## BALLOT BOX STUFFING.

Five Alleged Fraudulent Voters Arrested in Philadelphia.

BAID TO BE FROM WASHINGTON.

It Was Testified To That the Men, Four of Whom Are Presumably Government Employes, Were Sent to Philadelphia by a Pelice Lieutenant.

Philadelphia, Nov. 11.-As the result of a newspaper investigation five men, all residents of Washington, D. arrested Tuesday night, were yesterday held in bail for court on the charge of repeating, impersonating election officers and making fraudulent returns. The defendants are John F. Sheehan, R. M. Dinkert, William Cook, Harry McCabe and George Kirkland. All but one are said to be in the government's employ.

It developed that Kirkland had been employed by the newspaper mentioned to enter the conspiracy. He was the principal witness, and bail in his case was fixed at \$1,000, the others being required to furnish \$1,800. The testimony involved several prominent Republican politicians in this city and a lieutenant of capital police at Wash-

The alleged fraud, it was sworn to, was accomplished in the Thirteenth division of the Seventh ward, and the election papers of this division were produced in evidence. The returns showed a vote of 337 for Colonel James E. Barnett, the Republican can didate for state treasurer, and 5 for William T. Creasy, the Democratic candidate.

Kirkland, who at the time of his arrest said his name was George Wright, described the trip from Washington to this city of the alleged repeaters on Monday night. He then related in detail all that happened from the time of their arrival until their arrest at the railroad station on election night. He says the five were brought from Washington by Lieutenant Rogers, of the capital police. In this city he and Cook went to the house of Deputy Coroner Samuel Salter, accompanied by Rogers, where they were handed about 200 ballots, sealed and folded, and instructed to place them in the box as soon as they arrived at the polling place. Kirkland acted as minority inspector under the name of Clarence McCabe, the regular inspector, and Cook impersonated William Hamilton, the judge of election. They placed the illegal ballots in the box as instructed. The last 24 voters were handed specimen ballots, which were afterward destroyed. There were 124 votes actually cast, but the returns gave 342. He was paid \$15 for his work by Lieutenant Rogers.

William Hamilton testified that he was unable to act as judge because to do so he would have to resign his position as laborer in the postoffice. The clerk of the hotel where the men stopped said the bill was paid by a prominent local politician.

Today the men accused were released on bail of \$1,800 each, and all but Kirkland left the city. Ex-Judge Gordon and ex-District Attorney Graham, the very indigprosecuting lawyers, nant over the fact that the men were released by Judge Eisenbrown without an investigation of the property accented as bail.

Mexico's Silver Production. Senor Romero, trying to be conservative, replied that Mexico was turning out \$5,000,000 per year, and could keep it up for 200 years. Mexico expects to supply the world with \$100,000,000 of silver per annum

#### A SWINDLING QUINTET Rounded Up After Being Watched For

Several Months. New York, Nov. 15 .- There is at police headquarters here a quartet of prisoners in whom the police of almost every large American city and many of the leading business houses, banks and trust companies have a deep interest. They were rounded up after being watched for several months, and were formally held by a police magis-

trate yesterday on the nominal charge of being suspicious persons. The police of New York say that most of them have been convicted here and elsewhere of swindling that has netted them many thousands of dollars. The prisoners are:

Alonzo J. Whiteman, 39 years old, of Danville, N. Y., the alleged head of the gang, a graduate of the Columbia school; Frank Edmunds, 40 years old, clerk, of New York; John Thompson, alias William Hartley, alias P. Lawton, alias Dr. George W. Johnson, 31 years old, clerk, residence unknown; Robert J. Knox, 42 years

old, lawyer, New York. There is under arrest at Pittsburg a fifth member of the gang, Charles D. Stewart, alias Charles Ward, about 60 or 70 years old. He was arrested there Monday.

