Reuben Stover was hit in the face with several shot, one day last week, fired by a careless hunter in the woods chasing wild game.

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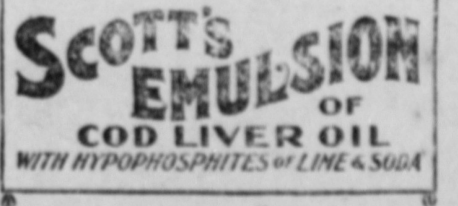
