PREPARING DEFENSES.

Rebels Massing Strong Forces North of Calumput.

THE WARNING PROCLAMATION.

Our Commissioners Assure the Filipinos of Kindly Treatment, and Declare That the Supremacy of the United States Must and Will Be Enforced

Manila, April 5 .- General MacArthur reconnoitered in force yesterday, with the Montana regiment, the Fourth cavalry and two guns of the light artillery, as far as the river north of Malolos. The reconnoisance developed the fact that there are fully 1,000 rebels, armed with Mauser rifles, preparing for defense. Shots were exchanged, and two of the Montana regiment were wounded and one killed, but there was no engagement. Later in the day General MacArthur moved northward, as the water supply of Malolos is inadequate.

The insurgents are massing strong forces north of Calumpit, about five and a half miles northwest of Malolos, and, according to the observations of the reconnoitering parties, they have fine entrenchments there.

It is expected that hard fighting will be necessary to dislodge them at that point and at San Fernando, where Aguinaldo is supposed to be. Large rivers strengthen both positions.

The belief is spreading among the residents here that the effect of the capture of Malolos, followed by the proclamation of the United States Philippine commission, will be to convince the natives that Aguinaldo's bubble has burst.

Dr. Schurman, president of the commission, said:

"The Filipinos have been asking unceasingly: 'What do you propose to do for us? The proclamation answers the question, and it should satisfy them." Colonel Charles Denby, member of the commission and former minister to

China, remarked: "It is the most important proclamation since the declaration of independence. Spanish, Tagalo and English versions have been printed, and it is proposed to circulate them about Malolos and at all the seaports. They will be sent to the

lake towns by gunboats." The preamble of the proclamation recites the cession by the peace treaty of the Philippine Islands to the United States, refers to the appointment of the commission, assures the people of the cordial goodwill and fraternal feeling of the president of the United States and the American people, and asserts the object which the United States government, apart from the fulfillment of the solemn obligations, has assumed towards the family of nations by the acceptance of the sovereignty over the islands is the well being, prosperity and happiness of the Philippine people and their elevation and advancement to a position among the most civilized peoples of the world. The proclamation proceeds in substance as follows:

"Unfortunately these pure aims and purposes of the American government and people have been misinterpreted to some of the inhabitants of certain islands and as a consequence the friendly American forces have, without provocaor cause, been

"The supremacy of the United States must and will be enforced throughout every part of the archipelago, and those who resist it can accomplish no end other than their own ruin. To the Philippine people will be granted the most ample liberty and self government reconcilable with the maintenance of a wise, just, stable, effective and economical administration of public affairs and compatible with the sovereign and international rights and the obligations of the United States.

"The civil rights of the Philippine people will be guaranteed and protected to the fullest extent, freedom will be assured, and all persons shall be equal and have equal standing in the eyes of the

"Honor, justice and friendship forbid the use of the Philippine people or the islands they inhabit as an object or means of exploitation. The purpose of the American government is the welfare and the advancement of the Philippine people

The only effective stand made by the rebels was at a bamboo and earthen work, half a mile from Malolos and on the right, where the Nebraska regiment, as was the case on Thursday, had the hardest work and suffered the greatest

Colonel Funston, always at the front was the first man in Malolos, followed by a group of dashing Kansans.

The Filipino flag, which was flying from the center of the town, was hauled down by some of the men of the Montana regiment, who triumphantly raised their own above it.

From the columns of smoke arising from the city it seemed as if the whole place was ablaze. It turned out, however, that only the Presidencia, the government building, and a few of the smaller buildings had been set on fire by the rebels before they evacuated the

Carter Harrison Re-elected.

Chicago, April 5 .- Carter H. Harrison was re-elected mayor of Chicago yes terday by a total vote of 146,914, against 107,304 for Zeina R. Carter, the Republican candidate, and 45,401 for John P. Altgeld, the independent Democratic andidate. Harrison's plurality being 29,610. In the last mayoralty election Harrison was elected by a vote of 148, 000, against 59,342 for Sears, the regu lar Republican nominee, and 69,637 for Harlan, the independent Republican. The Democrats have elected their candidates for the town offices in the north and west towns, the Republicans carrying the south town, although the final count may take this from them. The returns thus far received, however, indicate that they have a safe majority.

Harrisburg, April 5 .- The anti-Quay Republicans dropped Congressman John Dalzell as their choice for United States senator at yesterday's joint ballot and voted for Judge John Stewart, of Chambersburg. The Democrats will probably continue to support George A. Jerks. A movement to recall the joint caucus to drop Mr. Jenks and select some other candidate has been abandoned. Yesterday's ballot resulted: Quay, 95; Jenks, succeeded by rain. 76; Stewart, 51.

