

# ROOSEVELT ELECTED

### The Rough Rider Chosen Governor of New York.

### PENNSYLVANIA ELECTS COL. STONE.

### The Vote of Dr. Swallow Only About 100,000.

### WOODRUFFS WINS IN NEW JERSEY.

### He Will Be Backed by a Legislature That Will Elect a Republican to Succeed James Smith in the Senate of the United States—Democrats Elect Two Congressmen in Maryland—Nebraska Elects a Republican Governor by 3,000 Plurality.

New York, Nov. 9.—Theodore Roosevelt, the Republican nominee, has carried the state by a plurality over Augustus Van Wyck of about 20,000. The total Republican vote when received will probably show a falling off as compared with that for Governor Black in 1896, of about 14 per cent. In the municipality of New York the old time Democratic majority was approximated, Van Wyck's vote being about 80,000 greater than that of the Republican candidate. This latter result was helped in some measure by the result in the borough of Brooklyn (Kings county), which in 1896 gave Black a plurality of 23,682, but yesterday gave a Democratic plurality of about 16,820. Brooklyn is the home of Judge Van Wyck.

The returns from many counties up the state are incomplete, and in some cases are missing altogether. The indications, being computations upon the figures at hand, point to a Republican plurality in the counties above Harlem of about 100,000, to offset which the Democrats can produce only the 80,000 plurality of greater New York.

The soldier vote will not be counted until Dec. 1, but it is not likely that the ballot from the camps will materially alter the result. There would seem to be the greater probability that the majority for Roosevelt will be increased.

The figures on congressmen are not accessible at this hour, but there are indications that the Democrats have

majority two years ago was nearly 12,000. All Colonel Roosevelt's associates on the Republican state ticket are probably elected with him. The returns both from greater New York and from the counties outside of this municipality are incomplete, but enough have been received to indicate a heavy falling off in the vote up the state, while the vote in the city was well sustained. The consequence is a falling off in the Republican plurality in the state from 12,000 to the approximated figures given above. Outside of greater New York the vote for Van Wyck is only about one-fifth of one per cent. above that of Porter in 1896. There appears to be a loss of four Republican congressmen in the Brooklyn district, the Second, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth; and Congressman Quigg, who had a majority of about 9,000 at the election last year, has been defeated by William Astor Chanler, in the Albany district, the Twentieth, Glynn, Dem., has been elected to succeed Southwick, Rep.

### STONE WINS IN PENNSYLVANIA.

The Republican Candidate's Plurality Is Nearly 150,000.

Philadelphia, Nov. 9.—Incomplete returns from the state of Pennsylvania give William A. Stone, Rep., a plurality of nearly 150,000 for governor over George A. Jenks, Dem. Dr. S. C. Swallow, the Prohibition and Honest Government candidate, received unexpectedly light support, and his total vote will probably not go much above 100,000, against 118,969 last year. Of the 30 congressmen elected 21 are surely Republican, with three districts, the Twelfth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth, doubtful and claimed by both parties. The last congressional delegation from this state stood: Republicans, 27; Democrats, 2.

The Republicans also elected 25 of the 50 senators and 294 members of assembly. The Democratic and fusionist net

gain on joint ballot in the legislature is probably between 20 and 30, but the body which elects successor to United States Senator Quay remains strongly Republican, and the Quay leaders claim that, notwithstanding the fight against him, the senator will control enough members of the legislature to insure his election if he decides to be a candidate to succeed himself.

State senators have been elected as follows: District 2, George W. Holzworth, 4, J. Bayard Martin, 6, John M. Scott, 8, David Martin, 10, Hampton W. Rice, 12, J. P. H. Jenkins, 14, J. A. Stober, 16, Henry G. Stiles, 18, Jacob B. Kemmer, 20, James C. Vaughn, 22, David S. Leary, 24, J. Henry Cochran, 26, Edmund B. Hardsburgh, 28, Harvey W. Haines, 34, William A. Osburn, 36, John S. Weiler, 40, John R. Byrne, 42, Charles A. Muehlbrunner, 44, William Flinn, 46, Alex. L. Hawkins, Democrats.