Murdered His Brother-in-Law. Chicago, Nov. 15.—Because of trouble with the family of his brother-in-law. Frank Anderson, Eugene Hopp, a laborer, tried last night to exterminate entire Anderson household. He walked into Anderson's house and shot Anderson in the abdomen, inflicting a wound from which he died in a short time. He then turned on his sister, Mrs. Anderson, and fired at her just as she reached the top of a flight of stairs. Mrs. Anderson was not hit, but in her fright fell down stairs. Hopp then killed Anderson's dog, which at tacked him, went home and barricaded himself in the house. The police were compelled to batter down the door. and made him prisoner only after a desperate fight.

Farnsworth's Rival in Bigamy. Chicago, Nov. 15 .- James Monroe, the alleged bigamist and swindler, who was arrested here Sunday, left for Rochester yesterday in custody of police officers of that city, to be tried on charges of swindling and bigamy. Mrs. Mary J. Colthar, of Bunker Hill Ills., who it is said Monroe married and afterward deserted in Rochester, N. Y., after obtaining \$4,100 from her, identified Monroe. Monroe's record as bigamist, it is said, bids fair to eclipse that of the candy peddler Fransworth, who was recently arrested charged with having 42 wives in different parts of the world. The police already have the names of 26 women who have been married and victimized

No Jury in the Molineux Case. New York, Nov. 15.-Roland B. Molineaux was put on trial for his life yesterday in the court of special sessions before Recorder Goff, charged with the death by poison of Katherine J. Adams on Dec. 28, 1898. When the case was called Molineaux's counsel, Bartow S. Weeks, made an effort to have it transferred to the supreme court, but Recorder Goff ordered the trial to proceed. Several hours were spent in endeavoring to secure jury, but the court adjourned without having selected a single member.

Legal Victory For Railroads. Boston, Nov. 15 .- Judge Colt, in the United States circuit court yesterday. decided that an employe of a railroad injured while riding on a pass given him by a corporation, even it was a part compensation for his services, could not recover damages. The case was that of C. A. Whitney, a baggagemaster, against the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad. plaintiff claimed he was seriously injured in a wreck, and sought to recover \$25,000 damages.

Senator Hayward Stricken. Nebraska City, Nov. 15.—Senator Hayward is forbidden by his doctors to make speeches or take an active part in congress until his condition shall change. They fear overwork will bring on an attack of apoplexy. He was attacked last Friday by what is believed to be a slight lesion of the brain. Physicians hold out no hope of the senator's permanent recovery, and very little, if any, of even a temporary improvement in his condition.

Ex-Governor McLane's Widow Dead, Baltimore, Nov. 15 .- News was received here yesterday of the death in Paris of Mrs. McLane, widow of Robert M. McLane, former governor of Maryland and minister to France during President Cleveland's administration. Mrs. McLane was about 70 years The McLanes have for many years occupied a conspicuous position in the professional, political and social life of Maryland.

Advance in the Price of Brooms. Chicago, Nov. 15.-The price of brooms has been advanced more than 50 per cent. This action was decided upon at a meeting of the National Broom Manufacturers' Association of the United States and Canada, held in this city yesterday. This advance is made necessary, the manufacturers say, by the advance broom corn has

Emperor William Honors a Chicagoan Chicago, Nov. 15.-Emperor William of Germany has bestowed upon Edward G. Halle, of this city, the title of chevalier of the Order of the Crown and presented him with a gold medal embellished in white and blue enamel. ## A SHORT, SHARP FIGHT.

Defeat of Philippines Rebels at the Battle of San Jacinto.

MAJOR JOHN A. LOGAN KILLED.

Son of the Gallant General Kill ot While Leading His Battalion-The Town Taken After a Heavy Slaughter of Filipinos-Aguinaldo Has Escaped

Manila, Nov. 15 .- The Thirty-third infantry, in one of the sharpest two hour engagements of the war, with an equal force of insurgents, five miles from San Fabian, Saturday, lost one officer and six men killed and one officer and twelve men wounded. The Americans captured 29 Filipinos and 100 rifles and found 81 insurgent dead lying in the trenches and rice fields. Many more Filipinos, doubtless, were killed or wounded.