COAST STEAMER CAPSIZED.

Of Mineteen Persons on Board Ten

Were Drowned. Eureka, Cal., April 5.-The steamer Chilkat, with six passengers and a crew of 13, capsized on the bar yesterday as she was leaving the harbor on her trip to San Francisco. Four passengers and six of the crew were drowned. The steamer was almost over the bar and had turned toward the south when a breaker struck her beam, and she capsized. The steamer North Fork, also bound for San Francisco, had preceded her to sea, and, seeing the accident, sent back two boats and succeeded in rescuing the following: William Backwood, chief engineer; Clyde Lightner, first assistant engineer; William Grip, fireman; T. C. Bohall, steward; William Black,

seaman, and Howard Smith, passenger The life saving crew started out immediately, but before they could reach the wreck a man and two women rushed across the spit, and throwing a line succeeded in bringing three men ashore-Peter Hansen, fireman; Peter Jensen,

first mate, and W. C. Morser, passenger. The lost passengers are M. O. Burzon Peter Fry, E. O'Brien and E. J. Boland. Burzon was a tight rope performer, and it is supposed that his home is in San Francisco. Fry was manager of a creamery at Ferndale and was a well known citizen of this county. O'Brien was going to San Francisco to fill a situation. E. J. Boland was a printer.

CUBAN ARMY DISBANDED.

After Taking This Action the Military Assembly Dissolves.

Havana, April 5 .- The Cuban military assembly last evening voted to disband the army and to dissolve. The army question is now considered settled.

"As the shadows of the night fall over the city we finish our work. So is Cuba's future clouded and dark. I take leave of you with sorrow, and my last words are: May Cuba some day be free and independent."

With these words General Fernando Freyre de Andrade, president of the military assembly, closed its last ses-sion at 7 o'clock last evening. The whole meeting was calm and dispassionate. It lasted four hours. General Sanguily's flights of oratory, in which he likened the members of the assembly to a "band of faithful workers devoted to Cuba's good, but finally vanquished by uncontrollable conditious," were received with applause.

The assembly ordered the disbanding of the army, in accordance with Senor Despaigne's motion and passed upon the details and methods of the disbandment. A new executive committee was then appointed to attend to the routine work connected with the commission of Cuban officers, and this committee will supply to General Brooke the copies of the Cuban muster rolls.

Murdered Wife and Self.

Falls Church, Va., April 5 .- This little community, largely made up of government employes in Washington, was startled last night by the discovery of the dead bodies of Weston A. Turner and his wife, well do do couple, each about 60 years of age, who made their home Turner evidently shot his wife while she was asleep and then put another bullet through his own head. A paper of March 23, giving an account of a suicide in Washington that day, and other evidence indicated that the tragedy occurred the night of the 23d. Last night the house was broken into and in ill health and quite melancholy all the winter. The tragedy evidently was an inspiration of the moment. Turner left an estate worth about \$50,000.

Death of Landlord Leland. New York, April 5.-Warren F. Le-land, proprietor of the Windsor hotel, died at the Hotel Grenoble at 5:53 p. m. yesterday, following an operation for appendicitis, performed Saturday afternoon. His son, Charles Leland, of Chicago, and Dr. Pitkin, the attending physician, were with him at the time of his death. Mr. Leland collapsed from nervons prostration about a week ago as the result of the tremendous amount of work he had done, the excitement and worry which he had undergone after the great fire of his hotel. Mr. Leland's wife, daughter and a cousin lost their lives in

Killed Father to Save Mother. Bellefonte, Pa., April 5 .- To save his mother from his father's murderous attack Lewis Dennis, of near Millheim, killed his father by a blow with a chair. The dead man, Samuel Dennis, had been subject to epilepsy for several years. Some time after midnight the son heard his mother call for help. Entering her room he found his father had apparently gone insane and was choking his wife. The son could not induce his father to nesist, and was forced to brain him with a chair. Mrs. Dennis is still suffering from shock, and physicians fear for her

The Pope's Condition.

London, April 5.-The Rome correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: The pope is able to be up and about, but he cannot do his customary work, and the Vatican routine has to be executed without personal reference to him. The danger from his fainting fits has been exaggerated, and the real cause of first. anxiety is his inability to take sufficient nourishment. His holiness may keep going so long as there is no extra pressure upon him, but his life will hang by a slender thread unless he gathers strength with the returning spring.
