Butchering has begun, Samuel Motz taking the lead with a few porkers weighing not less than 400 lbs each.

The long-looked-for rabbit snow has fallen and many of the hunters have shouldered their guns and have gone in search of the above mentioned animal.

A number of our hunters had gone to the mountains to capture some of the fleet-footed animals that are being killed in different parts of the county, but returned without seeing any. They saw many places where "Old Bruin" has been traveling.

Many of the manufacturing establishments of this place are in a prosperous condition. Freshmuth Bros. are busily engaged at making staves. J. C. F. Motz is having his saw mill put up in the narrows, as rapidly as possible. Harter Bros. are filling bills with a great rapidity.

Big Corn Field.

Last year, a corn farm of 6,000 acres in Iowa yielded a net profit of \$50,000. About 3,500 acres of corn were actually planted. Thirty-one planters were used to put the seed in the ground, 75 cultivators did the "tending" and 75 wagons hauled the crop from the field to the cribs. To hold the corn, cribs 12 feet wide, 16 feet high and half a mile long were required. In planting last year, Iowa averaged ahead of her sister states in earliness, nearly all the corn area of the state being planted successfully by the middle of May, 1898.

New Principal Chosen.

At a meeting of the board of Lock Haven Normal school trustees Friday afternoon, Dr. J. R. Flickinger, present principal of the Edinboro Normal school, was unanimously elected principal of the Normal school, to succeed Dr. Eldon, who tendered his resignation several weeks ago. Dr. Flickinger will take charge of the Normal January 1. The building committee has been instructed to make the Petrikin dwelling comfortable for the new principal and his family and in the spring will remodel that building.

Destruction of Small Game.

The Philipsburg Ledger says: During the recent forest fires hundreds of small game lost their lives in the flames. A hunter on surmounting a small knob near Osceola, which had been encircled by the fire and finally burned over, found hundreds of skeletons of rabbits and pheasants who had succumbed to the fury of the flames, after being driven for safety to the circle within the fire, which gradually narrowed until the helpless creatures were suffocated and finally consumed.

Equipment of Cars.

Upwards of a hundred cars are equipped every week with the Janney couplers in the shops at Renovo. At the present rate the Renovo shops will have completed their full quota by the middle of next month. In addition to this, the work is done as well and in many instances better than at any other shops.

Odd Contention on Catching Fish.

Piscatorialists and newspapers outside of Pennsylvania are manifesting both interest and amusement over a novel contention in law that has been before the Monroe county minor and higher courts since last May. The question at issue is whether a landing net may be used in catching trout after the fish are hooked. The counsel for the commonwealth claims that the fish are not caught until in the actual possession of the angler, and that if the net were not used the fish might have escaped. In view of it being illegal to catch trout with a net, the disputed point now raised has important bearings. The defendants are wealthy members of the Pohoqualine Fishing club.

Handles Much Baggage.

There has been big increase in the amount of baggage handled by the Pennsylvania railroad company's baggage department this year and it was stated recently that over 7,000,000 pieces would be handled by the end of the year. Last year in round numbers the number of pieces handled was 6,000,000. During last month there was much baggage handled. There was a big traffic to points in the west and the sample sent out by the large house in the east were more than there have been for some time past. During the month of October the baggage handled at the union station at Pittsburg footed up to 84,426 pieces.

An Eccentric Man's Funeral.

The funeral Friday afternoon of the late Furman Field, of Field's station, Lycoming county, was unique in its simplicity. It was the eccentric old man's request that no services be held, and in further compliance with his wishes no hearse was used, but the coffin was placed in an open spring wagon, which was pulled across the country by his gray horse, so old as to be almost unequal to the task. By request of deceased the funeral procession made its way across the country by way of Quaker hill, ten or fifteen miles farther than the direct route.