Legislative returns from the state thus far received show Democratic and fusionist gains of 13 in the assembly. Districts not yet heard from will probably elect ten or fifteen Democrats to seats now held by Republicans. The Quay leaders claim that a majority of the Republicans elected will favor the re-election of the senator.

The vote on the legislative ticket in the counties where the Republican opponents of Senator M. S. Quay have fused with the Democrats is very close. Common pleas judges were elected to fill vacancies in 12 of the 54 judicial districts of the state. In five of the districts there was no contest, and the sitting judges were re-elected, as follows: Fourth district, Tioga county, John I. Mitchell, Rep.; Twenty-fifth district, Clinton, Cameron and Elk counties, Charles A. Mayer, Dem.; Thirty-first district, Lehigh county, Edwin Albright, Dem.; Thirty-fourth district, Susquehanna county, Daniel W. Searle, Rep.; Thirty-ninth district, Franklin county, John Stewart, Rep. In this city Judges Clement B. Penrose and William M. Ashman, Republicans, of the orphans' court, were re-elected unanimously, having received the endorsement of the Democratic and Prohibition parties.

### A NEBRASKA SURPRISE.

Republican Governor Elected by a Plurality of 3,000.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 9.—Scattering precinct returns indicate a political surprise in Nebraska, inasmuch as they fore cast the almost certain election of Hayward, Rep., for governor by a plurality of not less than 3,000. This will be a reversal of the verdict of 1896 by nearly 15,000. The count thus far is wholly on governor so far as the state ticket is concerned, and as it is the belief that Hayward is running slightly ahead of his ticket it would make the result on remaining state offices very close. The most surprising feature of it all is the strength displayed by Republican legislative candidates, the few returns received showing them to be even ahead of Hayward. As these are from but one or two counties, however, they fall to indicate assuredly the complexion of the legislature.

At midnight Chairman Slaughter, of the Republican state committee, said: "We have elected the entire Republican ticket by pluralities of not less than 5,000, and possibly to exceed 5,000. We will have a majority of the legislature on joint ballot and will elect a Republican United States senator to succeed Senator Allen. We have elected three congressmen and probably four of the six."

The fusion committee made no statement further than to insist that they had carried the state and legislature.

### CONNECTICUT REPUBLICAN.

Majorities For the State Candidates Will Average Fully 15,000.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 9.—The result of the election in this state yesterday was a general victory for the Republican ticket. Complete returns from 165 towns of the 168 in the state give Lounsbury, Rep., 75,057; Morgan, Dem., 58,406. The same towns in 1896 gave Cooke, Rep., 100,999; Sargent, Dem., 51,396. The majorities average fully 15,000. The Republican candidates appear to have suffered most from the general decrease in the vote, but no particular disaffection can be said to be shown by the general result. The only real contest was in the Second district where Congressman N. D. Sperry, the Republican nominee, and James H. Webb, Dem., were the opposing candidates. Sperry's majority was 3,325. The returns indicate that the Republicans will have a majority of at least 50 in the general assembly.

### MISSOURI DEMOCRATS' CLAIM.

The Re-election of Senator Cockrell, It Is Said, Is Assured.

St. Louis, Nov. 9.—Chairman Cook claims the election of the entire Democratic state ticket by a plurality of 25,000, the election of 13 and possibly 14 congressmen and the return of a safe majority to the legislature, insuring the re-election of United States Senator Cockrell.

Returns on the state ticket from the city and state are coming in very slowly, and at midnight not enough figures had been received to indicate the result in even one county. Chairman Cook is confident that the state ticket will receive about the same majority as in 1896, that the party will hold all the congressional districts carried two years ago, and possibly carry one of the three St. Louis districts, which elected Republican congressmen. While there are no returns at Republican headquarters to warrant the assertion, National Committee members Richard Kerens is very confident that the Republicans will carry or come nearer carrying Missouri than ever before.

