#### DESTRUCTIVE WORM.

Causing Worriment to Centre County Farmers.

Farmers in Brush Valley complain of a worm that is playing havoc with their corn. It is reported that over three fourths of the crop in that valley has been destroyed by the pest. The worm is white and is over an inch long. When working it is found at the root of the stalk eating into the heart of the stem. The stalks turn yellow, shrivel and die. As many as six of these worms have been found about the roots of a single stalk. The worm has been found quite numerous under stones outside of cornfields. At one place where rocks were being blasted some of these worms were found among the debris thrown up.

Farmers should take warning for next spring's planting, to head off this pest. Salt, purchased in bulk, by car loads, can be had very cheap, and farmers by sowing it broadcast or along the corn row, while acting as a fertilizer may find it a check upon this enemy of the crop.

#### Fruit Crops Short.

Fruit growers in this section are disouraged with this year's crop. The drought of six weeks or more has prematurely ripened or brought to decay most of the crop, and now what is left is of a very inferior quality. The apple crop will not be one-third what it promised to be six weeks ago. Small fruits, also, fell off with the dry rot, or have died up on the trees, until few are left. As to peaches, where last year the growers in this section pocketed about \$50,000, for this year's crop they will hardly have \$500 to divide among them. The present drought in Centre county has caused an estimated loss to fruit and berry growers of not less than \$25,000, and it is not possible to estimate the loss to the farmers, as the corn crop is entirely ruined.