General Wheaton was informed that the enemy was gathering at San Jacinto for the



Americans from controlling the road from Dagupan north, whereby Aguinaldo might retreat. The Thirty-third, Colonel Howe commanding, and a detachment of the Thirteenth, with a Gatling

gun, Howland JOHN A. LOGAN, JR. commanding. were sent to disperse them. The troops encountered the worst road ever found in the Island of Luzon.

The insurgents opened the fight two miles from San Jacinto, while the leading American battalion was passing a clump of houses, in the midst of a cocoanut grove, knee deep in mud.

The Filipino sharpshooters, hidden in trees, houses and a small trench across the road, held their fire until the Americans were close to them. When they began firing other Filipinos open ed fire from thickets, right and left. further away. The insurgent sharpshooters picked off the officers first. Five of the Americans who fell wore shoulder straps or chevrons. But the Thirty-third never wavered. Its crack marksmen knocked the Filipinos from the trees like squirrels and the Americans rushed the trench, leaving four dead insurgents there. The regiment then deployed under fire, with Major John A. Logan's battalion in the center, Major Crony's on the right and Major Marsh's on the left.

The skirmish line, which was a mile long, advanced rapidly, keeping up a constant fire. The Filipinos made an unexpectedly good stand, many them remaining under cover until the Americans were within 20 feet of them. Major Logan and six men were killed while Major Logan was gallantly leading his battalion. Major Marsh flanked a small trench full of insurgents, surprising them and slaughtering nearly all of them before entering the The Gatling killed five of the force holding the bridge and swept the country beyond the town, driving about Filipinos into the hill battalion entered the town first.

The insurgents are supposed to have retreated toward Dagupan. It was impossible to pursue them, as the American troops were exhausted and their supply of ammunition was low. The outposts killed five Filipinos during the night. The body of the Filipino lieutenant colonel commanding was

found among the killed. The regiment returned to San Fabian Sunday, it being impossible to get supplies over the roads.

The dead and wounded were brought to Manila yesterday. The officers returning say it is impossible for General Wheaton to attempt a junction with General Young, on account of the Prisoners say it is reported that Aguinaldo, with an army they estimated at 20,000 (probably a great exaggeration), is retiring toward Dagupan, intending to leave by railroad for the northwest. Some of them said they believed the Filipino army had passed the line intended by Generals Wheaton and Young to be covered on Aguinaldo's rear, and that he assed San Fabian, going northeast, a fortnight ago.

Soldiers' Mortality Statistics. Washington, Nov. 15.-Surgeon General Stern erg's annual report says the total number of deaths in our armies, including regulars and volunteers from May 1, 1898, to June 39, 1899, was 6,519, of whom 498 were killed in battle, 216 killed by accident, 202 died of gunshot wounds and wounds received in action, 2,774 from typhoid fever, 475 from malarial fever, 359 from pneumonia, 342 from diarrhoea and dysentery and 185 from yellow fever.

Rockefeller's Conditional Gift. Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 15.—On the authority of Rev. Dr. A. H. Strong, president of the Rochester Baptist Theological seminary, it is announced that John D. Rockefeller, president of the Standard Oil company, has just made a conditional pledge of \$150,000 to the support of the seminary. Mr. Rockefeller will give \$1 for every dollar that may be raised in other directions, till an aggregate of \$300,000 shall have been secured.

Our Imports and Exports. Washington, Nov. 15 .- The statement of the imports and exports of the United States for the month of October last shows that the amount of merchandise imported during the month was \$72,705,894, of which \$29,-692.014 was free of duty. The exports of domestic merchandise during the same month amounted to \$125,232,972. During the last ten months the exports of merchandise exceeded the imports by \$370,867,157.

Resumed After Thirty Years' Idieness. Pottsville, Pa., Nov. 15.-The Wadesville shaft, operated by the Reading Coal and Iron company, which has been idle the past 30 years, due to two fires which raged in its workings, resumed operations yesterday. A new shaft has been sunk, which will cut all the big coal veins, and a new iron breaker has been erected. The colliery employs 500 men and boys.