### Pingree's Victory in Michigan.

Detroit, Nov. 9.—The Republican state central committee claims Pingree's election by from 50,000 to 60,000 majority. The Democratic state committee has not yet conceded defeat. The governor ran several hundred ahead of his ticket in Detroit, and ran up a plurality of 2,000 in Grand Rapids. In Saginaw he doubled on his plurality of '96. In Jackson, Lansing, Bay City and other smaller cities he was cut considerably, but the country districts surrounding went quite strongly for Pingree. The balance of the Republican state ticket is elected. The upper peninsula gave its usual Republican majorities, but there was a great amount of splitting on governor in the lower peninsula. The vote on congressmen is close in half of the twelve districts, the others returning Republicans with certainty. The legislature will have a Republican majority.

### Fusion Wins in Minnesota.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 9.—Three hundred and seventeen precincts out of 1,865, outside of St. Paul and Minneapolis, give Eustis, Rep., 24,262; Lind, fusion, 23,046. At this rate Eustis would lead Lind outside the twin cities by probably 5,000, but Lind is far ahead in the two cities. Much fuller returns are necessary to decide the election, though all indications favor Lind for governor. Little or nothing has been heard from the rest of the ticket. It seems to be now only a question of Lind's majority, as his election is practically conceded. The Republicans have elected congressmen in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Seventh districts, with the Sixth in doubt. The Democrats have probably also elected one of the supreme court judges.

### North Carolina's Democratic Sweep.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 9.—Returns indicate that the Democrats have carried the First, Third, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Ninth congressional districts. Linney is re-elected in the Ninth. Atwater, Pop., endorsed by Democrats, is probably elected in the Fourth. In the Sealed it is uncertain whether Fountain, Pop., supported by Democrats, or White, colored Rep., is elected. It looks like Fountain has won. The legislature is Democratic in both branches by two-thirds majority, and the Democratic judicial ticket is elected by 20,000.

### A Light Vote in Rhode Island.

Providence, Nov. 9.—The voting was light throughout the state, as the election of both Republican candidates for congress was a foregone conclusion. The revised constitution has probably been rejected. The country districts voted heavily against it, and the vote in the cities proves larger than expected it will not be approved.

### McMillin's Majority in Tennessee.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 9.—The Democratic executive committee claims 25,000 majority for McMillin. The Republican committee concedes McMillin's election by 10,000 majority. The legislature shows Democratic gains. Congressmen: Eight Democrats; two Republicans. The vote throughout the state light.

### Texas' Usual Democratic Sweep.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 9.—Scattering reports from the state indicate that the state Democratic ticket will be elected by a large majority. Incomplete returns from this, the Ninth congressional district, shows that the Democrats will elect Burleson by a fair majority.

### Democrats' Clean Sweep in Louisiana.

New Orleans, Nov. 9.—The Democrats in Louisiana made a clean sweep yesterday, electing six congressmen, three railroad commissioners and three judges in the parish of Orleans.

### THE RESULT IN MARYLAND.

Democrats Succeed in Electing Two of the Congressmen.

Baltimore, Nov. 9.—Full and semi-official returns from the city of Baltimore and partial returns from the balance of the state make it reasonably certain that Maryland has returned four Republican and two Democratic congressmen, after an extraordinarily close but entirely listless election. This is a Democratic gain of two. The successful are: John Walter Smith, Dem., First district, by a majority of about 800; William B. Baker, Rep., Second district, by from 200 to 400; Frank C. Wachter, Rep., Third district, by 59 majority; James W. Denny, Dem., Fourth district, by about 600; Sydney E. Mudd, Rep., Fifth district, by about 600; George A. Pearce, Rep., Sixth district, by about 3,000. The Democrats succeeded in obtaining a majority of the popular vote in Baltimore city for the first time in six years, and there is but little doubt that they would have sent five congressmen to the next national legislature if an active and aggressive campaign had been made. The entire delegation, with the exception of Messrs. Mudd and Baker, are new timber, and all are looked upon as favoring a gold standard of currency.

