A POWERFUL PRINCESS.

Clementine of Saxe-Coburg is One of the

Cleverest Women of Europe. This stately lady is Princess Clementine of Saxe-Coburg. The princess, who was described some years ago by a distinguished statesman as one of the three cleverest women in Europe, "the nightmare of the emperor of Prussia, the bogey of the emperor of Austria and the sleeping draught of Bismarck," has recently risen from what it was feared would prove her deathbed. Princess Clementine's career and character are alike remarkable. A daughter of Louis Philippe, she has made her influence felt all over the

world almost from her girlhood. She

PRINCESS CLEMENTINE father, who was very proud of her. took care that they should be developed, with the result that she has played a more prominent part in the making of history than most of her contemporaries. Not the least notable of her achievements was that her royal highness traveled to Bulgaria last June, for the sole purpose of spending her 80th birthday with her son, Prince Ferdinand. Princess Clementine has been, indeed, one of the most remarkable women of the century, and not the least active exercise of her great talents has been witnessed during the last ten years, when she has brought all her powers to bear in support of Prince Ferdinand, her youngest and favorite son, in his often difficult position.
