ITEMS FROM GRIT.

The Centre county Court house was virtually rebuilt in 1896 under the act of Assembly permitting the County Commissioners to make repairs to public buildings. No two successive grand juries would recommend the building of a new Court House. Business had outgrown the old building, and the Commissioners having more than the usual amount of sand in their make-up tore down the old building, all but the front portico with its massive stone columns of Corinthian-Ionic architecture. The structure was enlarged to 115x58 feet, is of stone and plastering on the exterior. M. L. Rishel, justice of the peace in Gregg township, paid a visit to Bellefonte last week. Esquire Rishel is six feet three inches in height, and has been a justice of the peace in that township for several years. His father, whom his son succeeded to the office, was also a justice of the peace for many years up to his death. Esquire Rishel makes it a point to settle all cases in infraction of the law brought before him, consequently no Common wealth cases are returned to court by him. In civil suits his judgment generally stands without appeal being taken. Died at 91 From Teething. Labolt Gantzburger died at the county hospital at Reading recently and, although he was 91 years of age, it is believed his death was hastened by the fact that he was teething. He had hardly a tooth in his mouth until about two months ago when one made its appearance. He "cut" two more since then, and fully expected an entire set to develop. The teething aggravated his other ailments, and he died suddenly. Physicians say it is one of the strangest cases on record. The deceased was for many years in the clothing business in Boyertown. —Don't fail to see the Royer Brothers in "Next Door" next Thursday evening. Death of Mrs. Houser. Mrs. Houser, widow of Andrew Houser, of Pine Grove Mills, died of old age on Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock; aged about 84. She lived at the old Houser homestead with her two daughters. The funeral will take place Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. She was one of Centre county's oldest inhabitants and leaves to mourn their loss six sons and two daughters. Death of an Eminent Lutheran. Rev. Dr. Henry Zeigler, at one time a professor in Susquehanna university, a Lutheran institution of learning, died at his home in Sellingsgrove, on Saturday last. The deceased was about 83 years of age and was one of the leaders in the ranks of the followers of Luther, in this state. Died at Boalsburg. David Stuart, an old and respected citizen, of Boalsburg, died on Tuesday, his age being about 86 years. He has lived there all his lifetime and will be greatly missed by his many friends. Application for Pardon.

Notice has been given that an application would be made to the State Board of Pardons for the pardon of James Cornelly, who now is in the Western Penitentiary, from this place, serving a term of five years and six months, upon a conviction of attempting to burn the Armory. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court and the lower court affirmed. Since last April he has been in the Western Penitentiary. Wednesday, the 21st day of December, the Board meets at Harrisburg, where the matter will be argued by his attorneys Orvis, Bower & Orvis, and Taylor & Johnston. This case aroused much local difference of opinion at the time, in which leading citizens expressed displeasure with the trial of the case in our court.

Thanksgiving Foot Ball.

On Thursday afternoon the Bellefonte Academy boys gave the Lock Haven foot ball team a few pointers about the popular game of foot ball. A large crowd witnessed the game on the glass works meadow where the visitors went down by a score of 37 to 0. The same day State College beat Dickinson College, at Williamsport, by a clean score of 34 to 0.

AN INTERESTING CASE.

And One in Which the Constables of the State are Doubly Interested.

The constables of the state are waiting with much concern the decision of the Supreme Court in a case which has just been argued in Pittsburgh. It involves the question of whether a constable is entitled to 50 cents for each witness subpoenaed, regardless of how many names are on a printed form, or whether he is only entitled to 50 cents for serving the entire paper. The case originated in Lancaster county, where Commissioners claimed that Constable William Price was not entitled to 50 cents for each name, and the Common Pleas Court sustained the Commissioners. An appeal to the Superior Court resulted in a reversal opinion rendered, that a Constable should have 50 cents for each witness subpoenaed, and now the Supreme Court is to decide finally on the important matter. It would be rather interesting if the Supreme Court should reverse the Superior.

Shipping Evaporated Fruit.

The fruit evaporating plant in Colyer's building at the Centre Hall station has wound up for the season, and the proprietor, Mr. Miner, is now shipping the finished article to market. The plant worked up thousands of bushels of apples, which came from all parts of the county. Mr. Miner anticipates a longer season for operation next year, when he hopes to continue running at least through January.—Reporter. Such an enterprise no doubt could be profitably operated in other parts of the county and make a market for apples, which often can not be sold, at any price.

The Bishop to be Here.

Next Sunday evening at 7:30, Bishop Talbot, the new bishop for this diocese, will officiate in the Bellefonte Episcopal church where he will conduct confirmation services. He will remain in Bellefonte over Monday and in the afternoon of that day he will address the Ladies' Missionary Society. In the evening a reception will be held at the rectory on Lamb street, to which the public is cordially invited. On Saturday evening a reception will be held for the Bishop at the residence of Dr. Atherton, at State College, and Sunday morning he will preach in the College Chapel.

An Early Morning Wedding.

A very pretty wedding service was performed Thanksgiving morning in St. John's Catholic church, Mr. Harry Flack, of Coleville, and Miss Annie Keife were married. They were accompanied to the altar by Miss Mary Keife, sister of the bride, as bridesmaid, and Mr. John Sharp, of Tyrone, nephew of the groom, as groomsmen.