### REPUBLICANS CARRY DELAWARE.

Addicks' Friends Claim That He Will Succeed Senator Gray.

Wilmington, Del., Nov. 9.—Partial returns received from the state up to 2 a. m. indicate that the Republicans have elected their state, congressional and legislative tickets. This estimate, if verified by the returns, indicates the election of a Republican successor to United States Senator Gray and a gain of one Republican congressman. The adherents of William H. Addicks claim that he will control a majority of the Republicans elected to the legislature, and will be the next senator from Delaware.

### Wisconsin Republicans' Big Claim.

Milwaukee, Nov. 9.—Not enough returns have been received from the state to form anywhere near an accurate estimate of the outcome of the election. On the meager returns received Chairman of the Republican state central committee, figures that Scofield will carry the state by 40,000 plurality, and claiming the legislature will be largely Republican and at least eight out of ten congressmen will be returned from the Republican ranks. Chairman Peck, of the Democratic state Democratic committee, says not enough returns have been received to form any kind of an opinion.

### Dr. Swallow Admits Defeat.

Harrisburg, Nov. 9.—Dr. Swallow last night admitted that the returns indicated the defeat of the state Prohibition ticket, although later returns may be more favorable. "The purchasable vote," he said, "is always bought out by the purchasers. Many of the men who talk reform have not time on election day to vote their convictions. Their efforts begin and end in empty words." The doctor says he will keep up his fight for reform until the government is restored to the rightful ownership of the people. He also said that he thought thousands of the liquor dealers of the state desired a better government.

### Ten Democrats From Kentucky.

Louisville, Nov. 9.—The Democrats of Kentucky yesterday carried nine and possibly ten out of the eleven congressional districts in the state, a gain of two or perhaps three over their last delegation. The Republicans carried one district, the Eleventh, solidly, but this was always conceded by their opponents, as it has been a Republican stronghold for years. In the Ninth district the race between Pugh, Rep., and Williams, Dem., is very close, both sides claiming it. The vote throughout the state was the lightest known.

### Iowa's Republican Majority.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 9.—The Democratic state central committee has given out the following statement: "We concede the state to the Republicans by 25,000. They were elected Ways and Means in the Sixth district by 1,900 to 1,200." A statement from the Republican state central committee reads: "The Republicans have carried the state by more than 50,000. We have elected every Republican congressman by large majorities."

### The Vote of New Hampshire.

Concord, N. H., Nov. 9.—Senator Jacob H. Gallinger, chairman of the Republican state committee, issued this statement at midnight: "The indications show the election of Rollins for governor by from 8,000 to 10,000 majority, and that the Republicans will have from 18 to 20 of the 24 state senators, and nearly the same majority in the house as two years ago. Both Republican congressmen are elected."

### Republicans Claim South Dakota.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 9.—Returns from the state are meagre. Republican gains have been uniform, but small. Chairman Herrell, of the Republican state committee, expressed the belief that Phillips, Rep., candidate for governor, is elected, with the entire state ticket, and Burke and Gamble for congress.

### Fusion Makes the Biggest Claim.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 9.—Chairman Albaugh, of the Republican state committee claims the state for Stanley, Rep., for governor by 5,000 and Chairman Riddle, of the fusion committee, claims the state for Leedy, fusion, by 11,000.

### Not a Vote Against Joe Wheeler.

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 9.—A solid Democratic congressional delegation was elected from Alabama. General Joe Wheeler was unanimously re-elected in the Eighth, not a vote being cast against him.

### Republican Governor of Nevada.

Reno, Nev., Nov. 9.—Indications point to the election of McMillin, Rep., for governor; Newlands, silver, for congress; Flannigan, Rep., senate, and at least two out of the four assemblies for this district.

### North Dakota's Republican Majority.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 9.—Reports from over the state are very meagre, but indicate slight Republican gains over 1896. An estimate on the state gives the Republican ticket 4,500 majority.
