow the engineer an unobstructed view of the track and signals, something much to be desired.
